<u>caustic</u>	Harsh or corrosive in tone. The players were making <b>caustic</b> comments about the refereeing.
<u>chaste</u>	Pure and simple in design or style. A <b>chaste</b> consoling embrace.
cold	Of a person feeling uncomfortably cold. A <b>cold</b> impersonal manner.
critical	(of a text) incorporating a detailed and scholarly analysis and commentary. A <b>critical</b> element of the plan.
cutting	Capable of cutting something. A <b>cutting</b> remark.



dangerous	Able or likely to cause harm or injury. A <b>dangerous</b> criminal.
demanding	Requiring more than usually expected or thought due; especially great patience and effort and skill. <i>A baby can be so <b>demanding</b></i> .
<u>devastating</u>	Physically or spiritually devastating often used in combination. The news came as a <b>devastating</b> blow.
<u>dire</u>	Causing fear or dread or terror. Misuse of drugs can have <b>dire</b> consequences.
<u>disapproving</u>	Expressing an unfavourable opinion. <i>He shot a <b>disapproving</b> glance at her.</i>
dour	Harshly uninviting or formidable in manner or appearance. A <b>dour</b> self sacrificing life.
draconian	(of laws or their application) excessively harsh and severe. The Nazis destroyed the independence of the press by a series of <b>draconian</b> laws.
<u>drastic</u>	Likely to have a strong or far-reaching effect; radical and extreme. A <b>drastic</b> reduction of staffing levels.
<u>dreadful</u>	Causing fear or dread or terror. A <b>dreadful</b> storm.
exacting	Making great demands on one's skill, attention, or other resources. An <b>exacting</b> instructor.
excessive	Beyond normal limits. He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.
<u>excruciating</u>	Very embarrassing, awkward, or tedious. <i>He explained the procedure in <b>excruciating</b> detail.</i>
extortionate	Using or given to extortion. 2 700 for that guitar is <b>extortionate</b> .
extreme	Of the greatest possible degree or extent or intensity. The <b>extreme</b> north west of Scotland.
<u>ferocious</u>	Marked by extreme and violent energy. A <b>ferocious</b> battle.
<u>fierce</u>	Fashionable or attractive in a bold or striking way. <i>Fierce</i> storms lashed the country.
flinty	(of a person or their expression) very hard and unyielding. <i>His <b>flinty</b> gaze.</i>



forbidding	Unfriendly or threatening in appearance. <i>Forbidding</i> thunderclouds.
forceful	Forceful and definite in expression or action. A <b>forceful</b> speaker.
<u>formidable</u>	Inspiring fear or respect through being impressively large, powerful, intense, or capable. <i>The challenge was <b>formidable</b></i> .
