<b>cold</b>	Of a person feeling uncomfortably cold. <i>A <b>cold</b> impersonal manner.</i>
<b>critical</b>	(of a text) incorporating a detailed and scholarly analysis and commentary. <i>A <b>critical</b> element of the plan.</i>
<b>cutting</b>	Capable of cutting something. <i>A <b>cutting</b> remark.</i>

<b>dangerous</b>	Able or likely to cause harm or injury. <i>A <b>dangerous</b> criminal.</i>

<b>searing</b>	Having lost all moisture. <i>A <b>searing</b> indictment of the government s performance.</i>
<b>serious</b>	(of music, literature, or other art forms) requiring or meriting deep reflection. <i>The plan has a <b>serious</b> flaw.</i>
<b>sharp</b>	Keenly and painfully felt as if caused by a sharp edge or point. <i>C <b>sharp</b>.</i>
<b>siberian</b>	Of speech sounds produced by forcing air through a constricted passage (as `f', `s', `z', or `th' in both `thin' and `then.

<b>simple</b>	Denoting a group that has no proper normal subgroup. <b>Simple</b> mechanisms.
<b>sober</b>	Muted in colour. As <b>sober</b> as a judge.
<b>sombre</b>	Dark or dull in colour or tone. The night skies were <b>sombre</b> and starless.
<b>sore</b>	Severe; urgent. It was a <b>sore</b> trial to him.
<b>spare</b>	Kept in reserve especially for emergency use. He tried to write poetry in his <b>spare</b> time.
<b>spartan</b>	Practicing great self-denial- William James. A <b>spartan</b> existence.
<b>stark</b>	Severely simple. A <b>stark</b> interior.

<b>harsh</b>	Disagreeable to the senses. <i>Drenched in a <b>harsh</b> white neon light.</i>
<b>inflexible</b>	Not able to be changed or adapted to particular circumstances. <i>An <b>inflexible</b> knife blade.</i>
<b>intense</b>	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>The heat was <b>intense</b>.</i>
<b>martinet</b>	A person who demands complete obedience; a strict disciplinarian. <i>The woman in charge was a <b>martinet</b> who treated all those beneath her like children.</i>

<b>pitiless</b>	Without mercy or pity. <i>A night of <b>pitiless</b> rain.</i>
<b>pungent</b>	(of comment, criticism, or humour) having a sharp and caustic quality. <i>The <b>pungent</b> taste of radishes.</i>
<b>rigorous</b>	Rigidly accurate; allowing no deviation from a standard. <i><b>Rigorous</b> discipline.</i>
