<b>dark</b>	The time after sunset and before sunrise while it is dark outside. <i>Lights and <b>dark</b>s are juxtaposed arbitrarily to create a sense of shallow relief.</i>
<b>darkness</b>	Having a dark or somber color. <i>The forces of <b>darkness</b>.</i>
<b>dimness</b>	The property of lights or sounds that lack brilliance or are reduced in intensity.
<b>fantasm</b>	A ghostly appearing figure.
<b>flicker</b>	A tiny movement. <i>A <b>flicker</b> of a smile passed across her face.</i>
<b>follower</b>	Someone who travels behind or pursues another. <i>He is a keen <b>follower</b> of football.</i>
<b>gathering darkness</b>	The act of gathering something.
<b>ghost</b>	An apparition of a dead person which is believed to appear or become manifest to the living, typically as a nebulous image. <i>The building is haunted by the <b>ghost</b> of a monk.</i>
<b>glimmer</b>	A flash of light (especially reflected light). <i>There is one <b>glimmer</b> of hope for Becky.</i>
<b>grain</b>	A grainy appearance of a photograph or negative which is in proportion to the size of the emulsion particles composing it. <i>A stone of coarse <b>grain</b>.</i>
<b>hint</b>	A just detectable amount. <i>He has given no <b>hint</b> of his views.</i>
<b>inferior version</b>	One of lesser rank or station or quality.
<b>iota</b>	The ninth star in a constellation. <i>Nothing she said seemed to make an <b>iota</b> of difference.</i>
<b>jot</b>	A brief (and hurriedly handwritten) note. <i>I have yet to see one <b>jot</b> of evidence.</i>
<b>jot or tittle</b>	A brief (and hurriedly handwritten) note.
<b>ounce</b>	A unit of weight equal to one sixteenth of a pound or 16 drams or 28.349 grams. <i>Melt three <b>ounces</b> of butter in a large frying pan.</i>

<b>outline</b>	The contours or bounds of an object. <i>The <b>outlines</b> of dockside warehouses standing sharp on the skyline.</i>
<b>pall</b>	An ecclesiastical pallium. <i>Torture and murder have cast a <b>pall</b> of terror over the villages.</i>
<b>particle</b>	Any of numerous subatomic constituents of the physical world that interact with each other including electrons neutrinos photons and alpha particles. <i>Tiny <b>particles</b> of dust.</i>
<b>phantasm</b>	A ghostly appearing figure. <i>The cart seemed to glide like a terrible <b>phantasm</b>.</i>
<b>phantasma</b>	Phantasm.
<b><u>phantom</u></b>	Something existing in perception only. <i>A <b>phantom</b> conspiracy.</i>
<b>poor imitation</b>	People without possessions or wealth (considered as a group).
<b>profile</b>	A short article giving a description of a person or organization. <i>In soft rocks a <b>profile</b> drawn normally to the beach would show a concave form comparable with the long <b>profile</b> of a river.</i>
<b>scintilla</b>	A tiny trace or spark of a specified quality or feeling. <i>A <b>scintilla</b> of doubt.</i>
<b><u>scrap</u></b>	Discarded metal for reprocessing. <i>There was not a <b>scrap</b> left.</i>
<b>second self</b>	A speech seconding a motion.
<b><u>shade</u></b>	A lampshade. <i>Maria s eyes darkened in <b>shade</b>.</i>
<b>shadower</b>	A spy employed to follow someone and report their movements.
