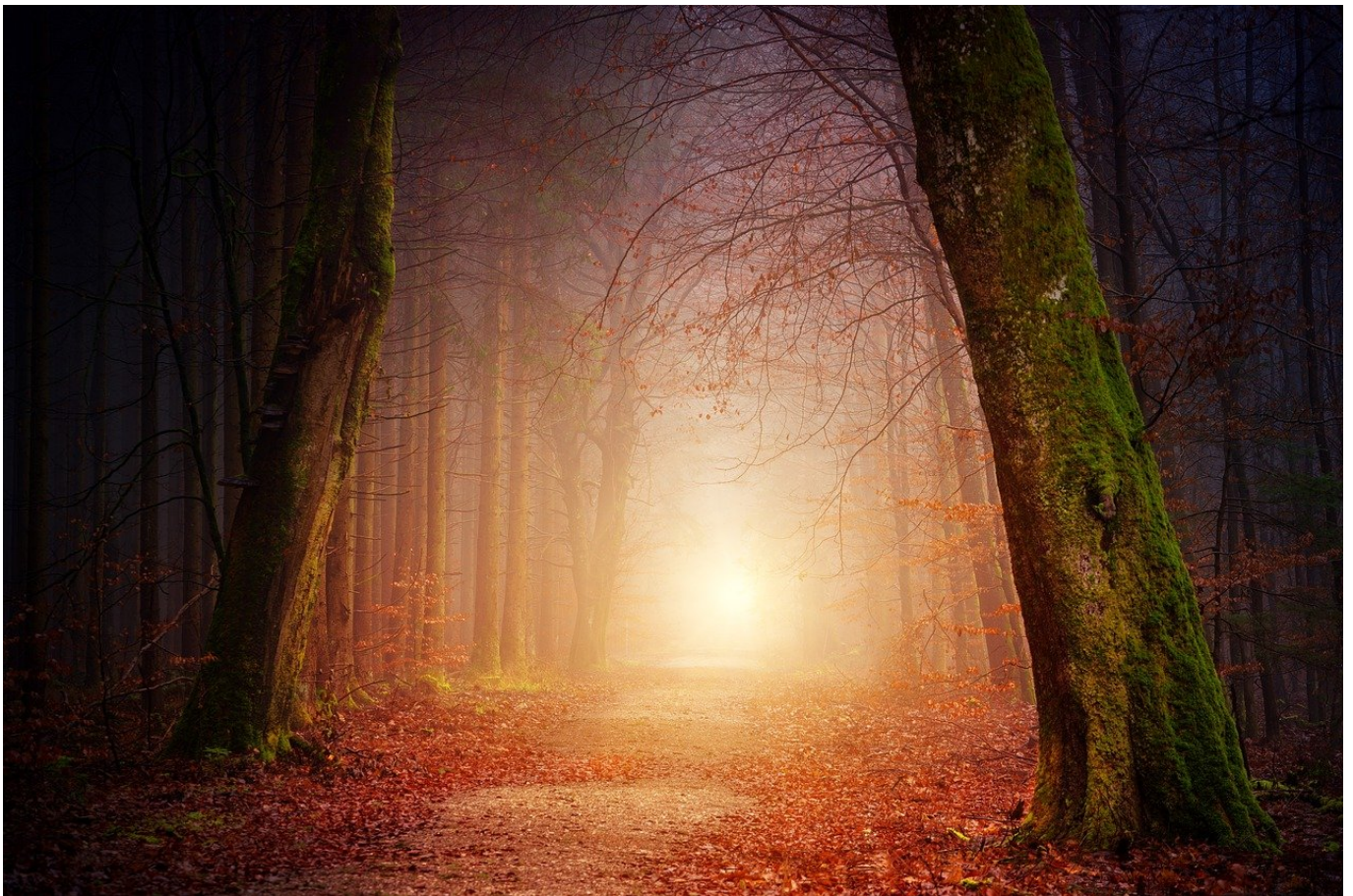
- *A premonition of something adverse.*

- *Something existing in perception only.*
- *A dominating and pervasive presence.*
- *Refuge from danger or observation.*
- *A spy employed to follow someone and report their movements.*



Synonyms of "Shadows" as a noun (12 Words)

- apparition** A remarkable or unexpected appearance of someone or something.
*A headless **apparition**.*
- dark** The time after sunset and before sunrise while it is dark outside.
*Lights and **darks** are juxtaposed arbitrarily to create a sense of shallow relief.*
- darkness** An unilluminated area.
*Moments of **darkness** were rare.*
- fantasm** Something existing in perception only.

- tincture** Any of the conventional colours (including the metals and stains, and often the furs) used in coats of arms.
*She could not keep a **tincture** of bitterness out of her voice.*
- trace** A physical change in the brain presumed to be caused by a process of learning or memory.
*He speaks French with a **trace** of an accent.*
- vestige** A trace or remnant of something that is disappearing or no longer exists.
*The last **vestiges** of colonialism.*

- *He felt secure in his father's shadow.*
- *A shadow over his happiness.*
- *He received little recognition working in the shadow of his father.*
- *The poor child was his mother's shadow.*



Shadows as a Verb

Definitions of "Shadows" as a verb

- *Cast a shadow over.*
- *Follow, usually without the person's knowledge.*
- *Make appear small by comparison.*



Synonyms of "Shadows" as a verb (4 Words)

- dwarf** Stunt the growth or development of.
*This year's debt **dwarfs** that of last year.*
- overshadow** Tower above and cast a shadow over.
*The tall tree **overshadowed** the house.*
- shade** Represent the effect of shade or shadow on.
*She **shaded** her eyes against the sun.*
- shade off** Vary slightly.

- *The police are shadowing her.*



Associations of "Shadows" (30 Words)

arbor	Any of various rotating shafts that serve as axes for larger rotating parts. <i>The arbor provided a shady resting place in the park.</i>
awning	A canopy made of canvas to shelter people or things from rain or sun.
behind	A kick that sends the ball over a behind line or a touch that sends it between the inner posts scoring one point. <i>She was behind with her rent.</i>
black	The player of the black pieces in chess or draughts. <i>The ceiling blackened.</i>
cave	Explore caves as a sport. <i>They say they cave for the adventure challenge and physical exercise.</i>
crayfish	A nocturnal freshwater crustacean that resembles a small lobster and inhabits streams and rivers.
darkness	An unenlightened state. <i>They drew a veil of darkness across the proceedings.</i>
dim	Become dim or lusterless. <i>The dim drone of their voices.</i>

dusky	Used in names of animals with dark coloration e.g dusky dolphin dusky warbler. <i>The dusky night rides down the sky And ushers in the morn.</i>
fading	Weakening in force or intensity.
fin	Propel oneself through the water in a finning motion. <i>We finned along the side of the wreck.</i>
flipper	A pivoted arm in a pinball machine, controlled by the player and used for sending the ball back up the table.
impenetrable	Not admitting of penetration or passage into or through. <i>Impenetrable gloom.</i>
joggle	Fasten or join with a joggle. <i>The lurch and joggle of the car.</i>
lion	A celebrity who is lionized much sought after.
lobster	Catch lobsters. <i>A heavily built man with a lobster nose.</i>
mane	A growth of long hair on the neck of a horse, lion, or other mammal. <i>He had a mane of white hair.</i>
posterior	Coming at a subsequent time or stage. <i>A basal body situated just posterior to the nucleus.</i>
rear	Located in or toward the back or rear. <i>The rear door of the plane.</i>
ringtail	An immature golden eagle.
shade	A lampshade. <i>He wore shades and a leather jacket.</i>
shadowy	Lacking in substance- W.A.Butler. <i>They were attacked by a swarm of shadowy ethereal forms.</i>
soot	Coat with soot. <i>You have previously sooted the underside of their plate by holding it over a candle.</i>
sun	Expose something to the sun especially to warm or dry it. <i>The sun shone from a cloudless sky.</i>
sunshade	A handheld collapsible source of shade.
tail	A tailcoat or a man's formal evening suit with a tailcoat. <i>The next pitch tailed in on me at the last second.</i>
tenebrous	Dark; shadowy or obscure. <i>The tenebrous spiral staircase of the self.</i>

vestige

The smallest amount.

*He waited patiently but without a **vestige** of sympathy.*

wiggle

The act of wiggling.

*Vi **wiggled** her toes.*
