shakiness The quality of being unstable and insecure.

The **shakiness** of the present regime.

The action or fact of shaking or quivering, typically as a result of anxiety,

excitement, or frailty.

trembling
The disease is a degenerative disorder that causes trembling of the hands

arms or legs.



**vibration** 

The act of vibrating. *I picked up no unusual* **vibration**s as to the envelope s contents.

**aftershock** A smaller earthquake following the main shock of a large earthquake.

gyroscope

A device consisting of a wheel or disc mounted so that it can spin rapidly

about an axis which is itself free to alter in direction The orientation of the axis is not affected by tilting of the mounting so gyroscopes can be used to

provide stability or maintain a reference direction in navigation systems

Tremble convulsively, as from fear or excitement. shiver

An act of shuddering. shudder

tremor Undergo a tremor or tremors.

A muscle in my jaw **tremor**ed uncontrollably.

**tremulous** Timid; nervous.

Barbara s voice was tremulous.

wacillate Move or sway in a rising and falling or wavelike pattern.

I vacillated between teaching and journalism.

vibe Enjoy oneself by listening to or dancing to popular music.

Another classic CD for you to **vibe** with.

wibrate Move continuously and rapidly to and fro.

His voice **vibrate**d with terror.

vibration A shaky motion.

The high frequencies of **vibration** in diamond.

waver Give off unsteady sounds, alternating in amplitude or frequency.

His love for her had never wavered.

wobble Tremble or shake.

The handlebars developed a wobble.
