### Definitions of "Sham" as a noun

- *Something that is a counterfeit; not what it seems to be.*
- *A person who pretends to be someone or something they are not.*

**act**

A document attesting a legal transaction.  
*He put on quite an **act** for her benefit.*

<b>charlatan</b>	A person falsely claiming to have a special knowledge or skill. <i>A self confessed con artist and <b>charlatan</b>.</i>
<b>counterfeit</b>	A fraudulent imitation of something else. <i>He knew the tapes to be <b>counterfeits</b>.</i>
<b>dissembler</b>	A person who professes beliefs and opinions that he or she does not hold in order to conceal his or her real feelings or motives.
<b>fake</b>	Something that is a counterfeit; not what it seems to be. <i><b>Fakes</b> of Old Masters.</i>
<b>faker</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>He labelled his opponent a political <b>faker</b> and a moral fraud.</i>
<b>feint</b>	A mock attack or movement in warfare, made in order to distract or deceive an enemy. <i>A brief <b>feint</b> at the opponent's face.</i>
<b>fiction</b>	A belief or statement that is false but is often held to be true because it is expedient to do so. <i>The notion of the country being a democracy is a polite <b>fiction</b>.</i>
<b>fraud</b>	Wrongful or criminal deception intended to result in financial or personal gain. <i>Mediums exposed as tricksters and <b>frauds</b>.</i>
<b>imposter</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses.
<b>impostor</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>The charity has warned anyone approached by the <b>impostor</b> to contact police immediately.</i>
<b>imposture</b>	Pretending to be another person. <i>In a day and a night of violence and <b>imposture</b> William Bentley also succeeds in capturing a smuggler.</i>
<b>lie</b>	The way direction or position in which something lies. <i>He was familiarizing himself with the <b>lie</b> of the streets.</i>
<b>masquerader</b>	A participant in a masquerade.
<b>postiche</b>	A covering or bunch of human or artificial hair used for disguise or adornment.
<b>pretence</b>	A false display of feelings, attitudes, or intentions. <i>Before the age of two children start to engage in <b>pretence</b>.</i>
<b>pretender</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>The <b>pretender</b> to the throne.</i>

<b>pseud</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>At the height of the band's career he was thought to be the biggest <b>pseud</b> in rock.</i>
<b>pseudo</b>	A pretentious or insincere person. <i>The arty chat of a campus <b>pseudo</b>.</i>
<b>role player</b>	What something is used for.
<b>shammer</b>	Someone shirking their duty by feigning illness or incapacity.
<b>simulation</b>	The technique of representing the real world by a computer program. <i><b>Simulation</b> models will allow researchers to test different strategies.</i>
<b>wolf in sheep's clothing</b>	Austrian composer (1860-1903).

## Synonyms of "Sham" as a verb (11 Words)

<b>affect</b>	Have an effect upon. <i>Your attitude will <b>affect</b> how successful you are.</i>
<b><u>assume</u></b>	Occupy or take on. <i>He <b>assumed</b> to himself the right to fill all positions in the town.</i>
<b>counterfeit</b>	Imitate fraudulently. <i>No pretence could have <b>counterfeited</b> such terror.</i>
<b>dissemble</b>	Behave unnaturally or affectedly. <i>An honest sincere person with no need to <b>dissemble</b>.</i>
<b>fake</b>	Tamper, with the purpose of deception. <i>A <b>faked</b> exit visa.</i>
<b>feign</b>	Make a pretence of. <i>She <b>feigned</b> nervousness.</i>
<b>imitate</b>	Copy (a person's speech or mannerisms), especially for comic effect. <i>The mime <b>imitated</b> the passers by.</i>

**make a pretence of** Carry out or commit.

**pretend** Represent fictitiously as in a play or pretend to be or act like.  
*I cannot **pretend** to say that you are wrong.*

**put on** Make an investment.

**simulate** Make a pretence of.  
*Red ochre intended to **simulate** blood.*

## Usage Examples of "Sham" as a verb

- *The opossum escapes danger by shamming dead.*
- *He shammed a headache.*
- *Was he ill or was he shamming?*
- *She shams indifference.*

### Synonyms of "Sham" as an adjective (20 Words)

**affected** Speaking or behaving in an artificial way to make an impression.  
*The gesture appeared both **affected** and stagy.*

**artificial** Artificially formal.  
***Artificial** sweeteners.*

**assumed** Adopted in order to deceive.  
*An **assumed** name.*

**bogus** Not genuine or true (used in a disapproving manner when deception has been attempted).  
*A **bogus** insurance claim.*

**contrived** Created or arranged in a way that seems artificial and unrealistic.  
***Contrived** coyness.*

<b>ersatz</b>	Artificial and inferior. <i>Ersatz</i> coffee.
<b>fake</b>	Not genuine; imitation or counterfeit. <i>It isn't <b>fake</b> anything it's real synthetic fur.</i>
<b>false</b>	Used in names of plants animals and gems that superficially resemble the thing properly so called e.g false oat. <i>A <b>false</b> start.</i>
<b>feigned</b>	Simulated or pretended; insincere. <i><b>Feigned</b> sympathy.</i>
<b>fictitious</b>	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Reports of a deal were dismissed as <b>fictitious</b> by the Minister.</i>
<b>fictive</b>	Capable of imaginative creation. <i>The obviously <b>fictive</b> genres poetry drama and the novel.</i>
<b>insincere</b>	Not expressing genuine feelings. <i>She flashed him an <b>insincere</b> smile.</i>
<b>make-believe</b>	Imagined as in a play.
<b>manufactured</b>	(of something abstract) made or produced in a merely mechanical way. <i><b>Manufactured</b> consumer goods.</i>
<b>not genuine</b>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something- G.K.Chesterton.
<b>plastic</b>	Made of plastic. <i>The writer is drawn to words as a <b>plastic</b> medium.</i>
<b>pretended</b>	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Eating ice cream with <b>pretended</b> unconcern.</i>
<b>simulated</b>	Manufactured in imitation of some other material. <i>A <b>simulated</b> leather handbag.</i>
<b>spurious</b>	Ostensibly valid, but not actually valid. <i>The dominions of both rulers passed away to their <b>spurious</b> or doubtful offspring.</i>
<b>synthetic</b>	(of a language) characterized by the use of inflections rather than word order to express grammatical structure. <i><b>Synthetic</b> rubber.</i>

<b>baloney</b>	Pretentious or silly talk or writing. <i>I don't buy it it's all a load of <b>baloney</b>.</i>
<b>concoct</b>	Make a concoction of by mixing. <i>She began to <b>concoct</b> a dinner likely to appeal to him.</i>
<b>counterfeit</b>	Not genuine; imitating something superior. <i>He knew the tapes to be <b>counterfeits</b>.</i>

<b>faux</b>	Made in imitation; artificial. <i>A rope of <b>faux</b> pearls.</i>
<b>feign</b>	Make believe with the intent to deceive. <i>She <b>feigned</b> nervousness.</i>
<b>fictitious</b>	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A <b>fictitious</b> address.</i>
<b>figment</b>	A contrived or fantastic idea. <i>It really was Ross and not a <b>figment</b> of her overheated imagination.</i>
<b>forgery</b>	A forged document, signature, banknote, or work of art. <i>He was found guilty of <b>forgery</b>.</i>
<b>fraud</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>He was convicted of <b>fraud</b>.</i>
<b>hypocrisy</b>	Insincerity by virtue of pretending to have qualities or beliefs that you do not really have. <i>She was irritated to be accused of <b>hypocrisy</b>.</i>
<b>hypocrite</b>	A person who professes beliefs and opinions that he or she does not hold in order to conceal his or her real feelings or motives. <i>The story tells of respectable Ben who turns out to be a cheat and a <b>hypocrite</b>.</i>
<b>imitate</b>	Take or follow as a model. <i>She <b>imitated</b> my Scots accent.</i>

<b>imitation</b>	Not genuine or real being an imitation of the genuine article. <i>Decorated with <b>imitation</b> palm leaves.</i>
<b>imitative</b>	Following a model or example without any attempt at originality. <i>Acting is an <b>imitative</b> art.</i>
<b>impersonate</b>	Represent another person with comic intentions. <i>She <b>impersonates</b> Madonna.</i>
<b>impostor</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>The charity has warned anyone approached by the <b>impostor</b> to contact police immediately.</i>
<b>inauthentic</b>	Not in fact what it is said to be. <i>These books were fabricated and contained <b>inauthentic</b> material.</i>
<b>phony</b>	Fraudulent; having a misleading appearance.
<b>pretend</b>	Represent fictitiously as in a play or pretend to be or act like. <i>She turned the pages and <b>pretended</b> to read.</i>
<b>pretended</b>	Not genuine; assumed. <i>A <b>pretended</b> interest.</i>
<b>pretender</b>	A person who claims or aspires to a title or position. <i>The <b>pretender</b> to the throne.</i>
<b>pretension</b>	The advancing of a claim. <i>He spoke simply without <b>pretension</b>.</i>
<b>pseudo</b>	A pretentious or insincere person. <i>We are talking about real journalists and not the <b>pseudo</b> kind.</i>
<b>simulate</b>	Pretend to have or feel (an emotion). <i>Red ochre intended to <b>simulate</b> blood.</i>
<b>simulated</b>	(of an emotion) pretended or feigned. <i>She howled in <b>simulated</b> anguish.</i>
<b>spurious</b>	Born out of wedlock- E.A.Freeman. <i>Separating authentic and <b>spurious</b> claims.</i>
