A document attesting a legal transaction.
*He put on quite an **act** for her benefit.*

charlatan	A person falsely claiming to have a special knowledge or skill. <i>A self confessed con artist and charlatan.</i>
counterfeit	A fraudulent imitation of something else. <i>He knew the tapes to be counterfeits.</i>
dissembler	A person who professes beliefs and opinions that he or she does not hold in order to conceal his or her real feelings or motives.
fake	Something that is a counterfeit; not what it seems to be. <i>Fakes of Old Masters.</i>
faker	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>He labelled his opponent a political faker and a moral fraud.</i>
feint	A mock attack or movement in warfare, made in order to distract or deceive an enemy. <i>A brief feint at the opponent s face.</i>
fiction	A belief or statement that is false but is often held to be true because it is expedient to do so. <i>The notion of the country being a democracy is a polite fiction.</i>
fraud	Wrongful or criminal deception intended to result in financial or personal gain. <i>Mediums exposed as tricksters and frauds.</i>
imposter	A person who makes deceitful pretenses.
impostor	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>The charity has warned anyone approached by the impostor to contact police immediately.</i>
imposture	Pretending to be another person. <i>In a day and a night of violence and imposture William Bentley also succeeds in capturing a smuggler.</i>
lie	The way direction or position in which something lies. <i>He was familiarizing himself with the lie of the streets.</i>
masquerader	A participant in a masquerade.
postiche	A covering or bunch of human or artificial hair used for disguise or adornment.
pretence	A false display of feelings, attitudes, or intentions. <i>Before the age of two children start to engage in pretence.</i>
pretender	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>The pretender to the throne.</i>

pseud	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>At the height of the band's career he was thought to be the biggest pseud in rock.</i>
pseudo	A pretentious or insincere person. <i>The arty chat of a campus pseudo.</i>
role player	What something is used for.
shammer	Someone shirking their duty by feigning illness or incapacity.
simulation	The technique of representing the real world by a computer program. <i>Simulation models will allow researchers to test different strategies.</i>
wolf in sheep's clothing	Austrian composer (1860-1903).

affect	Have an effect upon. <i>Your attitude will affect how successful you are.</i>
<u>assume</u>	Occupy or take on. <i>He assumed to himself the right to fill all positions in the town.</i>
counterfeit	Imitate fraudulently. <i>No pretence could have counterfeited such terror.</i>
dissemble	Behave unnaturally or affectedly. <i>An honest sincere person with no need to dissemble.</i>
fake	Tamper, with the purpose of deception. <i>A faked exit visa.</i>
feign	Make a pretence of. <i>She feigned nervousness.</i>
imitate	Copy (a person's speech or mannerisms), especially for comic effect. <i>The mime imitated the passers by.</i>

make a pretence of Carry out or commit.

pretend Represent fictitiously as in a play or pretend to be or act like.
*I cannot **pretend** to say that you are wrong.*

put on Make an investment.

simulate Make a pretence of.
*Red ochre intended to **simulate** blood.*

affected Speaking or behaving in an artificial way to make an impression.
*The gesture appeared both **affected** and stagy.*

artificial Artificially formal.
***Artificial** sweeteners.*

assumed Adopted in order to deceive.
*An **assumed** name.*

bogus Not genuine or true (used in a disapproving manner when deception has been attempted).
*A **bogus** insurance claim.*

contrived Created or arranged in a way that seems artificial and unrealistic.
***Contrived** coyness.*

ersatz	Artificial and inferior. <i>Ersatz</i> coffee.
fake	Not genuine; imitation or counterfeit. <i>It isn't fake anything it's real synthetic fur.</i>
false	Used in names of plants animals and gems that superficially resemble the thing properly so called e.g false oat. <i>A false start.</i>
feigned	Simulated or pretended; insincere. <i>Feigned sympathy.</i>
fictitious	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Reports of a deal were dismissed as fictitious by the Minister.</i>
fictive	Capable of imaginative creation. <i>The obviously fictive genres poetry drama and the novel.</i>
insincere	Not expressing genuine feelings. <i>She flashed him an insincere smile.</i>
make-believe	Imagined as in a play.
manufactured	(of something abstract) made or produced in a merely mechanical way. <i>Manufactured consumer goods.</i>
not genuine	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something- G.K.Chesterton.
plastic	Made of plastic. <i>The writer is drawn to words as a plastic medium.</i>
pretended	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Eating ice cream with pretended unconcern.</i>
simulated	Manufactured in imitation of some other material. <i>A simulated leather handbag.</i>
spurious	Ostensibly valid, but not actually valid. <i>The dominions of both rulers passed away to their spurious or doubtful offspring.</i>
synthetic	(of a language) characterized by the use of inflections rather than word order to express grammatical structure. <i>Synthetic rubber.</i>

forgery	A forged document, signature, banknote, or work of art. <i>He was found guilty of forgery.</i>
fraud	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>He was convicted of fraud.</i>
hypocrisy	Insincerity by virtue of pretending to have qualities or beliefs that you do not really have. <i>She was irritated to be accused of hypocrisy.</i>
hypocrite	A person who professes beliefs and opinions that he or she does not hold in order to conceal his or her real feelings or motives. <i>The story tells of respectable Ben who turns out to be a cheat and a hypocrite.</i>
imitate	Take or follow as a model. <i>She imitated my Scots accent.</i>

imitation	Not genuine or real being an imitation of the genuine article. <i>Decorated with imitation palm leaves.</i>
imitative	Following a model or example without any attempt at originality. <i>Acting is an imitative art.</i>
impersonate	Represent another person with comic intentions. <i>She impersonates Madonna.</i>
impostor	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>The charity has warned anyone approached by the impostor to contact police immediately.</i>
inauthentic	Not in fact what it is said to be. <i>These books were fabricated and contained inauthentic material.</i>
phony	Fraudulent; having a misleading appearance.
pretend	Represent fictitiously as in a play or pretend to be or act like. <i>She turned the pages and pretended to read.</i>
pretended	Not genuine; assumed. <i>A pretended interest.</i>
pretender	A person who claims or aspires to a title or position. <i>The pretender to the throne.</i>
pretension	The advancing of a claim. <i>He spoke simply without pretension.</i>
pseudo	A pretentious or insincere person. <i>We are talking about real journalists and not the pseudo kind.</i>
simulate	Pretend to have or feel (an emotion). <i>Red ochre intended to simulate blood.</i>
simulated	(of an emotion) pretended or feigned. <i>She howled in simulated anguish.</i>
spurious	Born out of wedlock- E.A.Freeman. <i>Separating authentic and spurious claims.</i>
