- asleep on one's feet** Lacking sensation.
- debilitated** In a very weakened and infirm state.
*I became very **debilitated** with tremendous joint pain.*
- distressed** Suffering severe physical strain or distress.
*He dropped out of the race clearly **distressed** and having difficulty breathing.*
- dog-tired** Drained of energy or effectiveness; extremely tired; completely exhausted.
- drained** Drained of electric charge discharged.
*A **drained** marsh.*
- enervated** Lacking energy or vitality.
*Daniel felt too **enervated** to resist.*
- exhausted** Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted.
***Exhausted** peat workings.*
- fatigued** Drained of energy or effectiveness; extremely tired; completely exhausted.

fraught	(of a situation or course of action) filled with or likely to result in (something undesirable. <i>Words fraught with meaning.</i>
on one's last legs	Conclusive in a process or progression.
ready to drop	Immediately available.
spent	Drained of energy or effectiveness; extremely tired; completely exhausted. <i>The movement has become a spent force.</i>
tattered	Ruined or disrupted. <i>A man in a tattered shirt.</i>
tired out	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse.
upset	Afflicted with or marked by anxious uneasiness or trouble or grief. <i>The Bills upset victory over the Houston Oilers.</i>
weary	Calling for a great amount of energy or endurance; tiring and tedious. <i>War weary Americans.</i>
worried	Mentally upset over possible misfortune or danger etc. <i>Michelle knew that her friends were very worried about her.</i>



Usage Examples of "Shattered" as an adjective

- *He was said to be absolutely shattered after losing his job.*
- *I usually feel too shattered to do more than crawl into bed.*
- *Our shattered dreams of peace and prosperity.*

Afraid of snakes.
- aghast** Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.
*She winced **aghast** at his cruelty.*
- amaze** Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment.
*Your ability to speak six languages **amazes** me.*
- amazed** Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock.
*She shook her head in **amazed** disbelief.*
- astonish** Surprise or impress (someone) greatly.
*You never fail to **astonish** me.*
- astonished** Greatly surprised or impressed; amazed.
*We were **astonished** to hear of this decision.*
- astonishing** Extremely surprising or impressive; amazing.

<u>astounding</u>	Surprisingly impressive or notable. <i>The summit offers astounding views.</i>
bemuse	Puzzle, confuse, or bewilder (someone). <i>He was bemused by what was happening.</i>
blighted	Affected by blight; anything that mars or prevents growth or prosperity. <i>A blighted rose.</i>
<u>broken</u>	Out of working order busted is an informal substitute for broken. <i>Tear off the stub above the broken line.</i>
confused	Mentally confused unable to think with clarity or act intelligently. <i>The confused information supplied by authorities.</i>
destroyed	Destroyed physically or morally. <i>Alzheimer s is responsible for her destroyed mind.</i>
<u>dismayed</u>	Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.
<u>flabbergasted</u>	Greatly surprised or astonished. <i>This news has left me totally flabbergasted.</i>
<u>formidable</u>	Inspiring fear. <i>A formidable opponent.</i>
irreparably	In a way that is impossible to rectify or repair. <i>Our international image has been irreparably tarnished.</i>
<u>puzzled</u>	Unable to understand; perplexed. <i>The questioners were met with puzzled looks.</i>
quizzical	Amusingly odd or strange. <i>One of the most quizzical movies ever made.</i>
redoubtable	Inspiring fear. <i>He was a redoubtable debater.</i>
<u>revitalize</u>	Imbue (something) with new life and vitality. <i>This food revitalized the patient.</i>
scared	Made afraid. <i>He s scared to come to you and ask for help.</i>
shock	Affect with physiological shock or with an electric shock. <i>All the jars and jolts were smoothed out by the shock absorbers.</i>
<u>shocked</u>	Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.
<u>shocking</u>	Causing indignation or disgust; offensive. <i>She brought shocking news.</i>
<u>staggering</u>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>The staggering bills for maintenance and repair.</i>

startled

Feeling or showing sudden shock or alarm.
*Students **startled** by the teacher's quiet return.*

surprise

Cause to be surprised.
*Much to her **surprise** she'd missed him.*

surprised

Feeling or showing surprise.
*There was a **surprised** silence.*
