Associations of "Shed light" (30 Words)

auroral	Of or relating to the atmospheric phenomenon auroras. <i>A dim auroral glow.</i>
<u>bask</u>	Derive or receive pleasure from; get enjoyment from; take pleasure in. <i>She relished her fame and basked in her glory.</i>
<u>beam</u>	An oscillating shaft which transmits the vertical piston movement of a beam engine to the crank or pump. <i>The watertight skin and deck were put on over this framework of ribs and beams.</i>
<u>bright</u>	Brightly. <i>A bright idea.</i>
brilliance	The quality of being magnificent or splendid or grand. <i>The nights were dark lit only by the brilliance of Aegean stars.</i>
brilliantly	In an impressive or outstanding way; very well. <i>She succeeded brilliantly.</i>
emitter	A thing which emits something. <i>The country's largest emitter of airborne toxins.</i>
flash	A newsflash. <i>The oncoming car flashed its lights.</i>
<u>gleam</u>	(of an emotion or quality) be expressed through the brightness of a person's eyes. <i>Light gleamed on the china cats.</i>
glimmer	Shine brightly, like a star or a light. <i>There is one glimmer of hope for Becky.</i>
glint	Be shiny, as if wet. <i>The glint of gold in his teeth.</i>
glisten	A sparkling light reflected from something wet. <i>His cheeks glistened with tears.</i>

glitter	Be shiny, as if wet. <i>The grass glittered with dew.</i>
glow	Be exuberant or high-spirited. <i>The fireflies were glowing and flying about in the garden.</i>
illuminate	Make free from confusion or ambiguity; make clear. <i>Placing the events of the 1930s in a broader historical context helps to illuminate their significance.</i>
illumination	A condition of spiritual awareness divine illumination. <i>Higher levels of illumination are needed for reading.</i>
illumine	Light up; brighten. <i>He moved her lamp so that her face was illuminated.</i>
lucent	Softly bright or radiant. <i>The moon was lucent in the background.</i>
luminosity	The quality of being luminous; emitting or reflecting light. <i>Its luminosity is measured relative to that of our sun.</i>
phosphorescent	Emitting light without appreciable heat as by slow oxidation of phosphorous. <i>The phosphorescent glow of decaying wood.</i>
radiant	Of an appliance designed to emit radiant energy especially for cooking or heating. <i>Plants convert the radiant energy of the sun into chemical energy.</i>
radiation	Syndrom resulting from exposure to ionizing radiation e g exposure to radioactive chemicals or to nuclear explosions low doses cause diarrhea and nausea and vomiting and sometimes loss of hair greater exposure can cause sterility. <i>The radiation dose.</i>
ray	Emit as rays. <i>A ray of sunlight came through the window.</i>
shine	Make a surface shine. <i>His shoes were shined to perfection.</i>
sparkle	Vivacity and wit. <i>She s got a kind of sparkle.</i>
spectroscopy	The use of spectrosopes to analyze spectra.
sunlight	The rays of the sun. <i>A shaft of sunlight.</i>
sunshine	Used as a friendly or sometimes threatening form of address. <i>Their colourful music can bring a ray of sunshine.</i>

twinkle

Gleam or glow intermittently.

*The smile made her face crease and her eyes **twinkle**.*

ultraviolet

Of equipment or techniques using or concerned with ultraviolet radiation.

*An **ultraviolet** lamp.*
