<b>disgusting</b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>He had the most <b>disgusting</b> rotten teeth.</i>
<b>disquieting</b>	Causing mental discomfort. <i>The <b>disquieting</b> sounds of nearby gunfire.</i>
<b>distressing</b>	Causing anxiety, sorrow or pain; upsetting. <i>Some very <b>distressing</b> news.</i>
<b>disturbing</b>	Causing anxiety; worrying. <i>A <b>disturbing</b> amount of crime.</i>
<b>dreadful</b>	Extremely disagreeable and unpleasant. <i>There's been a <b>dreadful</b> accident.</i>
<b>foul</b>	Of a baseball not hit between the foul lines. <i><b>Foul</b> language.</i>
<b>frightful</b>	Extreme in degree or extent or amount or impact. <i>In a <b>frightful</b> hurry.</i>
<b>ghastly</b>	Very objectionable, bad, or unpleasant. <i>One of the most <b>ghastly</b> crimes ever committed.</i>
<b>grave</b>	Dignified and somber in manner or character and committed to keeping promises. <i>A <b>grave</b> situation.</i>
<b>grievous</b>	Causing or marked by grief or anguish. <i>His death was a <b>grievous</b> blow.</i>
<b>grim</b>	Harshly ironic or sinister. <i><b>Grim</b> necessity.</i>
<b>grisly</b>	Shockingly repellent; inspiring horror. <i>The town was shaken by a series of <b>grisly</b> crimes.</i>
<b>hideous</b>	Extremely ugly. <i>A <b>hideous</b> pattern of injustice.</i>
<b>horrible</b>	Very unpleasant. <i>A <b>horrible</b> massacre.</i>

<b>horrifying</b>	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>An alarming even <b>horrifying</b> picture.</i>
<b>loathsome</b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>This <b>loathsome</b> little swine.</i>
<b>lurid</b>	Unpleasantly bright in colour, especially so as to create a harsh or unnatural effect. <i><b>Lurid</b> flames.</i>
<b>monstrous</b>	Inhumanly or outrageously evil or wrong. <i>The <b>monstrous</b> tidal wave swamped the surrounding countryside.</i>
<b>nauseating</b>	Causing or liable to cause a feeling of nausea or disgust; disgusting. <i>A <b>nauseating</b> smell.</i>
<b>odious</b>	Unequivocally detestable- Edmund Burke. <i>Consequences <b>odious</b> to those you govern.</i>
<b>offensive</b>	Morally offensive. <i><b>Offensive</b> operations against the insurgents.</i>
<b>outrageous</b>	Very bold and unusual and rather shocking. <i>Spends an <b>outrageous</b> amount on entertainment.</i>
<b>perturbing</b>	Causing distress or worry or anxiety. <i>There were two scenes that I think would be <b>perturbing</b> to small children.</i>
<b>repellent</b>	Able to repel a particular thing; impervious to a particular substance. <i>A water <b>repellent</b> fabric.</i>
<b>repugnant</b>	Extremely distasteful; unacceptable. <i>Cannibalism seems <b>repugnant</b> to us.</i>
<b>repulsive</b>	Arousing intense distaste or disgust. <i><b>Repulsive</b> behavior.</i>
<b>revolting</b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i><b>Revolting</b> food.</i>

<b>terrible</b>	Very unskilful. <i>What a <b>terrible</b> mess.</i>
