<u>careless</u>	Not giving sufficient attention or thought to avoiding harm or errors. <i>Careless</i> of the consequences.
cheap	Miserly. A cheap restaurant.
cheapjack	Cheap and shoddy- Judith Crist. A cheapjack vehicle.
<u>crude</u>	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>Crude</i> oil.
cursory	Hasty and therefore not thorough or detailed. A casual or cursory inspection failed to reveal the house s structural flaws.
evil	Of a force or spirit embodying or associated with the forces of the devil. <i>We were driven out of the house by an</i> evil <i>spirit.</i>
gimcrack	Tastelessly showy. Plastic gimcrack cookware.
hasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation. Don t be too hasty in criticizing a colleague.
hurried	Done in a hurry; rushed. A hurried job.
immoral	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong. Unseemly and immoral behaviour.
<u>improper</u>	Not in accordance with accepted standards, especially of morality or honesty. <i>An improper</i> suggestion.
<u>inferior</u>	Of low or inferior quality. <i>Inferior</i> alveolar artery.
iniquitous	Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin. <i>An iniquitous tax.</i>
jerry-built	Of inferior workmanship and materials.
low	Of a river or lake below the usual water level. Brought low .
low-grade	Of inferior quality.
mean	Having or showing an ignoble lack of honor or morality. In a mean mood.
<u>messy</u>	Untidy or dirty. A messy divorce.
negligent	Failing to take proper care over something. Negligent of detail.



scrappy	Full of fighting spirit. He had a scrappy New York temperament.
second-rate	Moderate to inferior in quality.
sinful	Far more than usual or expected. A sinful way of life.
slapdash	Done too hurriedly and carelessly. <i>He gave a slapdash performance.</i>
slipshod	Marked by great carelessness. <i>He d caused many problems with his slipshod management.</i>
<u>sloppy</u>	Wet or smeared with a spilled liquid or moist material. <i>Sloppy habits</i> .
<u>sordid</u>	Meanly avaricious and mercenary. The overcrowded housing conditions were sordid and degrading.
third-rate	Of lesser quality than second-rate.
tinny	Of or containing tin. I m what you might call tinny .
untidy	Not arranged neatly and in order. She was chronically untidy and her clothes lay where she had dropped them
wicked	Having committed unrighteous acts. A wicked and unscrupulous politician.
wrong	Not appropriate for a purpose or occasion. <i>Your information is wrong.</i>

<u>abject</u>	Of the most contemptible kind. An abject apology.
ambidextrous	Marked by deliberate deceptiveness especially by pretending one set of feelings and acting under the influence of another. An ambidextrous surgeon.



cheap	Deserving contempt. A house that was going cheap because of the war.
contemptible	Deserving contempt; despicable. A display of contemptible cowardice.
<u>degraded</u>	Reduced in quality; inferior. It will grow successfully even on degraded land.
<u>degrading</u>	Used of conduct; characterized by dishonor. <i>The prisoners were subjected to cruel and degrading treatment.</i>
deplorable	Bad; unfortunate. <i>Children living in deplorable conditions.</i>
despicable	Morally reprehensible. Would do something as despicable as murder.
<u>disadvantaged</u>	Marked by deprivation especially of the necessities of life or healthful environmental influences. <i>We began to help the disadvantaged.</i>
disgraced	Having fallen from favour or a position of power or honour; discredited. <i>The disgraced</i> city financier.
<u>disgraceful</u>	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation. It is disgraceful that they should be denied unemployment benefits.
dishonorable	Lacking honor or integrity; deserving dishonor. Dishonorable in thought and deed.
frugal	Sparing or economical as regards money or food. A frugal lunch.
garish	Obtrusively bright and showy; lurid. <i>Garish</i> colors.
<u>gaudy</u>	Marked by conspicuous display. A gaudy costume.
<u>humiliating</u>	Causing awareness of your shortcomings. A humiliating defeat.
ignoble	Not of the nobility. <i>Ignoble</i> feelings of intense jealousy.
ignominious	Deserving or causing public disgrace or shame. No other party risked ignominious defeat.
inglorious	(used of conduct or character) deserving or bringing disgrace or shame. An inglorious episode in British imperial history.
meagerly	To a meager degree or in a meager manner. These voices are meagerly represented at the conference.



meretricious	Like or relating to a prostitute. A meretricious yet stylish book.
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>Offensive</i> odors.
opprobrious	Deserving or bringing disgrace or shame- Rachel Carson. <i>Opprobrious</i> remarks.
poor	Deserving or inciting pity- Galsworthy. They lived in the poor section of town.
<u>reprehensible</u>	Bringing or deserving severe rebuke or censure. <i>His complacency and reprehensible laxity.</i>
<u>shameful</u>	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation. The wicked rascally shameful conduct of the bankrupt.
<u>tacky</u>	(of a glutinous liquid such as paint) not completely dried and slightly sticky to the touch. <i>The paint was still tacky.</i>
untrustworthy	Not worthy of trust or belief. An untrustworthy person.
<u>weak</u>	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. A weak president.
