| armistice | An agreement made by opposing sides in a war to stop fighting for a certain time; a truce. <i>The Italian government signed an armistice with the Allies.</i> |
| cessation | A stopping. <i>A cessation of animal testing of cosmetics.</i> |
| discontinuance | The act of discontinuing or breaking off; an interruption (temporary or permanent). |
| dwell | Be an inhabitant of or reside in. <i>The problems dwell in the social injustices in this country.</i> |
| ephemeral | An ephemeral plant. <i>The ephemeral joys of childhood.</i> |
| fleeting | Lasting for a very short time. <i>A fleeting glance.</i> |
| fugitive | A person who has escaped from captivity or is in hiding. <i>The fugitive effects of light.</i> |
| inadequacy | A lack of competence. <i>Her feelings of personal inadequacy.</i> |
| inhabit | Be an inhabitant of or reside in. <i>Sweet memories inhabit this house.</i> |
| insufficient | Not enough; inadequate. <i>There was insufficient evidence to convict him.</i> |
| lacking | Nonexistent. <i>Adequate resources are sadly lacking.</i> |

| <u>lifelong</u> | Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>The two men were to remain lifelong friends.</i> |
| <u>meager</u> | Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>Meager resources.</i> |
| momentary | Lasting for a markedly brief time. <i>A momentary lapse of concentration.</i> |
| overview | A general summary of a subject. <i>The report overviews the needs of the community.</i> |
| paucity | An insufficient quantity or number. <i>A paucity of information.</i> |
| populate | Inhabit or live in; be an inhabitant of. <i>A cosy rural town populated with friendly folk.</i> |
| provisional | A provisional stamp. <i>Norman as yet had only a provisional licence.</i> |
| provisory | Provisional. <i>A provisory clause.</i> |
| scant | Deal with inadequately; neglect. <i>He does not scant his attention to the later writings.</i> |
| sojourn | A temporary stay (e.g., as a guest). <i>She had sojourned once in Egypt.</i> |
| stay | Stay the same remain in a certain state. <i>Stay a bit longer the day is still young.</i> |
| stopgap | Something contrived to meet an urgent need or emergency. <i>Transplants are only a stopgap until more sophisticated alternatives can work.</i> |
| subsist | Remain in force or effect. <i>Many people in the world have to subsist on 1 a day.</i> |
| temporary | A person employed on a temporary basis typically an office worker who finds employment through an agency. <i>Temporary housing.</i> |
| transitory | Not permanent. <i>Transitory periods of medieval greatness.</i> |
| <u>truce</u> | An agreement between enemies or opponents to stop fighting or arguing for a certain time. <i>The guerrillas called a three day truce.</i> |
| wanting | Lacking in a required or necessary quality. <i>Mandibles are wanting in many of these insects.</i> |
