abominable	Unequivocally detestable- Edmund Burke. <i>What an abominable mess.</i>
appalling	Very bad; awful. <i>The cat suffered appalling injuries during the attack.</i>
awful	(of a person) very unwell or troubled. <i>I ve made an awful fool of myself.</i>
disagreeable	Unfriendly and bad-tempered. <i>Aspects of his work are disagreeable to him.</i>

disgusting	Arousing revulsion or strong indignation. <i>He had the most disgusting rotten teeth.</i>
distasteful	Causing dislike or aversion; disagreeable or unpleasant. <i>He found such cynicism distasteful.</i>
dreadful	Extremely disagreeable. <i>Don't go out the weather is dreadful.</i>
foul	Of a baseball not hit between the foul lines. <i>Foul oaths.</i>
hideous	Extremely unpleasant. <i>The whole hideous story.</i>
horrible	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>War is beyond all words horrible.</i>
loathsome	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>A loathsome disease.</i>
nasty	(of the weather) unpleasantly cold or wet. <i>A nasty problem.</i>
nauseating	Causing or liable to cause a feeling of nausea or disgust; disgusting. <i>The stench was nauseating.</i>
nauseous	Causing or able to cause nausea. <i>The smell was nauseous.</i>
noisome	Offensively malodorous. <i>A noisome concoction of which cheap port is the basis.</i>
objectionable	Liable to objection or debate; used of something one might take exception to. <i>A vulgar and objectionable person.</i>
obnoxious	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He found her son somewhat obnoxious.</i>
off-putting	Tending to repel- Elizabeth Hess.
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>Offensive odors.</i>
queasy	Nauseous; feeling sick. <i>The queasy swell of the boat.</i>
repellent	Serving or tending to repel. <i>A water repellent fabric.</i>
repugnant	Extremely distasteful; unacceptable. <i>Cannibalism seems repugnant to us.</i>

repulsive	Relating to repulsion between physical objects. <i>A repulsive smell.</i>
revolting	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>Revolting food.</i>
terrible	Causing fear or dread or terror. <i>A terrible crime.</i>
uninviting	Neither attractive nor tempting. <i>The house was dark and uninviting.</i>
vile	Morally reprehensible. <i>He has a vile temper.</i>

- *She hit the ground with a sickening thud.*
- *It is sickening to think we had done enough to win and then had to leave with nothing.*
- *A sickening stench of blood.*

displeasing	Causing displeasure or lacking pleasing qualities. <i>It was not entirely displeasing to be the centre of such a drama.</i>
fetid	Smelling extremely unpleasant. <i>The fetid water of the marsh.</i>
foul	Make foul or dirty pollute. <i>Will have to work towards solutions to prevent trucks from fouling railroad tracks.</i>
hate	Have a strong aversion to (something). <i>I hate to bother you.</i>
hateful	Evoking or deserving hatred- Joseph Priestly. <i>That hateful arrogant woman.</i>
horrifying	Causing horror; extremely shocking. <i>An alarming even horrifying picture.</i>

loathsome	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>This loathsome little swine.</i>
<u>nausea</u>	The state that precedes vomiting. <i>The stories will launch a wave of public nausea and outrage.</i>
nauseating	Causing or liable to cause a feeling of nausea or disgust; disgusting. <i>The stench was nauseating.</i>
nauseous	Affected with nausea; feeling inclined to vomit. <i>Nauseous offal.</i>
noisome	Having an extremely offensive smell. <i>Noisome vapours from the smouldering waste.</i>
noxious	Harmful, poisonous, or very unpleasant. <i>Noxious ideas.</i>
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>Offensive odors.</i>
queasy	Inducing a feeling of nausea. <i>The queasy swell of the boat.</i>
repellent	Incapable of absorbing or mixing with. <i>Water repellent nylon.</i>
repelling	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust.
repugnant	In conflict or incompatible with. <i>A by law must not be repugnant to the general law of the country.</i>
repulsive	Offensive to the mind. <i>A repulsive force.</i>
revulsion	A sense of disgust and loathing. <i>News of the attack will be met with sorrow and revulsion.</i>
stinking	Very bad. <i>A stinking cold.</i>
<u>unhealthy</u>	Not conducive to good health. <i>An unhealthy diet of fast foods.</i>
unsightly	Unpleasant to look at. <i>Unsightly billboards.</i>
unwholesome	Detrimental to physical or moral well-being. <i>The use of the living room as sleeping quarters led to unwholesome crowding.</i>
vile	Morally reprehensible. <i>Vile smells.</i>

wicked

Morally bad in principle or practice.
*A **wicked** and unscrupulous politician.*

worse

Changed for the worse in health or fitness.
*The small department was already stretched to the limit but **worse** was to follow.*
