**repulsive** Relating to repulsion between physical objects.

A **repulsive** smell.

revolting Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust.

**Revolting** food.

terrible Causing fear or dread or terror.

A **terrible** crime.

uninviting Neither attractive nor tempting.

The house was dark and **uninviting**.

vile Morally reprehensible.

He has a vile temper.

**nauseous** Affected with nausea; feeling inclined to vomit.

Nauseous offal.

noisome Having an extremely offensive smell.

**Noisome** vapours from the smouldering waste.

Harmful, poisonous, or very unpleasant.

noxious Noxious ideas.

offensive Morally offensive.

Offensive odors.

queasy Inducing a feeling of nausea.

repellent Incapable of absorbing or mixing with.

Water **repellent** nylon.

**repelling** Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust.

repugnant In conflict or incompatible with.

A by law must not be **repugnant** to the general law of the country.

repulsive Offensive to the mind. A repulsive force.

A repulsive joice.

revulsion A sense of disgust and loathing.

News of the attack will be met with sorrow and **revulsion**.

Very bad.

stinking A stinking cold.

unhealthy Not conducive to good health.

An **unhealthy** diet of fast foods.

**unsightly** Unpleasant to look at. *Unsightly* billboards.

Detrimental to physical or moral well-being.

**unwholesome** The use of the living room as sleeping quarters led to **unwholesome** 

crowding.

Morally reprehensible.

vile Vile smells.



Morally bad in principle or practice. A **wicked** and unscrupulous politician. wicked

Changed for the worse in health or fitness.

The small department was already stretched to the limit but **worse** was to **worse** 

follow.
