### Definitions of "Sickly" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “sickly” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Excessively sentimental or mawkish.*
- *(of a place or climate) causing or characterized by unhealthiness.*
- *Somewhat ill or prone to illness.*
- *Unhealthy looking.*
- *Often ill; in poor health.*
- *(of a flavour, smell, colour, etc.) unpleasant in a way that induces discomfort or nausea.*
- *(of a person's complexion or expression) indicative of poor health.*



## Synonyms of "Sickly" as an adjective (35 Words)

### [ailing](#)

Somewhat ill or prone to illness.

*I went to see my **ailing** mother.*

### [ashen](#)

(of a person's face) very pale with shock, fear, or illness.

*A face turned **ashen**.*

### [banal](#)

Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse.

*Songs with **banal** repeated words.*

### **bilious**

Suffering from or suggesting a liver disorder or gastric distress.

*A **bilious** attack.*

### **chronically ill**

Being long-lasting and recurrent or characterized by long suffering.

### **cloying**

Overly sweet.

*A romantic rather **cloying** story.*

### **colourless**

Dull or pale in hue.

*A **colourless** liquid.*

<b>distasteful</b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i><b>Distasteful</b> language.</i>
<b>in poor health</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>indisposed</b>	Strongly opposed. <i>Feeling a bit <b>indisposed</b> today.</i>
<b>lachrymose</b>	Showing sorrow. <i>She was pink eyed and <b>lachrymose</b>.</i>
<b>maudlin</b>	Self-pityingly or tearfully sentimental. <i>A bout of <b>maudlin</b> self pity.</i>
<b>mawkish</b>	Sentimental in an exaggerated or false way. <i>The <b>mawkish</b> smell of warm beer.</i>
<b>nauseating</b>	Causing or liable to cause a feeling of nausea or disgust; disgusting. <i>The stench was <b>nauseating</b>.</i>
<b>overemotional</b>	Having feelings that are too easily excited and displayed. <i>We re not an <b>overemotional</b> family.</i>
<u><b>pale</b></u>	Abnormally deficient in color as suggesting physical or emotional distress. <i>The late afternoon light coming through the el tracks fell in <b>pale</b> oblongs on the street.</i>
<b>pallid</b>	(of light) lacking in intensity or brightness; dim or feeble. <i>The <b>pallid</b> face of the invalid.</i>
<b>pasty</b>	Having the sticky properties of an adhesive. <i>He looked <b>pasty</b> and red eyed.</i>
<u><b>peaked</b></u>	Having or rising to a peak. <i>You look a little <b>peaked</b>.</i>
<u><b>poorly</b></u>	Somewhat ill or prone to illness. <i>She looked <b>poorly</b>.</i>
<u><b>saccharine</b></u>	Excessively sweet or sentimental. <i><b>Saccharine</b> music.</i>
<b>sallow</b>	Unhealthy looking. <i>His skin was <b>sallow</b> and pitted.</i>
<b>seedy</b>	Shabby and squalid. <i>She felt weak and <b>seedy</b>.</i>
<u><b>sentimental</b></u>	Given to or marked by sentiment or sentimentality. <i>She felt a <b>sentimental</b> attachment to the place creep over her.</i>
<u><b>sickening</b></u>	Causing great annoyance or disappointment. <i>A <b>sickening</b> stench.</i>

<b>sugary</b>	Resembling or coated in sugar. <i>Energy restoring <b>sugary</b> drinks.</i>
<b>syrupey</b>	With honey added. <i>A particularly <b>syrupey</b> moment from a corny film.</i>
<b>trite</b>	(of a remark or idea) lacking originality or freshness; dull on account of overuse. <i>The <b>trite</b> metaphor hard as nails.</i>
<b>unattractive</b>	Not appealing to the senses. <i>As <b>unattractive</b> as most mining regions.</i>
<b>under the weather</b>	Lower in rank, power, or authority.
<b>unhealthy</b>	Not in or exhibiting good health in body or mind. <i>An <b>unhealthy</b> obsession with fast cars.</i>
<b>unwell</b>	Somewhat ill or prone to illness. <i>Is <b>unwell</b> and can't come to work.</i>
<b>wan</b>	(of the sea) without lustre; dark and gloomy. <i>He gave a <b>wan</b> smile.</i>
<b>waxen</b>	Made of or covered with wax. <i>A canopy of <b>waxen</b> creamy blooms.</i>
<b>white</b>	Restricted to whites only. <i>Under segregation there were even <b>white</b> restrooms and <b>white</b> drinking fountains.</i>

- *His usual sickly pallor.*
- *She was a thin, sickly child.*
