- *A military operation in which enemy forces surround a town or building, cutting off essential supplies, with the aim of compelling those inside to surrender.*
- *The action of an armed force that surrounds a fortified place and isolates it while continuing to attack.*
- *A group of herons.*



## Synonyms of "Siege" as a noun (6 Words)

<b>beleaguering</b>	The action of an armed force that surrounds a fortified place and isolates it while continuing to attack.
<b>beleaguerment</b>	Aggressive pressure or intimidation. <i>An atmosphere of fear and <b>beleaguerment</b>.</i>
<b>besieging</b>	The action of an armed force that surrounds a fortified place and isolates it while continuing to attack.
<b>blockade</b>	Prevents access or progress. <i>They voted to lift the <b>blockade</b> of major railway junctions.</i>
<b>encirclement</b>	A war measure that isolates some area of importance to the enemy.
<b>military blockade</b>	The military forces of a nation.

Impose a blockade on.

*They voted to lift the **blockade** of major railway junctions.*

### **cantonment**

A permanent military station in British India.

Make a special move (no more than once in a game by each player) in which the king is transferred from its original square two squares along the back rank towards a rook on its corner square which is then transferred to the square passed over by the king.

*The crumbling stonework of a ruined **castle**.*

<b><u>citadel</u></b>	A meeting hall of the Salvation Army. <i><b>Citadels</b> of private economic power.</i>
<b><u>combat</u></b>	The act of fighting; any contest or struggle. <i>The Kurds are <b>combating</b> Iraqi troops in Northern Iraq.</i>
<b><u>commander</u></b>	A commissioned naval officer who ranks above a lieutenant commander and below a captain. <i>The <b>commander</b> of a paratroop regiment.</i>
<b>counterattack</b>	Make a counterattack.
<b><u>dungeon</u></b>	Imprison someone in a dungeon.
<b><u>fort</u></b>	A fortified military post where troops are stationed. <i>The city was guarded by a ring of <b>forts</b>.</i>
<b><u>fortress</u></b>	A person or thing not susceptible to outside influence or disturbance. <i>He had proved himself to be a <b>fortress</b> of moral rectitude.</i>
<b><u>garrison</u></b>	The building occupied by a garrison. <i>Forces from these <b>garrisons</b> have been used against governments.</i>
<b><u>imprison</u></b>	Confine as if in a prison. <i>He was <b>imprisoned</b> three times for his activities.</i>
<b><u>jail</u></b>	Put someone in jail. <i>The driver was <b>jailed</b> for two years.</i>
<b><u>legionary</u></b>	Of an ancient Roman legion. <i>The <b>legionary</b> fortress of Isca.</i>
<b><u>military</u></b>	The military forces of a nation. <i>The build up of <b>military</b> activity.</i>
<b><u>outpost</u></b>	A military post stationed at a distance from the main body of troops. <i>Troops in some <b>outposts</b> have surrendered.</i>
<b><u>prison</u></b>	A prisonlike situation a place of seeming confinement. <i>Both men were sent to <b>prison</b>.</i>
<b><u>protector</u></b>	A person who cares for persons or property. <i>A man who became her <b>protector</b> adviser and friend.</i>
<b><u>quest</u></b>	Express the need or desire for; ask for. <i>The <b>quest</b> for a reliable vaccine has intensified.</i>
<b><u>recapture</u></b>	The act of taking something back. <i>The programmes give viewers a chance to <b>recapture</b> their own childhoods.</i>
<b><u>soldier</u></b>	Serve as a soldier in the military. <i>The <b>soldiers</b> stood at attention.</i>

<b>sortie</b>	An attempt to participate in a new activity or sphere. <i>This latest book is the author's first <b>sortie</b> into non fiction.</i>
<b>stockade</b>	An enclosure bound by a stockade. <i>They fortified themselves strongly and <b>stockaded</b> the city.</i>
<b>strategic</b>	(of human or material resources) essential in fighting a war. <i><b>Strategic</b> withdrawal.</i>
<b><u>stronghold</u></b>	A place where a particular cause or belief is strongly defended or upheld. <i>A Labour <b>stronghold</b>.</i>
<b>tactic</b>	An action or strategy carefully planned to achieve a specific end. <i>Basic infantry <b>tactics</b> were taught by guest instructors.</i>
<b><u>warfare</u></b>	The waging of armed conflict against an enemy. <i>Diplomatic <b>warfare</b>.</i>
<b><u>warrior</u></b>	(especially in former times) a brave or experienced soldier or fighter. <i>The <b>warrior</b> heroes of ancient Greece.</i>
