## Associations of "Sigh of relief" (30 Words)

<b>angry</b>	(of the sea or sky) stormy, turbulent, or threatening. <i>I m <b>angry</b> that she didn t call me.</i>
<b>appeasing</b>	Intended to pacify by acceding to demands or granting concessions. <i>The <b>appeasing</b> concessions to the Nazis at Munich.</i>
<b>asleep</b>	Dead. <i>Were all <b>asleep</b> when the phone rang.</i>
<b>calming</b>	The act of appeasing (as by acceding to the demands of. Affording comfort or solace.
<b>comforting</b>	<i>We would like to thank our family and friends for their support and their <b>comforting</b> words.</i>
<b>conciliatory</b>	Intended to placate. <i>A <b>conciliatory</b> visit.</i>
<b>croak</b>	Of a person make a sound similar to a croak when speaking or laughing. <i>Thank you I <b>croaked</b>.</i>
<b>dormancy</b>	The state in which a plant is alive but not actively growing. <i>The volcano erupted after centuries of <b>dormancy</b>.</i>
<b>drowse</b>	Be sluggish or inactive. <i>Let not your prudence <b>drowse</b>.</i>
<b><u>drowsy</u></b>	Showing lack of attention or boredom. <i>A <b>drowsy</b> suburb called Surrey Hills.</i>
<b>exasperated</b>	Greatly annoyed; out of patience. <i>As the students exit an <b>exasperated</b> teacher tries in vain to get their attention.</i>
<b>exhausted</b>	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i><b>Exhausted</b> oil wells.</i>
<b>groan</b>	(of an object) make a low creaking sound when pressure or weight is applied. <i>Oh no I <b>groaned</b>.</i>

<b>growl</b>	The sound of growling as made by animals. <i>The dogs yapped and <b>growled</b> at his heels.</i>
<b>guttural</b>	A guttural consonant e g k g or other speech sound. <i>His parents <b>guttural</b> central European accent.</i>
<b>moan</b>	A sound resembling a human moan. <i>My friend always <b>moans</b> that I never make her a cake.</i>
<b>placating</b>	Intended to pacify by acceding to demands or granting concessions. <i><b>Placating</b> or placative gestures.</i>
<b>reassuring</b>	Serving or intended to remove someone's doubts or fears. <i>The news is very <b>reassuring</b>.</i>
<b>relaxation</b>	The exponential return of a system to equilibrium after a disturbance. <i>His favourite form of <b>relaxation</b> was reading detective novels.</i>
<b>repose</b>	The absence of mental stress or anxiety. <i>The diamond now <b>reposes</b> in the Louvre.</i>
<b>respite</b>	Grant a respite to someone especially a person condemned to death. <i>Some poor criminal from the gibbet or the wheel <b>respited</b> for a day.</i>
<b>rest</b>	Put something in a resting position as for support or steadying. <i>She was an actress but doing domestic work while she was <b>resting</b>.</i>
<b>shaking</b>	The act of causing something to move up and down (or back and forth) with quick movements. <i>The <b>shaking</b> of his fingers as he lit his pipe.</i>
<b>shriek</b>	A high-pitched piercing cry or sound; a scream. <i>She was <b>shrieking</b> abuse at a taxi.</i>
<b>sick</b>	People who are sick. <i>Mark felt <b>sick</b> with fear.</i>
<b>sickness</b>	The state of being ill. <i>Drugs have become a <b>sickness</b> they cannot cure.</i>
<b>soothing</b>	Affording physical relief. <i>She put on some <b>soothing</b> music.</i>
<b>tired</b>	Depleted of strength or energy. <i>Fisher rubbed his <b>tired</b> eyes.</i>
<b>tranquility</b>	An untroubled state; free from disturbances.
<b>wearied</b>	Exhausted.
