Signature as a Noun

Definitions of "Signature" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “signature” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The part of a medical prescription that gives instructions about the use of the medicine or drug prescribed.*
- *Your name written in your own handwriting.*
- *A melody used to identify a performer or a dance band or radio/tv program.*
- *A distinguishing style.*
- *A distinctive pattern, product, or characteristic by which someone or something can be identified.*
- *The action of signing a document.*
- *A printed sheet after being folded to form a group of pages.*
- *A letter or figure printed at the foot of one or more pages of each sheet of a book as a guide in binding.*
- *The sharps or flats that follow the clef and indicate the key.*
- *A person's name written in a distinctive way as a form of identification in authorizing a cheque or document or concluding a letter.*
- *A sheet with several pages printed on it; it folds to page size and is bound with other*

signatures to form a book.



Synonyms of "Signature" as a noun (14 Words)

- address** A binary number that identifies a particular location in a data storage system or computer memory.
*He failed in his manner of **address** to the captain.*
- autograph** A person's own signature.
*Fans surged around the car asking for **autographs**.*
- cross** A staff surmounted by a cross carried in religious processions and on ceremonial occasions before an archbishop.
*A mule is a **cross** between a horse and a donkey.*
- dedication** A short message (as in a book or musical work or on a photograph) dedicating it to someone or something.
*His **dedication** to his duties.*

<u>imprint</u>	A brand name under which books are published, typically the name of a former publishing house that is now part of a larger group. <i>The group will continue to market its products through its established imprints.</i>
initials	The first letter of a word (especially a person's name). <i>He refused to put the initials FRS after his name.</i>
key signature	United States lawyer and poet who wrote a poem after witnessing the British attack on Baltimore during the War of 1812; the poem was later set to music and entitled 'The Star-Spangled Banner' (1779-1843).
message	A communication from a prophet or preacher, believed to be inspired by God. <i>He would run those interminable messages after school to the bookie.</i>
scribble	An aimless drawing. <i>The postman would never be able to decipher your scribble.</i>
signature tune	A distinguishing style.
squiggle	An illegible scrawl. <i>His signature was just a squiggle but only he could make that squiggle.</i>
theme song	Melodic subject of a musical composition.
touch	An act of touching someone or something. <i>Later he showed a surer political touch.</i>
x	Street names for methylenedioxymethamphetamine.

accede	Assume an office or position. <i>By now John had died and Henry III had acceded.</i>
acquiescence	The reluctant acceptance of something without protest. <i>A murmur of acquiescence from the assembly.</i>
assent	The expression of approval or agreement. <i>The Maestro assented to the request for an encore.</i>
autograph	A signature, especially that of a celebrity written as a memento for an admirer. <i>The whole team autographed a shirt for him.</i>
brand	A brand name. <i>We ll have the ability to market and brand our own product.</i>
caret	A mark (^, □) placed below the line to indicate a proposed insertion in a text.

<u>celebrity</u>	The state of being well known. <i>He was a baseball celebrity.</i>
<u>consent</u>	Agree to do something. <i>No change may be made without the consent of all the partners.</i>
<u>cursive</u>	Rapid handwriting in which letters are set down in full and are cursively connected within words without lifting the writing implement from the paper. <i>This style of writing began to compete with Gothic cursive.</i>
<u>dignitary</u>	A person considered to be important because of high rank or office. <i>I presented bouquets to visiting dignitaries at my prep school.</i>
<u>emblazon</u>	Depict (a heraldic device) on something. <i>T shirts emblazoned with the names of baseball teams.</i>
<u>emblem</u>	Special design or visual object representing a quality, type, group, etc. <i>Our child would be a dazzling emblem of our love.</i>
<u>eminence</u>	High status importance owing to marked superiority. <i>A scholar of great eminence.</i>
<u>enroll</u>	Register formally as a participant or member.
<u>enter</u>	Set out on an enterprise or subject of study. <i>The horse was entered in the Martell Cup at Aintree.</i>
<u>handwriting</u>	Writing with a pen or pencil. <i>She recognized his handwriting.</i>
<u>inscribe</u>	Mark with one's signature. <i>A regular polygon inscribed in a circle.</i>
<u>logo</u>	A symbol or other small design adopted by an organization to identify its products, uniform, vehicles, etc. <i>The Olympic logo was emblazoned across the tracksuits.</i>
<u>mascot</u>	A character, animal or object that is adopted by a team or group as a symbolic figure. <i>The team's dolphin mascot.</i>
<u>memorandum</u>	A written proposal or reminder. <i>The two countries signed a memorandum of understanding on economic cooperation.</i>
<u>name</u>	Give a name to. <i>She was named Head of the Committee.</i>
<u>prominence</u>	The state of being important, famous, or noticeable. <i>Radiographs showed enlargement of the right heart with prominence of the pulmonary outflow tract.</i>

renown	The state or quality of being widely honored and acclaimed. <i>Authors of great renown.</i>
represent	Be a delegate or spokesperson for represent somebody's interest or be a proxy or substitute for as of politicians and office holders representing their constituents or of a tenant representing other tenants in a housing dispute. <i>The flower represents a young girl.</i>
scribble	An aimless drawing. <i>He took the clipboard and scribbled something illegible.</i>
slogan	A motto associated with a political party or movement or other group. <i>Students were chanting slogans.</i>
<u>symbolic</u>	Significant purely in terms of what is being represented or implied. <i>Symbolic operations.</i>
<u>trademark</u>	Mark with a brand or trademark. <i>She filed a request with the government to trademark her company's name.</i>
<u>write</u>	Underwrite an insurance policy. <i>Thank you and goodbye I'll write soon.</i>
<u>yes</u>	An affirmative. <i>I was hoping for a yes.</i>
