| <u>asterisk</u> | Mark with an asterisk. <i>He had asterisked the things about the case that still bothered him.</i> |
| bespeak | Order or reserve (something) in advance. <i>The defendant's insurers took steps to bespeak his medical records.</i> |
| cue | Give a cue to or for. <i>Have a list of needs and questions on paper to cue you.</i> |
| denotation | The action of indicating or referring to something by means of a word, symbol, etc. <i>Beyond their immediate denotation the words have a connotative power.</i> |
| <u>denote</u> | Have as a meaning. <i>Multi denotes many.</i> |
| express | Give expression to. <i>An express shipment.</i> |

| <u>index</u> | Record names subjects etc in an index. <i>Data sets are indexed by subject.</i> |
| indicant | A number or ratio (a value on a scale of measurement) derived from a series of observed facts; can reveal relative changes as a function of time. <i>Symptoms are the prime indicants of disease.</i> |
| indicate | Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>His tone indicated that he didn't hold out much hope.</i> |
| indication | Something that serves to indicate or suggest. <i>The presence of bacterial infection was an indication for the use of antibiotics.</i> |
| <u>insinuate</u> | Introduce or insert (oneself) in a subtle manner. <i>He insinuated himself into the king's confidence.</i> |

| <u>intend</u> | Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>What do his words intend.</i> |
| <u>logo</u> | A symbol or other small design adopted by an organization to identify its products, uniform, vehicles, etc. <i>The Olympic logo was emblazoned across the tracksuits.</i> |
| <u>manifestation</u> | A manifest indication of the existence or presence or nature of some person or thing. <i>A characteristic manifestation of Lyme disease.</i> |
| mean | Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>The proposals are likely to mean another hundred closures.</i> |
| overtone | A harmonic with a frequency that is a multiple of the fundamental frequency. <i>The decision may have political overtones.</i> |
| portend | Be a sign or warning that (something, especially something momentous or calamitous) is likely to happen. <i>The eclipses portend some major events.</i> |
| represent | Be representative or typical for. <i>We cannot represent this knowledge to our formal reason.</i> |
| sign | Authorize a document or other written or printed material by attaching a signature. <i>Things haven't changed since I signed in the summer.</i> |
| signal | Be a signal for or a symptom of. <i>The firing of the gun was the signal for a chain of beacons to be lit.</i> |
| specifier | Someone who draws up specifications giving details (as for obtaining a patent). |
| <u>symbol</u> | Symbolize. <i>The Star of David the Jewish symbol.</i> |
| <u>symbolic</u> | Significant purely in terms of what is being represented or implied. <i>A repeating design symbolic of eternity.</i> |
| symptom | Anything that accompanies X and is regarded as an indication of X's existence. <i>The government was plagued by leaks a symptom of divisions and poor morale.</i> |
| zodiac | A representation of the signs of the zodiac or of a similar astrological system. |
