## **Simplistic as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Simplistic" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “simplistic” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Characterized by extreme and often misleading simplicity.*
- *Treating complex issues and problems as if they were much simpler than they really are.*



## Synonyms of "Simplistic" as an adjective (6 Words)

**black and white** Without cream or sugar.

**facile** (of a person) having a superficial or simplistic knowledge or approach.  
*A **facile** hand.*

**oversimple** Lacking sophistication and subtlety.  
*An **oversimple** theory of human nature.*

**oversimplified** Simplified to such an extent that a distorted impression is given.  
*An **oversimplified** view of human personality.*

**schematic** (of thought, ideas, etc.) simplistic or formulaic in character.  
***Schematic** diagrams.*

**superficial** Not thorough, deep, or complete; cursory.  
*Only **superficial** differences.*

## Associations of "Simplistic" (30 Words)

<b>artless</b>	Lacking art or knowledge. <i>An <b>artless</b> literary masterpiece.</i>
<b>banal</b>	So lacking in originality as to be obvious and boring. <i>Songs with <b>banal</b> repeated words.</i>
<b>banality</b>	The fact or condition of being banal; unoriginality. <i>There is an essential <b>banality</b> to the story he tells.</i>
<b>boring</b>	Not interesting; tedious. <i>I've got a <b>boring</b> job in an office.</i>

<b>bromide</b>	A reproduction or piece of typesetting on bromide paper. <i>Feel good <b>bromides</b> create the illusion of problem solving.</i>
<b><u>cliche</u></b>	A trite or obvious remark.
<b>commonplace</b>	A notable passage in a work copied into a commonplace book. <i>His remarks were trite and <b>commonplace</b>.</i>
<b><u>crude</u></b>	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>The ship was carrying 80 000 tonnes of <b>crude</b>.</i>
<b><u>dichotomy</u></b>	A division or contrast between two things that are or are represented as being opposed or entirely different. <i>The <b>dichotomy</b> between eastern and western culture.</i>
<b>easy</b>	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>We all scared real <b>easy</b> in those days.</i>
<b>gauche</b>	Lacking social polish. <i>Too <b>gauche</b> to leave the room when the conversation became intimate.</i>
<b><u>generalization</u></b>	Transfer of a response learned to one stimulus to a similar stimulus. <i>He was making sweeping <b>generalizations</b>.</i>
<b>hackneyed</b>	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i><b>Hackneyed</b> old sayings.</i>
<b>median</b>	Denoting the middle term or mean of the middle two terms of a series arranged in order of magnitude For example the median number of the series 55 62 76 85 93 is 76. <i>The <b>median</b> income for the year was 15 000.</i>
<b>mediocrity</b>	A person of second-rate ability or value. <i>The team suddenly came good after years of <b>mediocrity</b>.</i>
<b><u>monotony</u></b>	Sameness of pitch or tone in a sound or utterance. <i>Depression flattens the voice almost to <b>monotony</b>.</i>
<b>ordinary</b>	Not exceptional in any way especially in quality or ability or size or degree. <i>It was just an <b>ordinary</b> evening.</i>
<b><u>overcome</u></b>	Overcome usually through no fault or weakness of the person that is overcome. <i>She was obviously <b>overcome</b> with excitement.</i>
<b><u>platitude</u></b>	A remark or statement, especially one with a moral content, that has been used too often to be interesting or thoughtful. <i>She began uttering liberal <b>platitudes</b>.</i>
<b><u>rural</u></b>	Living in or characteristic of farming or country life. <i>Unpaved <b>rural</b> roads.</i>

<b><u>rustic</u></b>	Characteristic of rural life. <i><b>Rustic</b> stone walls.</i>
<b>shopworn</b>	Worn or faded from being on display in a store. <i><b>Shopworn</b> merchandise at half price.</i>
<b>simple</b>	Of very low intelligence. <i>Camcorders are now so <b>simple</b> to operate.</i>
<b>timeworn</b>	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>Parroting some <b>timeworn</b> axiom.</i>
<b><u>too</u></b>	Very. <i><b>Too</b> big.</i>
<b><u>trite</u></b>	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>This point may now seem obvious and <b>trite</b>.</i>
<b>unexceptional</b>	Not special in any way. <i>An <b>unexceptional</b> movie.</i>
<b><u>unremarkable</u></b>	Not particularly interesting or surprising. <i>An <b>unremarkable</b> house.</i>
<b><u>unsophisticated</u></b>	Lacking refined worldly knowledge or tastes. <i>An <b>unsophisticated</b> young man.</i>
<b>untutored</b>	Lacking in schooling. <i>The species are all much the same to the <b>untutored</b> eye.</i>
