



apologetic Constituting a formal defence or justification of a theory or doctrine.

I ll never **forgive** David for the way he treated her.

Culpable of or responsible for a specified wrongdoing.

guilty

indiscretion Behaviour or speech that is indiscreet or displays a lack of good judgement.

misdeed A wicked or illegal act.

penance Impose a penance on.

He had done public **penance** for those hasty words.

The action of feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong;

penitence repentance.

A public display of **penitence**.

penitent Feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentant.

A **penitent** expression.

penitential Relating to or expressing penitence or penance.

Penitential tears.

regret Express with regret.

He wrote a note expressing his regret.

Feeling or expressing regret or sorrow or a sense of loss over something

regretful done or undone.

He sounded **regretful** but pointed out that he had committed himself.

remorse Deep regret or guilt for a wrong committed.

They were filled with **remorse** and shame.

remorseful Filled with remorse; sorry.

The defendant was **remorseful** for what he had done.

Feel remorse for; feel sorry for; be contrite about.

The action of repenting; sincere regret or remorse.

repentance Each person who turns to God in genuine **repentance** and faith will be

saved.

repentant Expressing or feeling sincere regret and remorse; remorseful.

He is truly **repentant** for his incredible naivety and stupidity.

rue Sadness associated with some wrong done or some disappointment.

Ferguson will **rue** the day he turned down that offer.

Feeling or expressing pain or sorrow for sins or offenses.

rueful

She gave a rueful grin.

The state of being saved or preserved from harm.

The Christian gospel of **salvation** for all mankind.

A person who transgresses against divine law by committing an immoral act

sinner or acts.

God forgives repentant sinners.
