### Definitions of "Sincere" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “sincere” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Characterized by a firm and humorless belief in the validity of your opinions.*
- *(of a person) saying what they genuinely feel or believe; not dishonest or hypocritical.*
- *Free from pretence or deceit; proceeding from genuine feelings.*
- *Open and genuine; not deceitful.*



## Synonyms of "Sincere" as an adjective (15 Words)

**candid**

Truthful and straightforward; frank.  
*I gave them my **candid** opinion.*

**deep**

Relatively deep or strong affecting one deeply.  
*A **deep** analysis.*

**direct**

Moving from west to east on the celestial sphere or for planets around the sun in the same direction as the Earth.  
*A **direct** descendant of the king.*

**earnest**

Earnest.  
*Two girls were in **earnest** conversation.*

**frank**

Open, honest, and direct in speech or writing, especially when dealing with unpalatable matters.  
***Frank** enjoyment.*

<b><u>genuine</u></b>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something. <b><i>Genuine</i></b> leather.
<b>heartfelt</b>	(of a feeling or its expression) deeply and strongly felt; sincere. <b><i>Heartfelt</i></b> condolences.
<b><u>honest</u></b>	Worthy of being depended on. <i>Worked at an <b>honest</b> trade.</i>
<b>meaning what one says</b>	Rich in significance or implication.
<b>profound</b>	Situated at or extending to great depth; too deep to have been sounded or plumbed. <i>The differences are <b>profound</b>.</i>
<b><u>solemn</u></b>	Characterized by deep sincerity. <i>The judge was <b>solemn</b> as he pronounced sentence.</i>
<b><u>straightforward</u></b>	Free from ambiguity. <i>A <b>straightforward</b> young man.</i>
<b>truthful</b>	Expressing or given to expressing the truth. <i>I think you re confusing being rude with being <b>truthful</b>.</i>
<b>unhypocritical</b>	Free from pretence; sincere. <i>An <b>unhypocritical</b> and honest person.</i>
<b>wholehearted</b>	Showing or characterized by complete sincerity and commitment. <i>You have my <b>wholehearted</b> support.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Sincere" as an adjective

- *They offer their sincere thanks to Paul.*

<b>apology</b>	A formal expression of regret at being unable to attend a meeting or social function. <i>It was an <b>apology</b> for a meal.</i>
<b>artless</b>	Lacking art or knowledge. <i>An <b>artless</b> literary masterpiece.</i>
<b>authenticity</b>	Undisputed credibility. <i>The paper should have established the <b>authenticity</b> of the documents before publishing them.</i>
<b>bluntly</b>	In an uncompromisingly forthright way. <i>A colleague <b>bluntly</b> told him that he had no business asking for the status report.</i>
<b><u>candid</u></b>	Characterized by directness in manner or speech; without subtlety or evasion. <i>A <b>candid</b> interview.</i>

<b>candor</b>	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
<b>candour</b>	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech. <i>A man of refreshing <b>candour</b>.</i>
<b>directness</b>	The quality of proceeding in a straight line without deflection. <i>I like the simplicity and <b>directness</b> of the image.</i>
<b>downright</b>	Complete and without restriction or qualification; sometimes used informally as intensifiers. <i>Her common sense and <b>downright</b> attitude to life surprised him.</i>
<b>earnest</b>	Earnest. <i>Two girls were in <b>earnest</b> conversation.</i>
<b>forthright</b>	Immediately. <i>Spoke <b>forthright</b> or <b>forthrightly</b> and to the point.</i>
<b>frank</b>	Open, honest, and direct in speech or writing, especially when dealing with unpalatable matters. <i>Kate looked at Sam with <b>frank</b> admiration.</i>
<b>genuine</b>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something G K Chesterton. <i><b>Genuine</b> 24 carat gold.</i>
<b>heartfelt</b>	Sincerely earnest. <i>Our <b>heartfelt</b> thanks.</i>
<b>honest</b>	Simple, unpretentious, and unsophisticated. <i>An <b>honest</b> working stiff.</i>
<b>honesty</b>	A European plant with purple or white flowers and round, flat, translucent seed pods which are used for indoor flower arrangements. <i>It was not in all <b>honesty</b> an auspicious debut.</i>
<b>ingenuous</b>	Lacking in sophistication or worldliness. <i>He eyed her with wide <b>ingenuous</b> eyes.</i>
<b>integrity</b>	The state of being whole and undivided. <i>The structural <b>integrity</b> of the novel.</i>
<b>openness</b>	Lack of secrecy or concealment; frankness. <i>The <b>openness</b> of the internet makes public debate more possible.</i>
<b>outspoken</b>	Characterized by directness in manner or speech; without subtlety or evasion. <i>It is possible to be <b>outspoken</b> without being rude.</i>
<b>plainspoken</b>	Characterized by directness in manner or speech; without subtlety or evasion. <i>A <b>plainspoken</b> country doctor.</i>

<b><u>seriousness</u></b>	The trait of being serious. <i>We are aware of the <b>seriousness</b> of the situation.</i>
<b><u>sincerity</u></b>	The trait of being serious- Robert Rice. <i>The simple <b>sincerity</b> of folk songs.</i>
<b>straightness</b>	Lack of a tendency to curl.
<b>truthful</b>	Expressing or given to expressing the truth. <i>I think you re confusing being rude with being <b>truthful</b>.</i>
<b><u>truthfulness</u></b>	The fact of being true; truth. <i>The <b>truthfulness</b> of her playing of an ageing American spinster.</i>
<b>unpretentious</b>	Not attempting to impress others with an appearance of greater importance, talent, or culture than is actually possessed. <i>An <b>unpretentious</b> country church.</i>
<b>veracious</b>	Habitually speaking the truth. <i>A <b>veracious</b> account.</i>
<b><u>veracity</u></b>	Conformity to facts; accuracy. <i>Voters should be concerned about his <b>veracity</b> and character.</i>
<b>wholehearted</b>	Showing or characterized by complete sincerity and commitment. <i>You have my <b>wholehearted</b> support.</i>
