earnestness	Something of value given by one person to another to bind a contract. <i>The deadly earnestness of the conversation.</i>
genuineness	The quality of truly being what something is said to be; authenticity. <i>So many have been touched by her genuineness her indomitable spirit and her love.</i>
good faith	That which is pleasing or valuable or useful.
<u>honesty</u>	Southeastern European plant cultivated for its fragrant purplish flowers and round flat papery silver-white seedpods that are used for indoor decoration. <i>I bought potatoes and tomatoes from the roadside stall putting 3 in the honesty box.</i>
integrity	The quality of being honest and having strong moral principles. <i>A gentleman of complete integrity.</i>

lack of deceit	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
probity	The quality of having strong moral principles; honesty and decency. <i>He enjoys an exaggerated reputation for probity.</i>
serious-mindedness	The trait of being serious- Robert Rice.
<u>seriousness</u>	The trait of being serious- Robert Rice. <i>We are aware of the seriousness of the situation.</i>
trustworthiness	The trait of deserving trust and confidence. <i>Reliability and trustworthiness are important assets in politics.</i>
<u>truthfulness</u>	The fact of being true; truth. <i>The truthfulness of her playing of an ageing American spinster.</i>
unassumingness	A quality of naturalness and simplicity.



Usage Examples of "Sincerity" as a noun

- accuracy** (mathematics) the number of significant figures given in a number.
*The atomic clock enabled scientists to measure time with much greater **accuracy**.*
- authenticity** The quality of being authentic.
*The paper should have established the **authenticity** of the documents before publishing them.*
- candid** (of a photograph of a person) taken informally, especially without the subject's knowledge.
*A **candid** interview.*
- candor** The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
*Ability to make judgments free from discrimination or dishonesty.
*A man of refreshing **candor**.**

decency	The quality of being polite and respectable. <i>A loose dress rather too low cut for decency.</i>
directness	The quality of being plain and straightforward. <i>I like the simplicity and directness of the image.</i>
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful. <i>Faithfulness in marriage.</i>
fidelity	Faithfulness to a person, cause, or belief, demonstrated by continuing loyalty and support. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable fidelity.</i>
forthrightness	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
frank	A member of the ancient Germanic peoples who spread from the Rhine into the Roman Empire in the 4th century. <i>Kate looked at Sam with frank admiration.</i>
<u>genuine</u>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something G K Chesterton. <i>A genuine attempt to put things right.</i>
guileless	Devoid of guile; innocent and without deception. <i>His face once so open and guileless.</i>
<u>honest</u>	Gained or earned without cheating or stealing. <i>Gave honest answers.</i>
<u>honesty</u>	A European plant with purple or white flowers and round, flat, translucent seed pods which are used for indoor flower arrangements. <i>They spoke with convincing honesty about their fears.</i>
integrity	The condition of being unified or sound in construction. <i>Integrity checking.</i>
naivete	Lack of experience, wisdom, or judgement; naivety. <i>His greatest fault was his political naïvet.</i>
<u>openness</u>	Lack of secrecy or concealment; frankness. <i>It is the openness to possibilities that creates great research.</i>
probity	The quality of having strong moral principles; honesty and decency. <i>Financial probity.</i>
rectitude	Morally correct behaviour or thinking; righteousness. <i>Mattie is a model of rectitude.</i>
righteousness	Adhering to moral principles. <i>We had little doubt about the righteousness of our cause.</i>
<u>seriousness</u>	The trait of being serious. <i>A lack of solemnity is not necessarily a lack of seriousness.</i>

sincere Characterized by a firm and humorless belief in the validity of your opinions.

*Felt **sincere** regret that they were leaving.*

straightness Trueness of course toward a goal.

transparency Picture consisting of a positive photograph or drawing on a transparent base; viewed with a projector.

*The **transparency** of ice.*

truthful Telling or expressing the truth; honest.

*I think you re confusing being rude with being **truthful**.*

truthfulness The fact of being true; truth.

*The **truthfulness** of her playing of an ageing American spinster.*

uprightness The property of being upright in posture.

*Steadying himself he slowly managed to achieve a state of relative **uprightness**.*

veracity Unwillingness to tell lies.

*Voters should be concerned about his **veracity** and character.*

wholehearted With unconditional and enthusiastic devotion.

*You have my **wholehearted** support.*
