<b>genuineness</b>	The quality of truly being what something is said to be; authenticity. <i>So many have been touched by her <b>genuineness</b> her indomitable spirit and her love.</i>
<b>good faith</b>	That which is pleasing or valuable or useful.
<b><u>honesty</u></b>	Southeastern European plant cultivated for its fragrant purplish flowers and round flat papery silver-white seedpods that are used for indoor decoration. <i>I bought potatoes and tomatoes from the roadside stall putting 3 in the <b>honesty</b> box.</i>
<b>integrity</b>	The quality of being honest and having strong moral principles. <i>A gentleman of complete <b>integrity</b>.</i>

<b>lack of deceit</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>probity</b>	The quality of having strong moral principles; honesty and decency. <i>He enjoys an exaggerated reputation for <b>probity</b>.</i>
<b>serious-mindedness</b>	The trait of being serious- Robert Rice.
<u><a href="#">seriousness</a></u>	The trait of being serious- Robert Rice. <i>We are aware of the <b>seriousness</b> of the situation.</i>
<b>trustworthiness</b>	The trait of deserving trust and confidence. <i>Reliability and <b>trustworthiness</b> are important assets in politics.</i>
<u><a href="#">truthfulness</a></u>	The fact of being true; truth. <i>The <b>truthfulness</b> of her playing of an ageing American spinster.</i>
<b>unassumingness</b>	A quality of naturalness and simplicity.

- candid** (of a photograph of a person) taken informally, especially without the subject's knowledge.  
*A **candid** interview.*
- candor** The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.  
*Ability to make judgments free from discrimination or dishonesty.  
*A man of refreshing **candour**.**

<b>decency</b>	The quality of being polite and respectable. <i>A loose dress rather too low cut for <b>decency</b>.</i>
<b>directness</b>	The quality of being plain and straightforward. <i>I like the simplicity and <b>directness</b> of the image.</i>
<b>faithfulness</b>	The quality of being faithful. <i><b>Faithfulness</b> in marriage.</i>
<b>fidelity</b>	Faithfulness to a person, cause, or belief, demonstrated by continuing loyalty and support. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable <b>fidelity</b>.</i>
<b>forthrightness</b>	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
<b>frank</b>	A member of the ancient Germanic peoples who spread from the Rhine into the Roman Empire in the 4th century. <i>Kate looked at Sam with <b>frank</b> admiration.</i>
<b><u>genuine</u></b>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something G K Chesterton. <i>A <b>genuine</b> attempt to put things right.</i>
<b>guileless</b>	Devoid of guile; innocent and without deception. <i>His face once so open and <b>guileless</b>.</i>
<b><u>honest</u></b>	Gained or earned without cheating or stealing. <i>Gave <b>honest</b> answers.</i>
<b><u>honesty</u></b>	A European plant with purple or white flowers and round, flat, translucent seed pods which are used for indoor flower arrangements. <i>They spoke with convincing <b>honesty</b> about their fears.</i>
<b>integrity</b>	The condition of being unified or sound in construction. <i><b>Integrity</b> checking.</i>
<b>naivete</b>	Lack of experience, wisdom, or judgement; naivety. <i>His greatest fault was his political naïvet.</i>
<b><u>openness</u></b>	Lack of secrecy or concealment; frankness. <i>It is the <b>openness</b> to possibilities that creates great research.</i>
<b>probity</b>	The quality of having strong moral principles; honesty and decency. <i>Financial <b>probity</b>.</i>
<b>rectitude</b>	Morally correct behaviour or thinking; righteousness. <i>Mattie is a model of <b>rectitude</b>.</i>
<b>righteousness</b>	Adhering to moral principles. <i>We had little doubt about the <b>righteousness</b> of our cause.</i>
<b><u>seriousness</u></b>	The trait of being serious. <i>A lack of solemnity is not necessarily a lack of <b>seriousness</b>.</i>

<b><u>sincere</u></b>	Characterized by a firm and humorless belief in the validity of your opinions. <i>Felt <b>sincere</b> regret that they were leaving.</i>
<b>straightness</b>	Trueness of course toward a goal.
<b>transparency</b>	Picture consisting of a positive photograph or drawing on a transparent base; viewed with a projector. <i>The <b>transparency</b> of ice.</i>
<b>truthful</b>	Telling or expressing the truth; honest. <i>I think you re confusing being rude with being <b>truthful</b>.</i>
<b><u>truthfulness</u></b>	The fact of being true; truth. <i>The <b>truthfulness</b> of her playing of an ageing American spinster.</i>
<b>uprightness</b>	The property of being upright in posture. <i>Steadying himself he slowly managed to achieve a state of relative <b>uprightness</b>.</i>
<b><u>veracity</u></b>	Unwillingness to tell lies. <i>Voters should be concerned about his <b>veracity</b> and character.</i>
<b>wholehearted</b>	With unconditional and enthusiastic devotion. <i>You have my <b>wholehearted</b> support.</i>
