<b>isaac bashevis singer</b>	United States writer (born in Poland) of Yiddish stories and novels (1904-1991).
<b>isaac m. singer</b>	United States writer (born in Poland) of Yiddish stories and novels (1904-1991).
<b>isaac meritt singer</b>	United States inventor of an improved chain-stitch sewing machine (1811-1875).
<b>soloist</b>	A musician who performs a solo. <i>He appears as a concerto <b>soloist</b> with all the great British orchestras.</i>
<b>songster</b>	A songbird. <i>Robins are the most commonly heard <b>songsters</b>.</i>
<b>songstress</b>	A female songster.
<b>vocaliser</b>	A person who sings.

**vocalist**

A singer, typically one who regularly performs with a jazz or pop group.

**vocalizer**

An organism that can utter vocal sounds.

*Is the giraffe a **vocalizer**.*



**Usage Examples of "Singer" as a noun**

- *A pop singer.*



## Associations of "Singer" (30 Words)

### acting

The art or occupation of performing fictional roles in plays, films, or television.

*She studied **acting** in New York.*

### actor

A person whose profession is acting on the stage, in films, or on television.

*In war one must be a good **actor**.*

### artist

A person who creates paintings or drawings as a profession or hobby.

*Rip off **artists**.*

### audition

Assess the suitability of someone for a role by means of an audition.

*I **auditioned** and was lucky enough to get the part.*

### ballet

A creative work or performance of ballet or the music written for it.

*The Bolshoi **Ballet**.*

### blues

A piece of blues music.

***Blues** has always had a strong following in Australia.*

### casting

The act of creating something by casting it in a mold.

*Bronze **castings**.*

<b>comedian</b>	A comic actor or playwright. <i>A stand up <b>comedian</b>.</i>
<b>composer</b>	Someone who composes music as a profession. <i>Mozart was her favourite <b>composer</b>.</i>
<b>contestant</b>	A person who participates in competitions. <i>An anxious <b>contestant</b> on a television quiz show.</i>
<b>disco</b>	Popular dance music especially in the late 1970s melodic with a regular bass beat intended mainly for dancing at discotheques. <i>No one knows how to waltz so I've ordered a <b>disco</b>.</i>
<u><b>diva</b></u>	A celebrated female opera singer. <i>A pop <b>diva</b>.</i>
<b>entertainer</b>	A person who tries to please or amuse. <i>Street <b>entertainers</b>.</i>
<b>guitar</b>	A stringed instrument usually having six strings; played by strumming or plucking.
<b>instrumentalist</b>	Of or in terms of instrumentalism. <i>An <b>instrumentalist</b> account of the liberal state.</i>
<b>lyricist</b>	A person who writes the words for songs.
<b>music</b>	Musical activity singing or whistling etc. <i>Tony learned to read <b>music</b>.</i>
<u><b>musician</b></u>	A person who plays a musical instrument, especially as a profession, or is musically talented. <i>Your father was a fine <b>musician</b>.</i>
<b>musicologist</b>	An expert in or student of music as an academic subject, as opposed to someone trained in performance or composition.
<b>opera</b>	Operas as a genre of classical music. <i>It was the best performance of the <b>opera</b> he had ever heard.</i>
<b>performance</b>	An act of performing a dramatic role, song, or piece of music. <i>The play ran for 100 <b>performances</b>.</i>
<b>performer</b>	An entertainer who performs a dramatic or musical work for an audience. <i>A circus <b>performer</b>.</i>
<b>pianist</b>	A person who plays the piano.

<b>piano</b>	<p>A large keyboard musical instrument with a wooden case enclosing a soundboard and metal strings, which are struck by hammers when the keys are depressed. The strings' vibration is stopped by dampers when the keys are released and can be regulated for length and volume by two or three pedals.</p> <p>The <b>piano</b> passages in the composition.</p>
<b>pop</b>	<p>Of a person's ears make a small popping sound within the head as pressure is equalized typically because of a change of altitude.</p> <p>This <b>popcorn</b> <b>pops</b> quickly in the microwave oven.</p>
<b>repertoire</b>	<p>A stock of skills or types of behaviour that a person habitually uses.</p> <p>His <b>repertoire</b> of denigratory gestures.</p>
<b>role</b>	<p>The function assumed or part played by a person or thing in a particular situation.</p> <p>Play its <b>role</b>.</p>
<b>understudy</b>	<p>Study a role or actor as an understudy.</p> <p>He has played as <b>understudy</b> to Celtic's usual goalkeeper.</p>
<b>violinist</b>	<p>A person who plays the violin.</p> <p>The most renowned virtuoso <b>violinist</b> of his time.</p>
<b>woodwind</b>	<p>Wind instruments other than brass instruments forming a section of an orchestra, including flutes, oboes, clarinets, and bassoons.</p> <p>Striking passages for <b>woodwind</b> and brass.</p>
