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| alone | Isolated from others. <i>She is alone much of the time.</i> |
| apart | No longer living together or close emotionally. <i>Two stone gateposts some thirty feet apart.</i> |
| detached | Aloof and objective. <i>Detached houses.</i> |
| forlorn | Marked by or showing hopelessness. <i>Forlorn figures at bus stops.</i> |
| hermit | A hummingbird found in the shady lower layers of tropical forests, foraging along a regular route. |
| homesick | Experiencing a longing for one’s home during a period of absence from it. <i>He was homesick for America after five weeks in Europe.</i> |
| isolate | A person or thing that has been or become isolated. <i>The best way to isolate sick fish is to set up a hospital tank.</i> |
| isolated | Single; exceptional. <i>Isolated instances of rebellion.</i> |
| isolation | Denoting a hospital or ward for patients with infectious diseases. <i>He opposed a policy of American isolation.</i> |
| lone | (of a place) unfrequented and remote. <i>I approached a lone drinker across the bar.</i> |
| lonely | Lacking companions or companionship. <i>A lonely country lane.</i> |
| lonesome | Marked by dejection from being alone. <i>A lonesome pine.</i> |
| outsider | A person who is not accepted by or who isolates themselves from society. <i>She felt that his friends despised her as an outsider.</i> |

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| privacy | The state of being free from public attention. <i>A law to restrict newspapers freedom to invade people s privacy.</i> |
| recluse | One who lives in solitude. <i>He s a bit of a recluse.</i> |
| remote | A remote control device. <i>Remote stars.</i> |
| seclude | Keep (someone) away from other people. <i>I secluded myself up here for a life of study and meditation.</i> |
| secluded | Hidden from general view or use. <i>The gardens are quiet and secluded.</i> |
| seclusion | The act of secluding yourself from others. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and seclusion.</i> |
| separated | Separated at the joint. <i>A separated shoulder.</i> |
| sequester | Requisition forcibly, as of enemy property. <i>He sequestered himself in his study to write a book.</i> |
| sole | Put a new sole on to a shoe. <i>A big blister on each heel and sole.</i> |
| solitary | (of a flower or other part) borne singly. <i>A solitary traveler.</i> |
| times | An arithmetic operation that is the inverse of division; the product of two numbers is computed. <i>You times the six by four to get twenty four.</i> |
| troglydte | One who lives in solitude. |
| unappreciated | Not likely to be rewarded. <i>She had been brought up in a family where she felt unappreciated and undervalued.</i> |
| uniquely | So as to be unique. <i>Uniquely shaped buildings.</i> |
| unrewarding | Not rewarding or satisfying. <i>It was dull unrewarding work.</i> |
| unshared | Not shared. <i>Most of those placed in hostels would prefer unshared independent accommodation.</i> |
| unsung | Having value that is not acknowledged. <i>Harvey is one of the unsung heroes of the industrial revolution.</i> |
