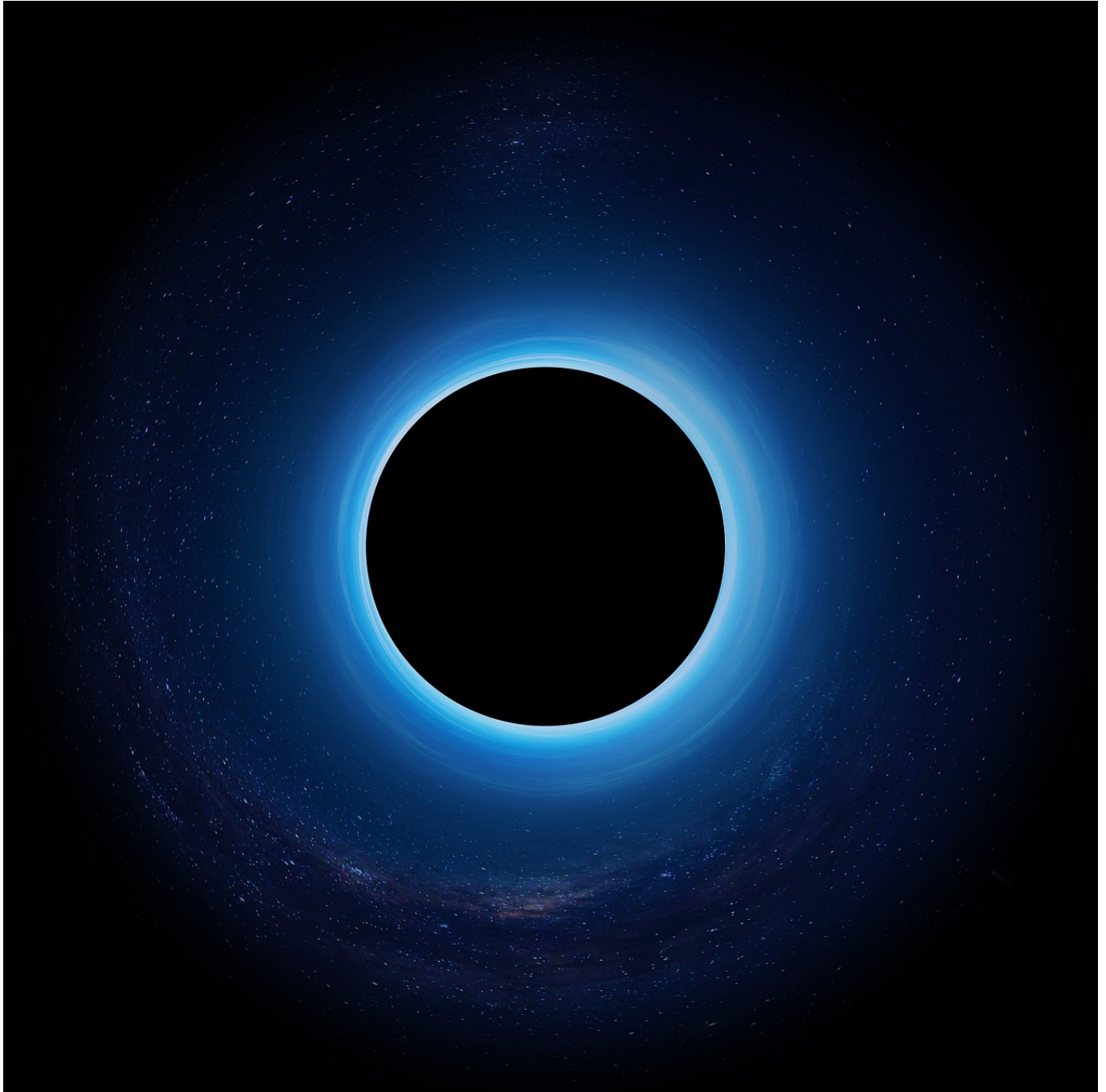

<b>abnormal</b>	Not normal; not typical or usual or regular or conforming to a norm. <i><b>Abnormal</b> ambition.</i>
<b>anomalous</b>	Deviating from the general or common order or type. <i>Advanced forms of life may be <b>anomalous</b> in the universe.</i>
<b><u>atypical</u></b>	Not representative of a type, group, or class. <i>There were somewhat <b>atypical</b> results in May and November.</i>
<b>baffling</b>	Impossible to understand; perplexing. <i>The crime is a <b>baffling</b> mystery for the police.</i>

<b>bizarre</b>	Very strange or unusual. <i>His behaviour became more and more <b>bizarre</b>.</i>
<b><u>conspicuous</u></b>	Clearly visible. <i>He was very thin with a <b>conspicuous</b> Adam s apple.</i>
<b>curious</b>	Having curiosity aroused; eagerly interested in learning more. <i>She was <b>curious</b> to know what had happened.</i>
<b><u>distinctive</u></b>	Capable of being classified. <i>Juniper berries give gin its <b>distinctive</b> flavour.</i>
<b><u>eccentric</u></b>	(of a person or their behaviour) unconventional and slightly strange. <i><b>Eccentric</b> circles.</i>
<b>eminent</b>	Of imposing height; especially standing out above others. <i>One of the world s most <b>eminent</b> statisticians.</i>
<b>especial</b>	For or belonging chiefly to one person or thing. <i>These traditions are of <b>especial</b> interest to feminists.</i>
<b>exceptional</b>	Far beyond what is usual in magnitude or degree. <i>Late claims will only be accepted in <b>exceptional</b> circumstances.</i>
<b>extraordinary</b>	Far more than usual or expected. <i>It is <b>extraordinary</b> that no consultation took place.</i>
<b>funny</b>	Used to emphasize that something is serious or should be taken seriously. <i>Told the doctor about the <b>funny</b> sensations in her chest.</i>
<b><u>impressive</u></b>	Evoking admiration through size, quality, or skill; grand, imposing, or awesome. <i>An <b>impressive</b> ceremony.</i>
<b><u>incongruous</u></b>	Not in harmony or keeping with the surroundings or other aspects of something. <i>The duffel coat looked <b>incongruous</b> with the black dress she wore underneath.</i>
<b>mysterious</b>	(of a location) having an atmosphere of strangeness or secrecy. <i>She was <b>mysterious</b> about herself but said plenty about her husband.</i>
<b>mystifying</b>	Utterly bewildering or perplexing. <i>A <b>mystifying</b> phenomenon.</i>
<b>notable</b>	Worthy of attention because interesting, significant, or unusual. <i>A <b>notable</b> historian.</i>
<b>noteworthy</b>	Worthy of attention because interesting, significant, or unusual. <i>It is <b>noteworthy</b> that no one at the Bank has accepted responsibility for the failure.</i>

<b>odd</b>	Different to what is usual or expected; strange. <i>When you've got an <b>odd</b> five minutes could I have a word.</i> (informal) strikingly unconventional.
<b>offbeat</b>	<i>A rapid tempo is essential here otherwise we will not sense the <b>offbeat</b> hemiolas.</i>
<b>out of the ordinary</b>	Directed outward or serving to direct something outward.
<b>outlandish</b>	Foreign or alien. <i>Three wise <b>outlandish</b> kings.</i>
<b>outstanding</b>	Not yet paid, resolved, or dealt with. <b>Outstanding</b> bills.
<b>particular</b>	Denoting a proposition in which something is asserted of some but not all of a class. <i>The <b>particular</b> demands of the job.</i>
<b>peculiar</b>	Different to what is normal or expected; strange. <i>He gave her some very <b>peculiar</b> looks.</i>
<b>perplexing</b>	Completely baffling; very puzzling. <b>Perplexing</b> to someone who knew nothing about it.
<b>puzzling</b>	Lacking clarity of meaning; causing confusion or perplexity. <i>Only one very <b>puzzling</b> question remains unanswered.</i>
<b>remarkable</b>	Worthy of attention; striking. <i>A <b>remarkable</b> sight.</i>
<b>rummy</b>	Beyond or deviating from the usual or expected.
<b>signal</b>	Notably out of the ordinary. <i>The year saw one <b>signal</b> triumph for the Labour party.</i>
<b>strange</b>	Being definitely out of the ordinary and unexpected; slightly odd or even a bit weird. <i>Used many <b>strange</b> words.</i>
<b>striking</b>	Sensational in appearance or thrilling in effect. <i>A <b>striking</b> resemblance between parent and child.</i>
<b>unaccountable</b>	Free from control or responsibility. <i>A powerful and <b>unaccountable</b> institution.</i>
<b>unconventional</b>	Not based on or conforming to what is generally done or believed. <i>An <b>unconventional</b> marriage.</i>
<b>unexpected</b>	Not expected or anticipated. <i>His death was totally <b>unexpected</b>.</i>
<b>unfamiliar</b>	Not having knowledge or experience of. <i>He seems <b>unfamiliar</b> with recent research on this topic.</i>



<b>unique</b>	Particularly remarkable, special, or unusual. <i>A <b>unique</b> opportunity to see the spectacular Bolshoi Ballet.</i>
<b>unnatural</b>	Contrary to the ordinary course of nature; abnormal. <i>Death by <b>unnatural</b> causes.</i>
<b>untypical</b>	Not having the distinctive qualities of a particular type of person or thing; uncharacteristic. <i>He considers the film <b>untypical</b> of college movies.</i>
<b>unusual</b>	Being definitely out of the ordinary and unexpected; slightly odd or even a bit weird. <i>The government has taken the <b>unusual</b> step of calling home its ambassador.</i>
<b><u>weird</u></b>	Strikingly odd or unusual. <i>The three <b>weird</b> sisters.</i>

<b><u>distinctive</u></b>	Of a feature that helps to distinguish a person or thing- Curtis Wilkie. <i>Juniper berries give gin its <b>distinctive</b> flavour.</i>
<b>efficacy</b>	The ability to produce a desired or intended result. <i>Concern about the safety and <b>efficacy</b> of the vaccine.</i>
<b>emphasis</b>	The relative prominence of a syllable or musical note (especially with regard to stress or pitch). <i>The red light gave the central figure increased <b>emphasis</b>.</i>
<b>especial</b>	Surpassing what is common or usual or expected. <i>He paid <b>especial</b> attention to her.</i>
<b>especially</b>	In a special manner. <i>He despised them all <b>especially</b> Sylvester.</i>
<b>exceptional</b>	Unusual; not typical. <i>Special educational provisions for <b>exceptional</b> children.</i>
<b>extraordinarily</b>	Extremely. <i>It is a simple story <b>extraordinarily</b> well told.</i>
<b><u>hallmark</u></b>	Stamp with a hallmark. <i>The tiny bubbles are the <b>hallmark</b> of fine champagnes.</i>
<b><u>idiosyncratic</u></b>	Peculiar to the individual. <i>Michelangelo s highly <b>idiosyncratic</b> style of painting.</i>
<b>individual</b>	Concerning one person exclusively. <i>Mark the <b>individual</b> pages.</i>
<b>individualism</b>	A social theory favouring freedom of action for individuals over collective or state control. <i>A culture that celebrates <b>individualism</b> and wealth.</i>
<b>individualist</b>	Relating to or denoting a social theory favouring freedom of action for individuals over collective or state control. <i>Selfish <b>individualists</b> thinking only of themselves.</i>
<b><u>individualistic</u></b>	More interested in individual people than in society as a whole. <i>An <b>individualistic</b> way of dressing.</i>
<b><u>individuality</u></b>	The quality of being individual. <i>Clothes with real style and <b>individuality</b>.</i>
<b>irregularity</b>	An irregular asymmetry in shape; an irregular spatial pattern. <i>There is evidence that fraud and <b>irregularity</b> continue on a large scale.</i>
<b>nonetheless</b>	A person or thing regarded as excellent or perfect.
<b><u>only</u></b>	Being the only one single and isolated from others. <i>There are <b>only</b> a limited number of tickets available.</i>

<b>particular</b>	First and most important. <i>A <b>particular</b> description of the room.</i>
<b>rare</b>	Cooked a short time; still red inside. <i>One of Britain's <b>rarest</b> birds the honey buzzard.</i>
<b>rarity</b>	Noteworthy scarcity. <i>To take the morning off was a <b>rarity</b>.</i>
<b>scarce</b>	Scarcely. <i>Had <b>scarcely</b> rung the bell when the door flew open.</i>
<b>singularly</b>	In a singular manner or to a singular degree. <i>Charlotte thought her very <b>singularly</b> dressed.</i>
<b>sole</b>	Put a new sole on to a shoe. <i>He wanted several pairs of boots to be <b>soled</b> and heeled.</i>
<b>sparse</b>	Thinly dispersed or scattered. <i>Areas of <b>sparse</b> population.</i>
<b>special</b>	A special offering usually temporary and at a reduced price that is featured in advertising. <i>A <b>special</b> reason to confide in her.</i>
<b>specially</b>	To a distinctly greater extent or degree than is common. <i>A <b>specially</b> arranged dinner.</i>
<b>uncommon</b>	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind. <i>Doing an <b>uncommon</b> amount of business.</i>
<b>unique</b>	A unique person or thing. <i>Certain types of problems have <b>unique</b> solutions.</i>
