#### Definitions of "Sinner" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "sinner" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A person who transgresses against divine law by committing an immoral act or acts.
- A person who sins (without repenting.





### Synonyms of "Sinner" as a noun (5 Words)

criminal	Someone who has committed a crime or has been legally convicted of a crime. These men are dangerous <b>criminal</b> s.
evildoer	A person who commits profoundly immoral and wicked deeds. <i>His concept of justice demanded vengeance against <b>evildoer</b>s.</i>
offender	A person or thing that does something wrong or causes problems. <i>An institution for young <b>offender</b>s.</i>
transgressor	Someone who transgresses; someone who violates a law or command. The way of <b>transgressor</b> s is hard.
wrongdoer	A person who behaves illegally or dishonestly; an offender. They need to punish <b>wrongdoer</b> s.

# Associations of "Sinner" (30 Words)

<u>apologetic</u>	Constituting a formal defence or justification of a theory or doctrine. <i>An apologetic manner.</i>
<u>atone</u>	Turn away from sin or do penitence. A human sacrifice to <b>atone</b> for the sin.
atonement	The reconciliation of God and mankind through Jesus Christ. <i>He submitted his resignation as an act of</i> <b>atonement</b> .
compunction	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed. They used their tanks without <b>compunction</b> .
confess	Of a priest listen to the confession of. I could not <b>confess</b> all my sins to the priest.
<u>confession</u>	The religious body or Church sharing a confession of faith. <i>He signed a <b>confession</b> to both the murders.</i>



confessor	A person who makes a confession. She sent for her <b>confessor</b> because she was in mortal sin.
contrite	Feeling or expressing remorse at the recognition that one has done wrong. A <i>contrite tone</i> .
contrition	Sorrow for sin arising from fear of damnation. To show <b>contrition</b> for his crime he offered to do community service.
<u>convict</u>	A person who has been convicted of a criminal offense. <i>The thieves were <b>convict</b>ed of the robbery</i> .
<u>culprit</u>	Someone who perpetrates wrongdoing. The car s front nearside door had been smashed in but the <b>culprit</b> s had fled.
expiate	Make amends for. Their sins must be <b>expiate</b> d by sacrifice.
forgive	Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. I ll never <b>forgive</b> David for the way he treated her.
guilty	Culpable of or responsible for a specified wrongdoing. <i>He was found <b>guilty</b> of manslaughter.</i>
impenitent	Not penitent or remorseful. <i>Impenitent elitists</i> .
penance	Impose a penance on. He had done public <b>penance</b> for those hasty words.
penitence	The action of feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentance. <i>A public display of <b>penitence</b></i> .
penitent	A person who repents their sins and (in the Christian Church) seeks forgiveness from God. A <b>penitent</b> expression.
penitential	Showing or constituting penance. Wrote a <b>penitential</b> letter apologizing for her hasty words.
regret	Express with regret. I always <b>regret</b> ted that I never trained.
regretful	Feeling or showing regret. <i>He sounded <b>regretful</b> but pointed out that he had committed himself.</i>
<u>remorse</u>	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed. They were filled with <b>remorse</b> and shame.
remorseful	Feeling or expressing pain or sorrow for sins or offenses. The defendant was <b>remorseful</b> for what he had done.



repent	Feel remorse for; feel sorry for; be contrite about. I <b>repent</b> me of all I did.
<u>repentance</u>	Remorse for your past conduct. <i>Each person who turns to God in genuine</i> <b>repentance</b> <i>and faith will be saved.</i>
repentant	Expressing or feeling sincere regret and remorse; remorseful. <i>He is truly <b>repentant</b> for his incredible naivety and stupidity.</i>
rue	European strong-scented perennial herb with grey-green bitter-tasting leaves; an irritant similar to poison ivy. She might live to <b>rue</b> this impetuous decision.
<u>rueful</u>	Feeling or expressing pain or sorrow for sins or offenses. She gave a <b>rueful</b> grin.
scruple	Raise scruples. The man <b>scruple</b> d to perjure himself.
unrepentant	Not penitent or remorseful. <i>He was unrepentant</i> and said that his comments were completely accurately accurately.
