- *The actual state of affairs.*
- *The physical magnitude of something (how big it is).*
- *A person or garment corresponding to a particular numbered size.*
- *The relative extent of something; a thing's overall dimensions or magnitude; how big something is.*
- *Each of the classes, typically numbered, into which garments or other articles are*

divided according to how large they are.

- *A large magnitude.*
- *Extensive dimensions or magnitude.*



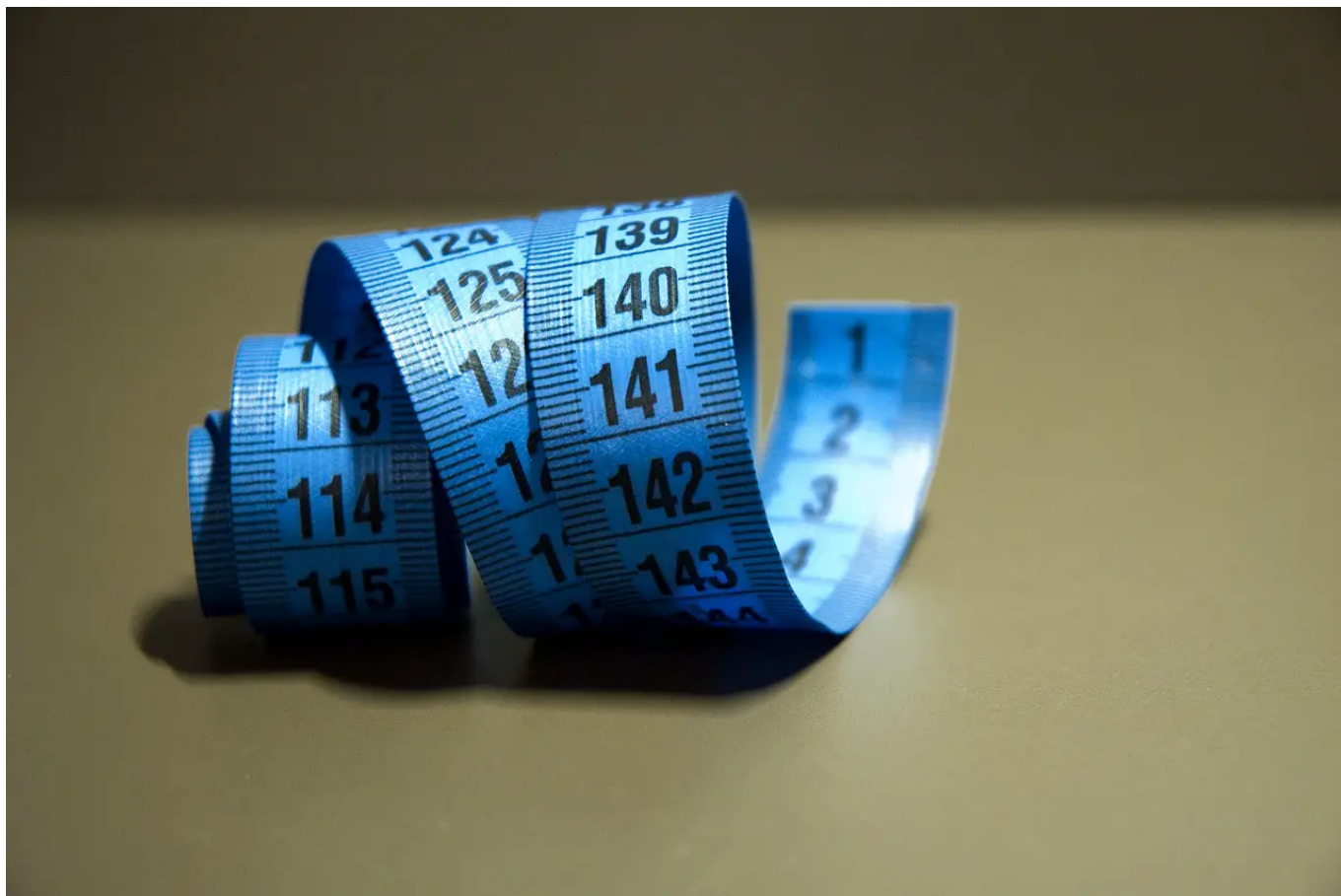

measurements	The act or process of assigning numbers to phenomena according to a rule. <i>The measurements were carefully done.</i>
proportions	Magnitude or extent. <i>A building of vast proportions.</i>
size of it	The actual state of affairs.
sizing	Any glutinous material used to fill pores in surfaces or to stiffen fabrics.
square footage	The product of two equal terms.

Definitions of "Size" as a verb

- *Form an estimate or rough judgement of someone or something.*
- *Make to a size; bring to a suitable size.*
- *Cover or stiffen or glaze a porous material with size or sizing (a glutinous substance).*
- *Alter or sort in terms of size or according to size.*
- *Estimate or measure something's dimensions.*
- *Sort according to size.*

<u>assess</u>	Evaluate or estimate the nature, ability, or quality of. <i>It is difficult to assess whether this is a new trend.</i>
categorize	Place into or assign to a category. <i>Children learn early on to categorize.</i>
<u>classify</u>	Arrange or order by classes or categories. <i>How would you classify these pottery shards are they prehistoric.</i>
estimate	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>It is estimated that smoking causes 100 000 premature deaths every year.</i>

measure up	Determine the measurements of something or somebody, take measurements of.
rate	Have a high opinion of. <i>Mike certainly rated her goodness knows why.</i>
sort	Resolve the problems or difficulties of. <i>She sat down and sorted through her mail.</i>
take stock of	Require (time or space).
take the measure of	Point or cause to go (blows, weapons, or objects such as photographic equipment) towards.
weigh up	Have weight; have import, carry weight.

reduce	Reduce in size reduce physically. <i>He reduced his grantees to due obedience.</i>

reduced	Made less in size or amount or degree.
reducible	(of a polynomial) able to be factorized into two or more polynomials of lower degree. <i>Shakespeare's major soliloquies are not reducible to categories.</i>
retrench	Make a reduction, as in one's workforce. <i>If there are excess staff they should be retrenched.</i>
<u>rundown</u>	A concluding summary (as in presenting a case before a law court). <i>He gave his teammates a rundown on the opposition.</i>
<u>shrink</u>	Become or make smaller in size or amount. <i>The metal is unsuitable for shrinking on to wooden staves.</i>
shrinkage	The process, fact, or amount of shrinking. <i>The material lost 2 inches per yard in shrinkage.</i>
shrinking	The act of becoming less. <i>The shrinking market has provoked a massive price war.</i>
<u>thick</u>	With a thick consistency. <i>Thick warm blankets.</i>
<u>thin</u>	Make thin or thinner. <i>The evidence is rather thin.</i>
touchstone	A piece of fine-grained dark schist or jasper formerly used for testing alloys of gold by observing the colour of the mark which they made on it. <i>They tend to regard grammar as the touchstone of all language performance.</i>
<u>weaken</u>	Destroy property or hinder normal operations. <i>His resistance had weakened.</i>
<u>width</u>	Wide range or extent. <i>The yard was about seven feet in width.</i>
withered	(used especially of vegetation) having lost all moisture. <i>Withered vines.</i>
wizened	Lean and wrinkled by shrinkage as from age or illness-W.F.Starkie. <i>A wizened little man with frizzy grey hair.</i>
yardstick	A ruler or tape that is three feet long. <i>League tables are not the only yardstick of schools performance.</i>
