joker	A person who does something thoughtless or annoying. <i>Some <b>joker</b> is blocking the driveway.</i>
jokester	A person fond of making or telling jokes. He was an outgoing fun loving kid the family <b>jokester</b> .
main points	Any very large body of (salt) water.
<u>number</u>	A numbered item in a series. <i>Take the <b>number</b> 2 to the main square then change to the <b>number</b> 5.</i>
outline	A schematic or preliminary plan. The <b>outline</b> s of dockside warehouses standing sharp on the skyline.
performance	An act of performing a dramatic role, song, or piece of music. <i>They admired his <b>performance</b> under stress</i> .
piece	A written, musical, or artistic creation. It is not known who created this <b>piece</b> .
<u>portrait</u>	A word picture of a person's appearance and character. A <b>portrait</b> of George III.
portrayal	A description of someone or something in a particular way; a representation. A realistic <b>portrayal</b> of war.
preliminary drawing	Something that serves as a preceding event or introduces what follows.



profile	A flat outline piece of scenery on stage. In soft rocks a <b>profile</b> drawn normally to the beach would show a concave form comparable with the long <b>profile</b> of a river.
resume	Short descriptive summary (of events.
routine	A short theatrical performance that is part of a longer program. I settled down into a <b>routine</b> of work and sleep.
run-through	An uninterrupted rehearsal.
<u>rundown</u>	An analysis or summary of something by a knowledgeable person. A <b>rundown</b> in the business would be a devastating blow to the local economy.
<u>scene</u>	The pieces of scenery used in a play or opera. The police returned to the <b>scene</b> of the crime.
<u>skeleton</u>	A sport in which a competitor races down a frozen track on a skeleton sled. <i>The concrete</i> <b>skeleton</b> <i>of an unfinished building.</i>
skit	A short informal performance intended to educate or inform. Students will create <b>skit</b> s about bullying and go to each elementary school to perform them.



prospectus	A printed booklet advertising a school or university to potential parents or students or giving details of a share offer for the benefit of investors. A <b>prospectus</b> should contain the facts that an investor needs to make an informed decision.
quickly	With little or no delay. Reg s illness progressed frighteningly <b>quickly</b> .
recapitulate	Summarize briefly. Many features of regeneration in the peripheral nervous system <b>recapitulate</b> development.
resume	Begin speaking again after a pause or interruption. <i>He sipped at the glass of water and then</i> <b>resume</b> <i>d</i> .
rough	Work or shape something in a rough preliminary fashion. The first day of a job is <b>rough</b> on everyone.
scrawl	Write carelessly. The page was covered in <b>scrawl</b> s and doodles.
