## Synonyms of "Sky" as a noun (4 Words)

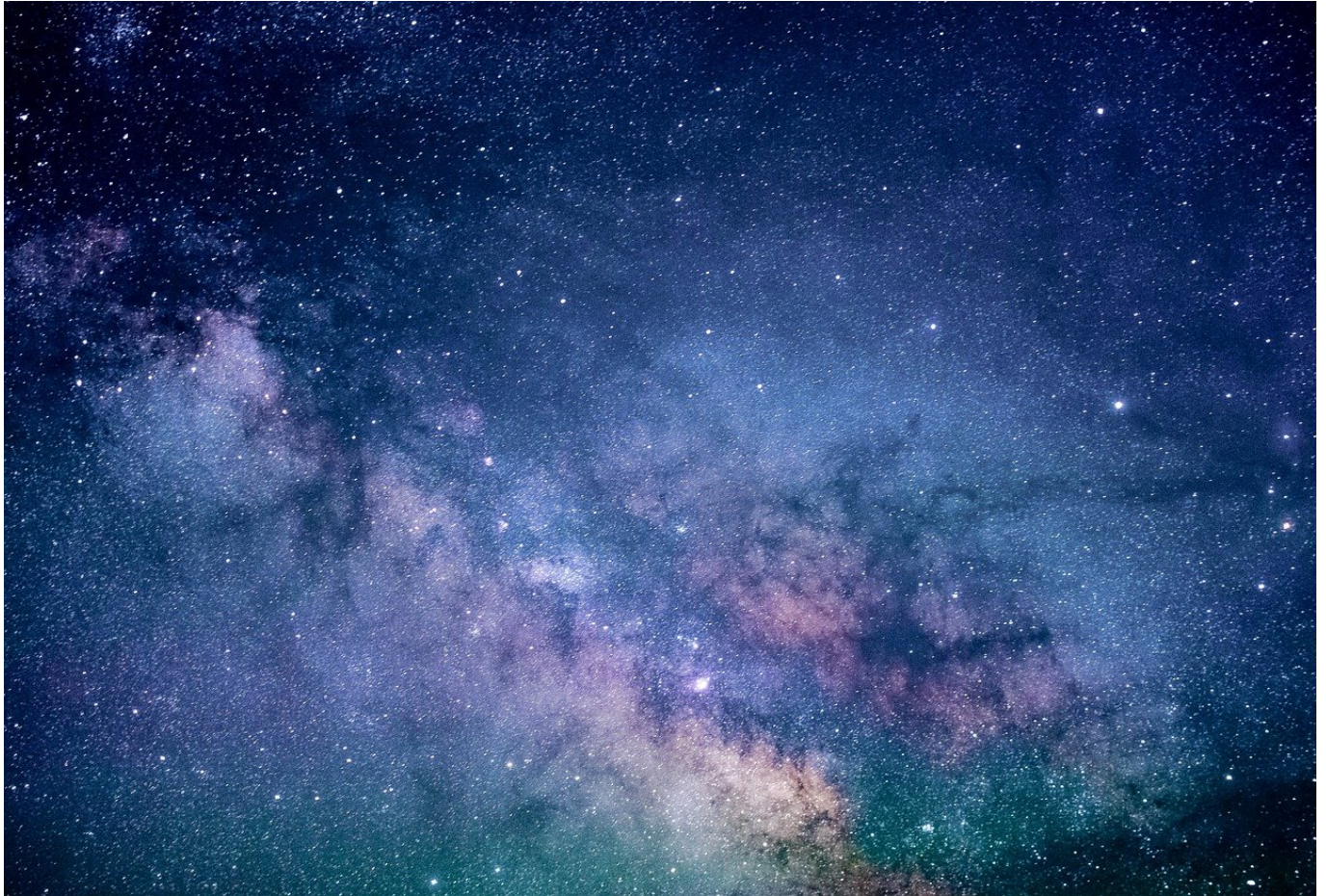
- airspace** The space in the atmosphere immediately above the earth.

- the atmosphere** The mass of air surrounding the Earth.
- the skies** The atmosphere and outer space as viewed from the earth.
- the stratosphere** The atmospheric layer between the troposphere and the mesosphere.

## Sky as a Verb

### Definitions of "Sky" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "sky" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Hang (a picture) very high on a wall, especially in an exhibition.*
- *Throw or toss with a light motion.*
- *Hit (a ball) high into the air.*



## Synonyms of "Sky" as a verb (3 Words)

- flip** Turn upside down, or throw so as to reverse.  
***Flip** me the beachball.*
- pitch** Set one's voice or a piece of music at a particular pitch.  
*She **pitched** over the railing of the balcony.*
- toss** Throw or toss with a light motion.  
*I could demand her keys and **toss** her office.*





## Usage Examples of "Sky" as a verb

- *A painter's worst fear was that his picture would be skied.*
- *He skied his tee shot.*

<u><a href="#">asteroid</a></u>	Relating to or denoting echinoderms of the class Asteroidea.
<u><a href="#">atmospheric</a></u>	Relating to or located in the atmosphere. <b>Atmospheric</b> pollution.
<u><a href="#">azure</a></u>	Color azure. <i>A flash of <b>azure</b> drew my eye to a kingfisher.</i>
<u><a href="#">brighten</a></u>	Make lighter or brighter. <i>She seems to <b>brighten</b> his life.</i>
<u><a href="#">celestial</a></u>	Of or relating to the sky. <b>Celestial</b> peace.
<u><a href="#">cloud</a></u>	Darken the sky with cloud. <i>The only <b>cloud</b> on the immediate horizon is raising a mortgage.</i>
<u><a href="#">comet</a></u>	(astronomy) a relatively small extraterrestrial body consisting of a frozen mass that travels around the sun in a highly elliptical orbit.
<u><a href="#">cosmic</a></u>	Relating to the universe or cosmos, especially as distinct from the earth. <i>The <b>cosmic</b> void.</i>

<b>daybreak</b>	The first light of day. <i>She set off at <b>daybreak</b>.</i>
<b>daylight</b>	An appreciable distance or difference between one person or thing and another. <i>The growing <b>daylight</b> between himself and the leading jockey.</i>
<b>daytime</b>	The time of the day between sunrise and sunset. <i>It is easier to make the repairs in the <b>daytime</b>.</i>
<b>firmament</b>	The apparent surface of the imaginary sphere on which celestial bodies appear to be projected. <i>Thunder shakes the <b>firmament</b>.</i>
<u><b>heavenly</b></u>	Of the heavens or sky. <i>Their shampoos smell <b>heavenly</b>.</i>
<b>hemisphere</b>	Either half of the cerebrum. <i>The left <b>hemisphere</b> plays a dominant role in the comprehension of language.</i>
<b>meteor</b>	A streak of light in the sky at night that results when a meteoroid hits the earth's atmosphere and air friction causes the meteoroid to melt or vaporize or explode.
<b>meteorite</b>	A piece of rock or metal that has fallen to the earth's surface from outer space as a meteor. Over 90 per cent of meteorites are of rock while the remainder consist wholly or partly of iron and nickel.
<u><b>mist</b></u>	Spray finely or cover with mist. <i>Don't <b>mist</b> furry leaved plants such as African violets.</i>
<u><b>moon</b></u>	Any object resembling a moon. <i>There was no <b>moon</b> but a sky sparkling with brilliant stars.</i>
<u><b>morning</b></u>	Every morning. <i><b>Mornings</b> she'd sleep late.</i>
<b>noon</b>	The middle of the day. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>overcast</b>	Make overcast or cloudy. <i>Fall weather often <b>overcasts</b> our beaches.</i>
<u><b>planet</b></u>	Astronomy any of the nine large celestial bodies in the solar system that revolve around the sun and shine by reflected light. Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune, and Pluto in order of their proximity to the sun. Viewed from the constellation Hercules, all the planets rotate around the sun in a counterclockwise direction. <i>The <b>planets</b> are presently influencing you in a positive way.</i>



<b>precipitation</b>	<p>The fact or quality of acting suddenly and rashly.</p> <p><i>These convective processes produce cloud and <b>precipitation</b>.</i></p>
<b><u>rainbow</u></b>	<p>An arch of colours visible in the sky caused by the refraction and dispersion of the sun's light by rain or other water droplets in the atmosphere. The colours of the rainbow are generally said to be red orange yellow green blue indigo and violet.</p> <p><i>A big <b>rainbow</b> packet of felt pens.</i></p>
<b>stratosphere</b>	<p>The layer of the earth's atmosphere above the troposphere, extending to about 50 km above the earth's surface (the lower boundary of the mesosphere).</p> <p><i>Her next big campaign launched her into the fashion <b>stratosphere</b>.</i></p>
<b><u>sun</u></b>	<p>Expose one's body to the sun.</p> <p><i>The <b>sun</b> contains 99.85% of the mass in the solar system.</i></p>
<b><u>sunrise</u></b>	<p>Atmospheric phenomena accompanying the daily appearance of the sun.</p> <p><i>An hour before <b>sunrise</b>.</i></p>
<b>sunspot</b>	<p>A dark or discoloured spot on the skin caused by exposure to the sun.</p> <p><i>Wrinkles <b>sunspots</b> and uneven skin tone and texture can all be traced to unprotected sun exposure.</i></p>
<b>supernal</b>	<p>Of exceptional quality or extent.</p> <p><i>Interpret the plague as a visitation from heaven a <b>supernal</b> punishment for the sins of men.</i></p>
<b>welkin</b>	<p>The apparent surface of the imaginary sphere on which celestial bodies appear to be projected.</p>
