asleep on one's feet In a state of sleep.

dozy	Feeling drowsy and lazy. At breakfast a <b>dozy</b> waitress brings the wrong things.
<u>drowsy</u>	Causing sleepiness. The wine had made her <b>drowsy</b> .
hypnotic	Of or relating to hypnosis. Her voice had a <b>hypnotic</b> quality.
inactive	Not working; inoperative. <i>Inactive</i> machinery.
<u>languid</u>	(of a period of time) relaxed and peaceful. His <b>languid</b> demeanour irritated her.
languorous	Lacking spirit or liveliness. A hot <b>languorous</b> afternoon.



nodding	Having branches or flower heads that bend downward. <i>Nodding daffodils.</i>
peaceful	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. There were no violent incidents reported and it was a <b>peaceful</b> protest.
<u>placid</u>	Not easily upset or excited. Not everyone shared his <b>placid</b> temperament.
quiet	Making little or no noise. A <b>quiet</b> life.
sleepy-eyed	Ready to fall asleep.
sleepyheaded	Ready to fall asleep. <i>Sleepyheaded</i> students.
slow-moving	Moving slowly.
somnolent	Causing or suggestive of drowsiness. A <b>somnolent</b> summer day.
<u>soporific</u>	Sleepy or drowsy. The motion of the train had a somewhat <b>soporific</b> effect.
tired	In need of sleep or rest; weary. She was <b>tired</b> out now that the strain was over.
<u>tranquil</u>	(of a body of water) free from disturbance by heavy waves. <i>Her <b>tranquil</b> gaze.</i>
yawning	(of an opening or space) very large and wide. The <b>yawning</b> entrance of the cave.






#### Usage Examples of "Sleepy" as an adjective

<u>apathetic</u>	Showing or feeling no interest, enthusiasm, or concern. A woman who became active rather than <b>apathetic</b> as she grew older.
asleep	Not attentive or alert; inactive. <i>My foot is <b>asleep</b>.</i>
bed	Place plants in a prepared bed of soil. A <b>bed</b> of tulips.
dispirited	Filled with melancholy and despondency. A <b>dispirited</b> and resigned expression on her face.
<u>dormant</u>	(of a plant or bud) alive but not actively growing. <b>Dormant</b> butterflies.
doze	A short, light sleep. I <b>doze</b> d off for a few seconds.
<u>dreaming</u>	Imaginative thoughts indulged in while awake.



drowse	Be sluggish or inactive. Let not your prudence <b>drowse</b> .
drowsiness	A feeling of being sleepy and lethargic; sleepiness. <i>This drug can cause <b>drowsiness</b></i> .
<u>drowsy</u>	Showing lack of attention or boredom. Made <b>drowsy</b> by the long ride.
exhausted	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>Exhausted peat workings</i> .
<u>feeble</u>	Lacking strength or vigor. Her <b>feeble</b> cries of pain.
<u>groggy</u>	Dazed, weak, or unsteady, especially from illness, intoxication, sleep, or a blow. The sleeping pills had left her feeling <b>groggy</b> .
<u>lackadaisical</u>	Idle or indolent especially in a dreamy way. A <b>lackadaisical</b> spiritless young man about town.
<u>languid</u>	Weak or faint from illness or fatigue. The terrace was perfect for <b>languid</b> days in the Italian sun.
languor	An oppressive stillness of the air. The afternoon was hot quiet and heavy with <b>languor</b> .
lassitude	A feeling of lack of interest or energy. She was overcome by <b>lassitude</b> and retired to bed.
<u>lethargic</u>	Affected by lethargy; sluggish and apathetic. I felt tired and a little <b>lethargic</b> .
<u>lethargy</u>	Weakness characterized by a lack of vitality or energy. There was an air of <b>lethargy</b> about him.
<u>listless</u>	Lacking zest or vivacity. <i>He was <b>listless</b> and bored.</i>
nap	A card game similar to whist; usually played for stakes. She took to <b>nap</b> ping on the beach in the afternoons.
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. She d just stay a few more minutes then <b>rouse</b> herself and go back.
sleeping	Lying with head on paws as if sleeping. It was 30 degrees at 1 a m a few weeks ago and <b>sleeping</b> was near impossible.
sluggishness	Inactivity; showing an unusual lack of energy. The <b>sluggishness</b> of the economy.
somnolence	A very sleepy state.



somnolent	Inclined to or marked by drowsiness. The sound had a <b>somnolent</b> effect.
tired	Bored or impatient with. Fisher rubbed his <b>tired</b> eyes.
tiredness	Temporary loss of strength and energy resulting from hard physical or mental work. Depression and <b>tiredness</b> caused by overwork.
torpid	(of an animal) dormant, especially during hibernation. <i>Torpid frogs.</i>
uninterested	Having no care or interest in knowing.
