<b>batch</b>	A number of things or people regarded as a group or set. <i><b>Batch</b> production.</i>
<b>deal</b>	The set of hands dealt to the players. <i>Working mothers get a bad <b>deal</b>.</i>
<u><b>diversion</b></u>	An alternative route for use by traffic when the usual road is temporarily closed. <i>People in search of <b>diversion</b>.</i>
<b>drawing away</b>	An illustration that is drawn by hand and published in a book, magazine, or newspaper.
<u><b>flock</b></u>	A church congregation guided by a pastor. <i>A <b>flock</b> of gulls.</i>

<b>good deal</b>	That which is pleasing or valuable or useful.
<b>great deal</b>	A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field.
<b>hatful</b>	A large number or amount or extent.
<b>heap</b>	A large amount or number of. <i>They climbed back in the <b>heap</b> and headed home.</i>
<b>lot</b>	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>They were an angry <b>lot</b>.</i>
<b>mass</b>	Any of the main portions in a painting or drawing that each have some unity in colour, lighting, or some other quality. <i>We get <b>masses</b> of homework.</i>
<b>mess</b>	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>The house was a <b>mess</b>.</i>
<b>mickle</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent.
<b>mint</b>	A candy that is flavored with a mint oil. <i>There are many other <b>mints</b> with distinct aromas.</i>
<b>mountain</b>	A land mass that projects well above its surroundings; higher than a hill. <i>A <b>mountain</b> of paperwork.</i>
<b>muckle</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent.
<b>passel</b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>See the rest of the winners in our huge <b>passel</b> of photos.</i>
<b>peck</b>	A United States dry measure equal to 8 quarts or 537.605 cubic inches. <i>He wants a little more <b>peck</b>.</i>
<b>pile</b>	A large imposing building or group of buildings. <i>He placed the books in a neat <b>pile</b>.</i>
<b>plenty</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>Such natural phenomena as famine and <b>plenty</b>.</i>
<b>raft</b>	A small inflatable rubber or plastic boat, especially one for use in emergencies. <i>Great <b>rafts</b> of cormorants often 5 000 strong.</i>
<b>sight</b>	A person's view or consideration. <i>There were reports of a man on the roof aiming a rifle and looking through its <b>sights</b>.</i>
<b>spate</b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>A <b>spate</b> of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
<b>stack</b>	A chimney, especially one on a factory, or a vertical exhaust pipe on a vehicle. <i>The new premises provided a reading room and a <b>stack</b> room.</i>

**tidy sum**      Receptacle that holds odds and ends (as sewing materials).

**turning**      The act of turning away or in the opposite direction.  
*Take the first **turning** on the right.*

**turning aside**      A division during which one team is on the offensive.

**turning away**      The act of turning away or in the opposite direction.

## Slew as a Verb

### Definitions of "Slew" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "slew" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(of an electronic device) undergo slewing.*
- *Turn sharply; change direction abruptly.*
- *Move obliquely or sideways, usually in an uncontrolled manner.*
- *Turn or slide violently or uncontrollably.*



## Synonyms of "Slew" as a verb (18 Words)

### coast

Sail along the coast especially in order to carry cargo.  
*Colchester **coasted** to victory.*

### curve

Form or cause to form a curve.  
*The road **curved** sharply.*

### cut

Cut down on make a reduction in.  
***Cut** grain.*

### glide

Fly in or as if in a glider plane.  
*Slide your hands firmly across the shoulders then **glide** them down.*

### glissade

Perform a glissade in ballet.  
*We wobbled down the line of ascent, **glissading** when we could.*

**move smoothly** Have a turn; make one's move in a game.

### plane

Cut or remove with or as if with a plane.  
***Plane** the top of the door.*



<b><u>sheer</u></b>	Cause to sheer. <i>She <b>sheered</b> her car around the obstacle.</i>
<b>skate</b>	Perform a specified figure on skates. <i>Double eight figures <b>skated</b> entirely on one foot.</i>
<b>skid</b>	Move a heavy object on skids. <i>He <b>skidded</b> his car.</i>
<b><u>skim</u></b>	Move or pass swiftly and lightly over the surface of. <i>He bent to pick up a small pebble <b>skimming</b> it across the glittering water.</i>
<b><u>slide</u></b>	Move smoothly along a surface while maintaining continuous contact with it. <i>She slid down the bank into the water.</i>
<b>slip</b>	Be behaving in a way that is not up to one's usual level of performance. <i>The ship <b>slipped</b> away in the darkness.</i>
<b><u>slither</u></b>	Move smoothly over a surface with a twisting or oscillating motion. <i>I spied a baby adder <b>slithering</b> away.</i>
<b>slue</b>	Turn sharply; change direction abruptly.
<b>swerve</b>	Change or cause to change direction abruptly. <i>A lorry <b>swerved</b> across her path.</i>
<b><u>trend</u></b>	(of a topic) be the subject of many posts on a social media website or application within a short period of time. <i>I've just taken a quick look at what's <b>trending</b> on Twitter right now.</i>
<b><u>veer</u></b>	Change direction suddenly. <i>The wind <b>veered</b> a point.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Slew" as a verb

- *He slewed the aircraft round before it settled on the runway.*
- *The Renault slewed from side to side in the snow.*

## Associations of "Slew" (30 Words)

<b>anticlockwise</b>	In a direction opposite to the direction in which the hands of a clock move. <i>An <b>anticlockwise</b> direction.</i>
<b>axis</b>	An imaginary line about which a body rotates. <i>The variable that is thought of as a cause is placed on the horizontal <b>axis</b> and the variable that is thought of as an effect on the vertical <b>axis</b>.</i>

<b>bend</b>	Bend one's back forward from the waist on down. <i>We cannot <b>bend</b> the rules even for Darren.</i>
<b>crimp</b>	A small connecting piece for crimping wires or lines together. <i>Mum <b>crimped</b> my hair for the party.</i>
<u>curve</u>	Curved segment of a road or river or railroad track etc. <i>Her dress twisted tightly round her generous <b>curves</b>.</i>
<u>deviate</u>	A person whose behavior deviates from what is acceptable especially in sexual behavior. <i>Those who <b>deviate</b> from society's values.</i>
<b>garble</b>	A garbled account or transmission. <i>Most readers assumed the word was a typographical <b>garble</b>.</i>
<b>kink</b>	Form a curl curve or kink. <i>Though the system is making some headway there are still some <b>kinks</b> to iron out.</i>
<b>meandering</b>	Proceeding in a convoluted or undirected fashion. <i>In the course of his <b>meanderings</b> through the city.</i>
<b>perverse</b>	Deviating from what is considered moral or right or proper or good. <i>Films depicting behaviour which seemed <b>perverse</b> or deviant were seen as more suitable for private therapy than for public consumption.</i>
<u>pervert</u>	A person whose sexual behaviour is regarded as abnormal and unacceptable. <i>He was charged with conspiring to <b>pervert</b> the course of justice.</i>
<b>plait</b>	Make something by forming material into a plait or plaits. <i>She wore her dark hair in <b>plaits</b>.</i>
<u>revolve</u>	Turn on or around an axis or a center. <i>Overhead the fan <b>revolved</b> slowly.</i>
<u>rotate</u>	Exchange on a regular basis. <i>Radial tyres should only be <b>rotated</b> from front to rear on the same side.</i>
<b>rotation</b>	The conceptual operation of turning a system about an axis. <i>The <b>rotation</b> of the dancer kept time with the music.</i>
<u>skew</u>	Neither parallel nor at right angles to a specified or implied line askew crooked. <i>The distributions were <b>skewed</b> to the right.</i>
<b>somersault</b>	Do a somersault. <i>His car <b>somersaulted</b> into a ditch.</i>
<u>spin</u>	Spin dry clothes. <i>This method is used to <b>spin</b> filaments from syrups.</i>



<u>stack</u>	Fill or cover a place or surface with stacks of things. <i><b>Stack</b> your books up on the shelves.</i>
<b>swerve</b>	An erratic deflection from an intended course. <i>A lorry <b>swerved</b> across her path.</i>
<b>turn</b>	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>Thou hast also <b>turned</b> the edge of his sword.</i>
<u>twist</u>	Twist suddenly so as to sprain. <i>He grabbed the man and <b>twisted</b> his arm behind his back.</i>
<u>twisted</u>	(of a personality or a way of thinking) unpleasantly or unhealthily abnormal; warped. <i>Many of the facts seemed <b>twisted</b> out of any semblance to reality.</i>
<u>veer</u>	Change direction suddenly. <i>An oil tanker that had <b>veered</b> off course.</i>
<u>whirl</u>	Move or cause to move rapidly round and round. <i>A kaleidoscope of images <b>whirled</b> through her brain.</i>
<b>wind</b>	Wind instruments or specifically woodwind instruments forming a band or a section of an orchestra. <i>Paddy's wife handed him their six month old daughter to be <b>winded</b>.</i>
<b>worm</b>	An earthworm. <i>I <b>wormed</b> her over a course of three weeks.</i>
<b>wrench</b>	Turn something especially a nut or bolt with a wrench. <i>The <b>wrench</b> to his knee occurred as he fell.</i>
<b>wrest</b>	Distort the meaning or interpretation of (something) to suit one's own interests or views. <i>They wanted people to <b>wrest</b> control of their lives from impersonal bureaucracies.</i>
<b>yaw</b>	(of a moving ship or aircraft) twist or oscillate about a vertical axis. <i>The <b>yawing</b> motion of the ship.</i>
