- (of semi-fluid matter) containing too much liquid; watery.
- (of a garment) casual and loose-fitting.
- Not fitting closely; hanging loosely.
- Wet or smeared with a spilled liquid or moist material.
- Excessively or abnormally emotional.
- (of soil) soft and watery.
- Lacking neatness or order.
- (of literature or behaviour) weakly or foolishly sentimental.

Not showing due care or attention. I was disappointed by the food and the <b>inattentive</b> service.
Lacking enthusiasm and determination; carelessly lazy. She was annoyingly <b>lackadaisical</b> and impractical.
Having the consistency of a liquid. <i>Liquid</i> refreshments.
Not held or tied together or contained within something. <i>The stamp came <b>loose</b></i> .
Not fitting closely; hanging loosely.
Soft and watery. A <b>marshy</b> coastline.
Sentimental in an exaggerated or false way. The <b>mawkish</b> smell of warm beer.
(of a situation) confused and difficult to deal with. A child s <b>messy</b> eating habits.
(of soil) soft and watery. The roads were <b>miry</b> in winter.
Corrupt or sordid. <i>Mucky</i> books.
Discolored by impurities; not bright and clear is often used in combination. <i>Muddy barnyard</i> .
Effusively or insincerely emotional. <i>Mushy effusiveness.</i>
Closely constrained or constricted or constricting.



overemotional	Excessively or abnormally emotional. We re not an <b>overemotional</b> family.
quaggy	Soft and watery. <i>Quaggy</i> terrain.
roomy	(especially of accommodation) having plenty of room; spacious. <i>Roomy trousers.</i>
runny	(of a person's nose) producing or discharging mucus. The souffl was hard on top and quite <b>runny</b> underneath.
<u>saccharine</u>	Relating to or containing sugar; sugary. <i>Saccharine music</i> .
<u>sentimental</u>	Given to or marked by sentiment or sentimentality. I m a <b>sentimental</b> old fool.
<u>sickly</u>	Somewhat ill or prone to illness. <i>His usual <b>sickly</b> pallor.</i>
slapdash	Marked by great carelessness. <i>He gave a <b>slapdash</b> performance.</i>
slipshod	Marked by great carelessness. His <b>slipshod</b> heels.
sloughy	(of soil) soft and watery. The <b>sloughy</b> edge of the pond.
soggy	(of soil) soft and watery. The chorus sings powerfully but the interpretation is ultimately <b>soggy</b> .
soupy	Mawkishly sentimental. A <b>soupy</b> July morning.
squashy	Easily crushed or squeezed into a different shape; having a soft consistency. A big <b>squashy</b> leather chair.
sugar-coated	Encrusted with sugar or syrup.
sugary	Resembling or coated in sugar. <i>Sugary romance</i> .
swampy	Soft and watery. <i>Swampy</i> bayous.
syrupy	Overly sweet. A particularly <b>syrupy</b> moment from a corny film.
<u>thin</u>	Relatively thin in consistency or low in density not viscous. A <b>thin</b> reedy little voice.



<u>thoughtless</u>	(of a person or their behaviour) not showing consideration for the needs of other people. It was <b>thoughtless</b> of her to have rushed out and not said where she would be going.
unmethodical	Not orderly and systematic. The project failed through <b>unmethodical</b> planning.
unsystematic	Not done or acting according to a fixed plan or system; unmethodical. They were relatively <b>unsystematic</b> in their use of the data.
untidy	Not neat and tidy. She was chronically <b>untidy</b> and her clothes lay where she had dropped them.
waterlogged	(of soil) soft and watery. The game was called off because of a <b>waterlogged</b> pitch.
watery	Overly diluted; thin and insipid. A <b>watery</b> fluid.

adequacy	The quality of being able to meet a need satisfactorily. <i>He questioned the adequacy of the usual sentimental interpretation of the Golden Rule.</i>
arbitrarily	Without restraint in the use of authority; autocratically. Recurrent infection is <b>arbitrarily</b> defined as three or more infections a year.
<u>arbitrary</u>	Based on or subject to individual discretion or preference or sometimes impulse or caprice. An <b>arbitrary</b> decision.
baggy	Not fitting closely; hanging loosely. <i>Baggy</i> trousers.
<u>careless</u>	Without due thought or consideration. An impression of <b>careless</b> elegance.
<u>deficient</u>	Not having enough of a specified quality or ingredient. <i>The documentary evidence is deficient</i> .
disheveled	In disarray; extremely disorderly- Al Spiers. <i>Her clothing was <b>disheveled</b></i> .
disorderly	Completely unordered and unpredictable and confusing. <i>Disorderly youths</i> .
<u>haphazard</u>	Dependent upon or characterized by chance. A most <b>haphazard</b> system of record keeping.
inattentive	Failing to attend to the comfort or wishes of others. A particularly dull and <b>inattentive</b> pupil.
<u>inconsiderate</u>	Without proper consideration or reflection. It s <b>inconsiderate</b> of her to go away without telling us.
<u>lazy</u>	Showing a lack of care. A <b>lazy</b> lowland river.
<u>loose</u>	Make something loose untie or undo. The old man s skin hung <b>loose</b> and grey.
<u>meager</u>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>Meager</i> fare.
<u>messy</u>	(of a situation) confused and difficult to deal with. <i>Stripping wallpaper can be a <b>messy</b> time consuming job.</i>
neglectful	Failing in what duty requires. <i>Neglectful parents.</i>



random	Odd, unusual, or unexpected. A <b>random</b> choice.
randomize	Make (a set of items, people, etc.) unpredictable, unsystematic, or random in order or arrangement. You can <b>randomize</b> the ingredients with the tap of a button.
<u>remiss</u>	Lacking care or attention to duty; negligent. <b>Remiss</b> of you not to pay your bills.
sag	A shape that sags. She let her head <b>sag</b> lower and lower.
scanty	Lacking in amplitude or quantity. A <b>scanty</b> harvest.
<u>scarce</u>	Scarcely. He was <b>scarce</b> sixteen years old.
slapdash	Directly. <b>Slapdash</b> work.
slipshod	Characterized by a lack of care, thought, or organization. <i>He d caused many problems with his <b>slipshod</b> management.</i>
slovenly	Negligent of neatness especially in dress and person; habitually dirty and unkempt. Slovenly appearance.
<u>sometimes</u>	Occasionally, rather than all of the time. <b>Sometimes</b> I want to do things on my own.
<u>sparse</u>	Not dense. Information on earnings is <b>sparse</b> .
sweatshirt	A loose, warm sweater, typically made of cotton, worn when exercising or as leisurewear.
unkempt	Not neatly combed. They were unwashed and <b>unkempt</b> .
untidy	Not arranged neatly and in order. <b>Untidy</b> and casual about money.
