- *A sleep.*



Synonyms of "Slumber" as a noun (7 Words)

catnap Sleeping for a short period of time (usually not in bed).

doze A light fitful sleep.
*I think I ll have a **doze** he said closing his eyes.*

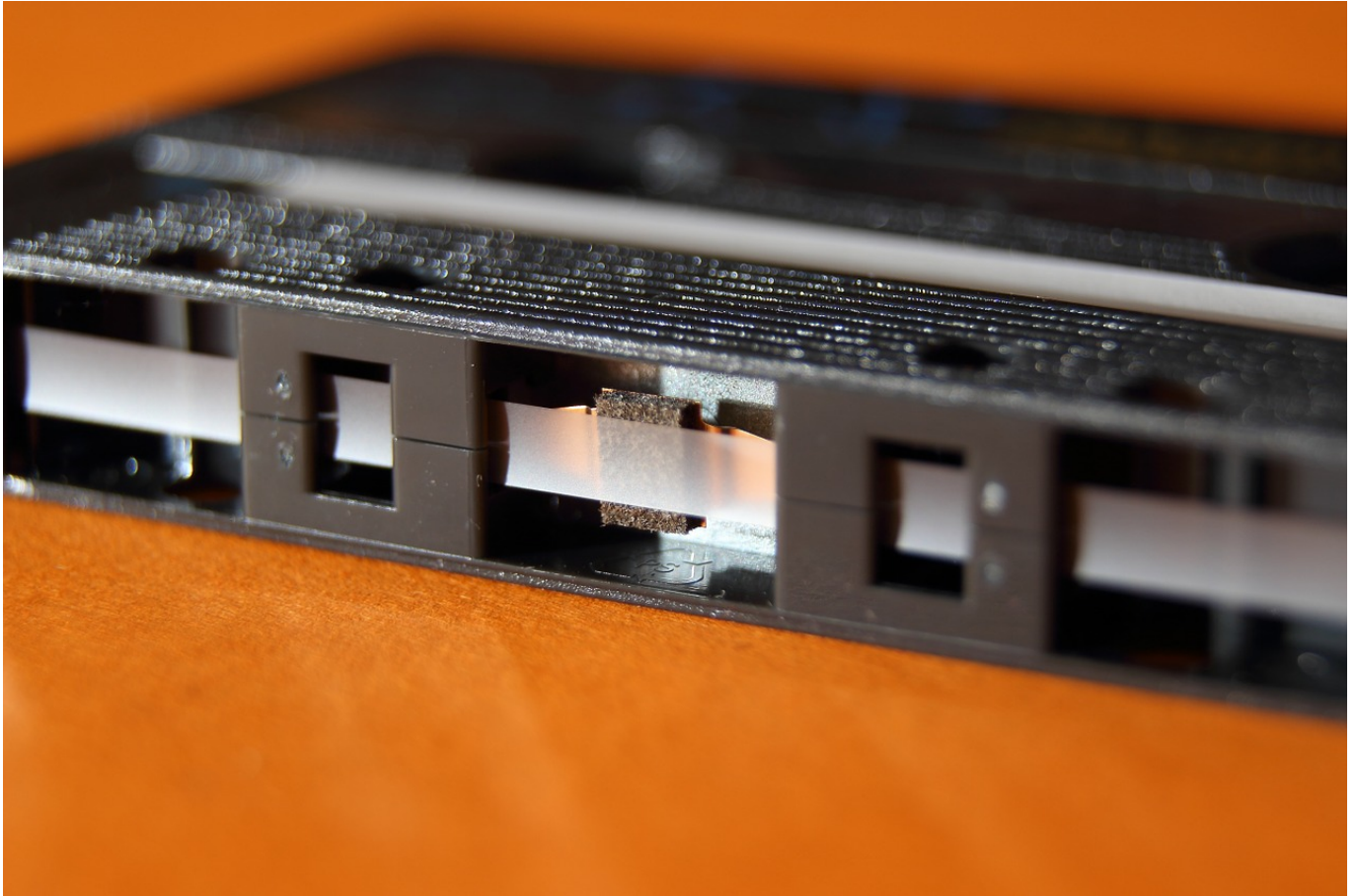
drowse A light sleep; a condition of being half asleep.
*She awoke from a light **drowse**.*

nap A card game similar to whist; usually played for stakes.
*There wasn t time for a **nap**.*

rest An instance or period of resting.
*The car accelerates rapidly from **rest**.*

siesta An afternoon rest or nap, especially one taken during the hottest hours of the day in a hot climate.
*Everyone had a **siesta** for a few hours.*

sleep A gummy secretion found in the corners of the eyes after sleep.
*He talked in his **sleep**.*



Usage Examples of "Slumber" as a noun

- *Scaring folk from their slumbers.*
- *Calm as a child in dreamless slumber.*

Definitions of "Slumber" as a verb

- *Sleep.*
- *Be asleep.*



Synonyms of "Slumber" as a verb (12 Words)

- be asleep** Happen, occur, take place.
- catch some z's** Perceive by hearing.
- catnap** Have a short sleep during the day.
*Carradine **catnapped** in a hammock between two chairs.*
- doze** Sleep lightly or for a short period of time.
*I **dozed** off for a few seconds.*
- drowse** Be half asleep; doze intermittently.
*Any birds which the heat has not utterly **drowsed**.*
- kip** Be asleep.
- log z's** Cut lumber, as in woods and forests.

nap	Sleep lightly or briefly, especially during the day. <i>She took to napping on the beach in the afternoons.</i>
rest	Give a rest to. <i>Rest assured.</i>
sleep	Be in a state of sleep be asleep. <i>He sleeps in Holywell cemetery.</i>
take a nap	Experience or feel or submit to.
take a siesta	Be seized or affected in a specified way.



Usage Examples of "Slumber" as a verb

- *Sleeping Beauty slumbered in her forest castle.*
- *The village street slumbered under the afternoon sun.*



Associations of "Slumber" (30 Words)

awake	Mentally perceptive and responsive. <i>Was now awake to the reality of his predicament.</i>
awaken	Stop sleeping. <i>Anna was awakened by the telephone.</i>
bedding	A display of bedding plants. <i>A bedding course of sand.</i>
bedtime	The usual time when someone goes to bed. <i>A bedtime story.</i>
daydream	Have a daydream indulge in a fantasy. <i>She was lost in a daydream.</i>
deep	Far down or in deeply. <i>A deep bow.</i>

dormancy	The state in which a plant is alive but not actively growing. <i>Some large volcanoes spend thousands of years in a state of dormancy.</i>
doze	Sleep lightly. <i>I dozed off for a few seconds.</i>
<u>dreaming</u>	Imaginative thoughts indulged in while awake.
dreamy	Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>The atmosphere is tranquil and dreamy.</i>
drowse	Be on the verge of sleeping. <i>He was beginning to drowse in his chair.</i>
<u>drowsy</u>	Half asleep. <i>The drowsy heat of the meadows.</i>
hibernate	(of an animal or plant) spend the winter in a dormant state. <i>Bears must eat a lot of food before they hibernate in their caves.</i>
hibernation	Cessation from or slowing of activity during the winter; especially slowing of metabolism in some animals. <i>We shut down went into hibernation for a week.</i>
hypnotism	The study or practice of hypnosis.
hypnotize	Induce hypnosis in. <i>A witness had been hypnotized to enhance his memory.</i>
insomnia	Habitual sleeplessness; inability to sleep.
loll	(of a part of the body) hang loosely; droop. <i>He slumped against a tree trunk his head lolling back.</i>
<u>midnight</u>	The middle period of the night. <i>The midnight hours.</i>
nap	Sleeping for a short period of time (usually not in bed). <i>She naps everyday after lunch for an hour.</i>
<u>nightmare</u>	A terrifying or deeply upsetting dream. <i>The nightmare of racial hatred.</i>
oversleep	Sleep longer than intended. <i>We talked until the early hours and consequently I overslept.</i>
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Rouse the cable out.</i>
sleep	Be in a state of sleep be asleep. <i>He sleeps in Holywell cemetery.</i>
snore	The act of snoring or producing a snoring sound. <i>She complained that her husband snores.</i>

subconscious The subconscious part of the mind not in technical use in psychoanalysis where unconscious is preferred.

*My **subconscious** fear.*

tonight During the night of the present day.

***Tonight** is a night to remember.*

wake Cause to become awake or conscious.

*The motorboat s **wake** capsized the canoe.*

waken Cause to become awake or conscious.

*They combined to **waken** a forgotten and futile hope.*

waking Marked by full consciousness or alertness.

*Days of danger and nights of **waking**.*
