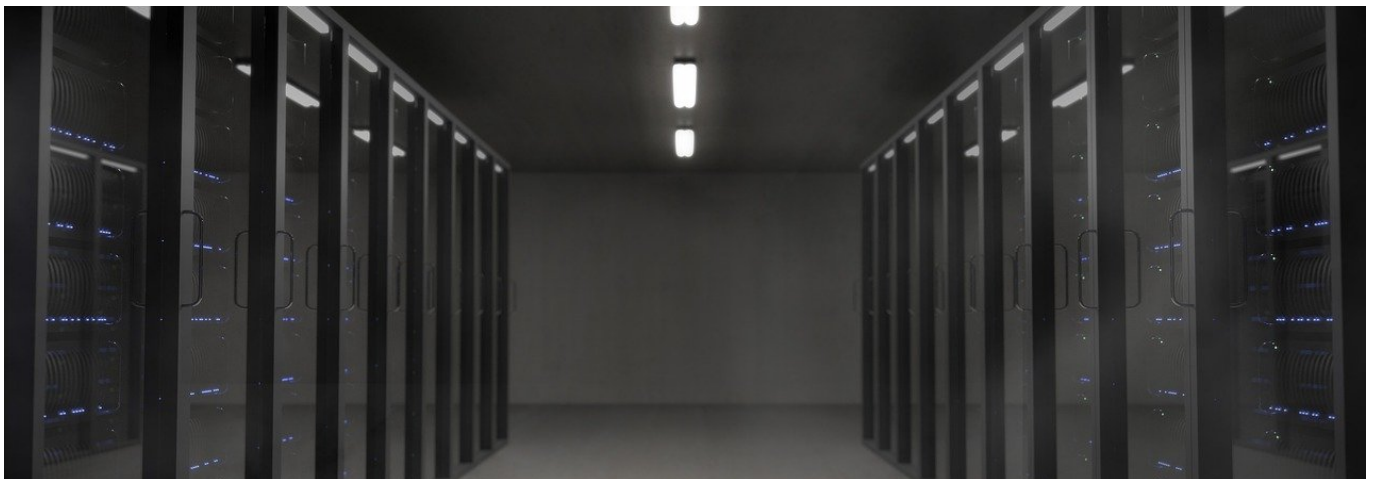

<b>alacrity</b>	Liveliness and eagerness. <i>He accepted with <b>alacrity</b>.</i>
<b>brightness</b>	The quality or state of being well lit. <i>The <b>brightness</b> of a winter s day.</i>
<b>briskness</b>	Liveliness and eagerness.
<b>chic</b>	Stylishness and elegance, typically of a specified kind. <i>The hotel s lobby and restaurant are the height of designer <b>chic</b>.</i>
<b>chichi</b>	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
<b>chicness</b>	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
<b>cleverness</b>	Intelligence as manifested in being quick and witty. <i>People marvelled at his <b>cleverness</b>.</i>
<b>last word</b>	A unit of weight equal to 4,000 pounds.
<b>modishness</b>	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
<b>smart</b>	A kind of pain such as that caused by a wound or a burn or a sore. <i>I don t think I have the <b>smarts</b> for it.</i>
<b>smarting</b>	A kind of pain such as that caused by a wound or a burn or a sore. <i>Ammonia can cause <b>smarting</b> of the eyes and breathing difficulties.</i>
<b>stylishness</b>	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
<b>swank</b>	Behaviour, talk, or display intended to impress others. <i>A little money will buy you a good deal of <b>swank</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Smartness" (30 Words)

<b>astute</b>	Having or showing an ability to accurately assess situations or people and turn this to one's advantage. <i>An <b>astute</b> tenant always reads the small print in a lease.</i>
<b>clever</b>	Sensible; well advised. <i>He taught the dog to perform some very <b>clever</b> tricks.</i>
<b>discerning</b>	Unobtrusively perceptive and sympathetic. <i>A <b>discerning</b> critic.</i>
<b>elite</b>	A group or class of persons enjoying superior intellectual or social or economic status. <i>The country's governing <b>elite</b>.</i>
<b>highbrow</b>	A highbrow person. <i><b>Highbrow</b> events such as the ballet or opera.</i>

<b>intellectual</b>	Relating to the intellect. <i>A prominent political thinker and <b>intellectual</b>.</i>
<b>intelligence</b>	Information in general; news. <i>British <b>intelligence</b> has secured numerous local informers.</i>
<b>intelligent</b>	(of a device or building) able to vary its state or action in response to varying situations and past experience. <i>An <b>intelligent</b> solution.</i>
<b>judgment</b>	The cognitive process of reaching a decision or drawing conclusions. <i>He was reluctant to make his <b>judgment</b> known.</i>
<b>judiciously</b>	With good judgement or sense. <i>His work has been carefully and <b>judiciously</b> edited.</i>
<b>judiciousness</b>	Good judgment.
<b>knowing</b>	Highly educated; having extensive information or understanding. <i>A <b>knowing</b> act of fraud.</i>
<b>knowledge</b>	Information held on a computer system. <i>The transmission of <b>knowledge</b>.</i>
<b>knowledgeable</b>	Thoroughly acquainted through study or experience-W.H.Hudson- Herbert Read. <i>A <b>knowledgeable</b> critic.</i>
<b>learned</b>	Used as a courteous description of a lawyer in certain formal contexts. <i>An article in a <b>learned</b> journal.</i>
<b>lettered</b>	Highly educated; having extensive information or understanding. <i>Though not <b>lettered</b> he read widely.</i>
<b>literati</b>	Well-educated people who are interested in literature.
<b>mindset</b>	The established set of attitudes held by someone. <i>The region seems stuck in a medieval <b>mindset</b>.</i>
<b>perspicacious</b>	Mentally acute or penetratingly discerning. <i>Much too <b>perspicacious</b> to be taken in by such a spurious argument.</i>
<b>perspicacity</b>	Intelligence manifested by being astute (as in business dealings). <i>The <b>perspicacity</b> of her remarks.</i>
<b>sagacious</b>	Having or showing keen mental discernment and good judgement; wise or shrewd. <i>They were <b>sagacious</b> enough to avoid any outright confrontation.</i>
<b>sagacity</b>	The quality of being sagacious. <i>A man of great political <b>sagacity</b>.</i>
<b>sapience</b>	Ability to apply knowledge or experience or understanding or common sense and insight.



<b>sapient</b>	(chiefly in science fiction) intelligent. <i><b>Sapient</b> life forms.</i>
<b>sapiential</b>	Characterized by wisdom, especially the wisdom of God. <i>I saw them as <b>sapiential</b> metaphors far more meaningful than their didactic pretext.</i>
<b>savvy</b>	Shrewdness and practical knowledge; the ability to make good judgements. <i>Many of us pride ourselves on being <b>savvy</b> enough to spot a fake.</i>
<b>sensible</b>	Done or chosen in accordance with wisdom or prudence; likely to be of benefit. <i>Even amoeba are <b>sensible</b> creatures.</i>
<b>understanding</b>	Characterized by understanding based on comprehension and discernment and empathy. <i>He and I have an <b>understanding</b>.</i>
<b>wisdom</b>	An Apocryphal book consisting mainly of a meditation on wisdom although ascribed to Solomon it was probably written in the first century BC. <i>Some questioned the <b>wisdom</b> of building the dam so close to an active volcano.</i>
<b>wise</b>	Improperly forward or bold. <i>A <b>wise</b> and perceptive comment.</i>
