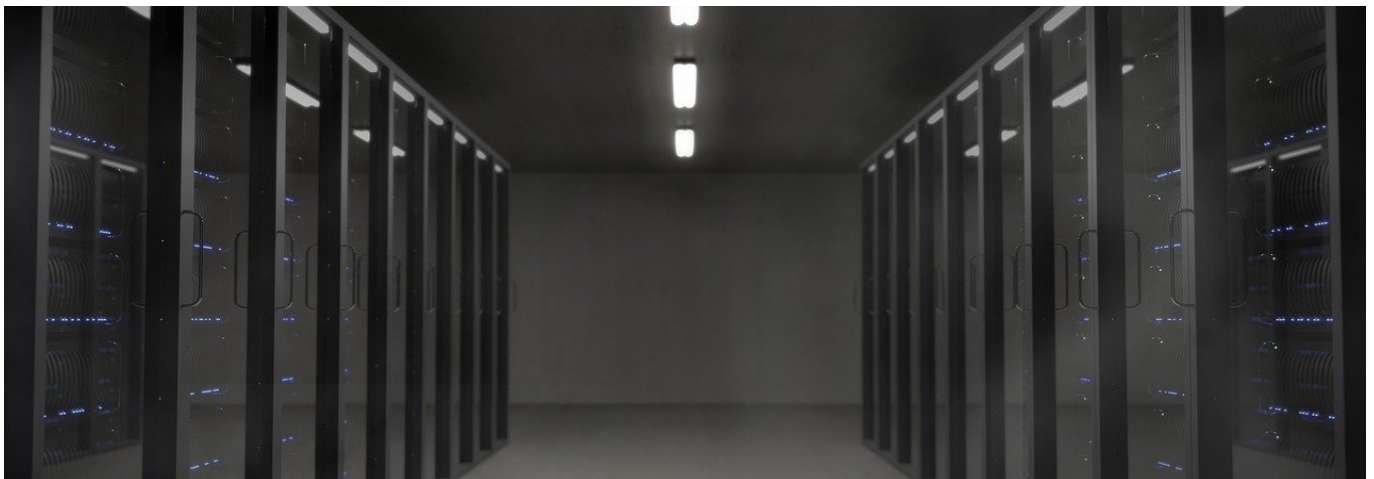

<u>alacrity</u>	Liveliness and eagerness. <i>He accepted with alacrity.</i>
<u>brightness</u>	The quality or state of being well lit. <i>The brightness of a winter s day.</i>
briskness	Liveliness and eagerness.
<u>chic</u>	Stylishness and elegance, typically of a specified kind. <i>The hotel s lobby and restaurant are the height of designer chic.</i>
chichi	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
chicness	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
cleverness	Intelligence as manifested in being quick and witty. <i>People marvelled at his cleverness.</i>
last word	A unit of weight equal to 4,000 pounds.
modishness	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
smart	A kind of pain such as that caused by a wound or a burn or a sore. <i>I don t think I have the smarts for it.</i>
smarting	A kind of pain such as that caused by a wound or a burn or a sore. <i>Ammonia can cause smarting of the eyes and breathing difficulties.</i>
stylishness	Elegance by virtue of being fashionable.
swank	Behaviour, talk, or display intended to impress others. <i>A little money will buy you a good deal of swank.</i>



Usage Examples of "Smartness" as a noun

Associations of "Smartness" (30 Words)

astute	Having or showing an ability to accurately assess situations or people and turn this to one's advantage. <i>An astute tenant always reads the small print in a lease.</i>
clever	Sensible; well advised. <i>He taught the dog to perform some very clever tricks.</i>
discerning	Unobtrusively perceptive and sympathetic. <i>A discerning critic.</i>
elite	A group or class of persons enjoying superior intellectual or social or economic status. <i>The country's governing elite.</i>
highbrow	A highbrow person. <i>Highbrow events such as the ballet or opera.</i>

intellectual	Relating to the intellect. <i>A prominent political thinker and intellectual.</i>
intelligence	Information in general; news. <i>British intelligence has secured numerous local informers.</i>
intelligent	(of a device or building) able to vary its state or action in response to varying situations and past experience. <i>An intelligent solution.</i>
judgment	The cognitive process of reaching a decision or drawing conclusions. <i>He was reluctant to make his judgment known.</i>
judiciously	With good judgement or sense. <i>His work has been carefully and judiciously edited.</i>
judiciousness	Good judgment.
knowing	Highly educated; having extensive information or understanding. <i>A knowing act of fraud.</i>
knowledge	Information held on a computer system. <i>The transmission of knowledge.</i>
knowledgeable	Thoroughly acquainted through study or experience-W.H.Hudson- Herbert Read. <i>A knowledgeable critic.</i>
learned	Used as a courteous description of a lawyer in certain formal contexts. <i>An article in a learned journal.</i>
lettered	Highly educated; having extensive information or understanding. <i>Though not lettered he read widely.</i>
literati	Well-educated people who are interested in literature.
mindset	The established set of attitudes held by someone. <i>The region seems stuck in a medieval mindset.</i>
perspicacious	Mentally acute or penetratingly discerning. <i>Much too perspicacious to be taken in by such a spurious argument.</i>
perspicacity	Intelligence manifested by being astute (as in business dealings). <i>The perspicacity of her remarks.</i>
sagacious	Having or showing keen mental discernment and good judgement; wise or shrewd. <i>They were sagacious enough to avoid any outright confrontation.</i>
sagacity	The quality of being sagacious. <i>A man of great political sagacity.</i>
sapience	Ability to apply knowledge or experience or understanding or common sense and insight.

sapient	(chiefly in science fiction) intelligent. <i>Sapient life forms.</i>
sapiential	Characterized by wisdom, especially the wisdom of God. <i>I saw them as sapiential metaphors far more meaningful than their didactic pretext.</i>
savvy	Shrewdness and practical knowledge; the ability to make good judgements. <i>Many of us pride ourselves on being savvy enough to spot a fake.</i>
sensible	Done or chosen in accordance with wisdom or prudence; likely to be of benefit. <i>Even amoeba are sensible creatures.</i>
understanding	Characterized by understanding based on comprehension and discernment and empathy. <i>He and I have an understanding.</i>
wisdom	An Apocryphal book consisting mainly of a meditation on wisdom although ascribed to Solomon it was probably written in the first century BC. <i>Some questioned the wisdom of building the dam so close to an active volcano.</i>
wise	Improperly forward or bold. <i>A wise and perceptive comment.</i>
