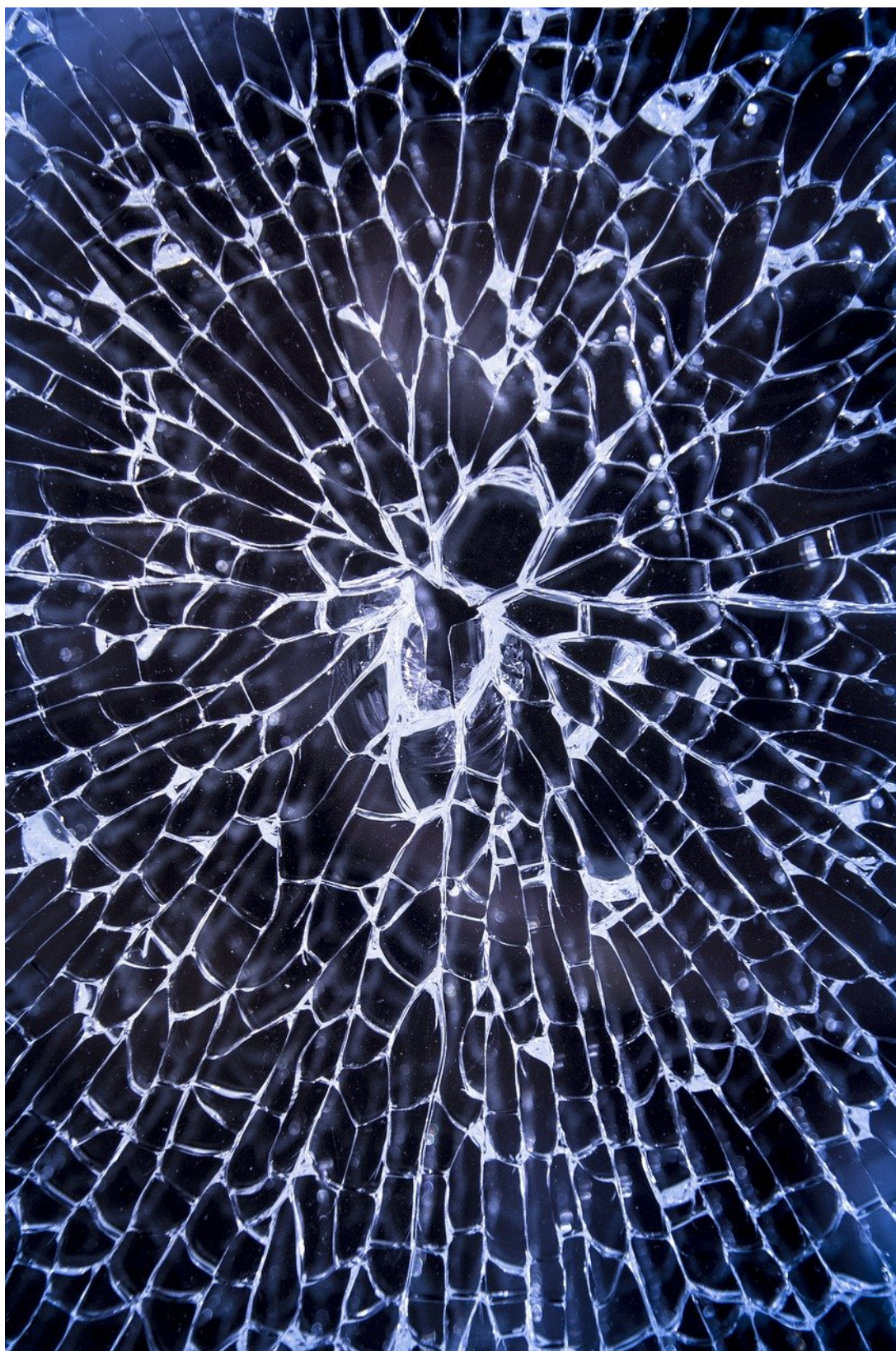

## Synonyms of "Smashed" as an adjective (29 Words)

<b>befuddled</b>	Stupefied by alcoholic drink. <i>The wino s poor <b>befuddled</b> mind.</i>
<b><u>besotted</u></b>	Strongly infatuated. <i>He became <b>besotted</b> with a local barmaid.</i>
<b>blind drunk</b>	Unable or unwilling to perceive or understand.
<b>blotto</b>	Extremely drunk. <i>We got <b>blotto</b>.</i>
<b>cockeyed</b>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i><b>Cockeyed</b> camera angles.</i>
<b>crooked</b>	Very drunk. <i>He replaced the <b>crooked</b> captain early in the game.</i>
<b>drunken</b>	Caused by or showing the effects of drink. <i>His violent <b>drunken</b> father.</i>
<b>fuddled</b>	Confused or stupefied, especially as a result of drinking alcohol. <i>Benjamin was trying to clear his drink <b>fuddled</b> brain.</i>
<b><u>incapable</u></b>	Not having the temperament or inclination for. <i>Wilson blushed and was <b>incapable</b> of speech.</i>
<b><u>inebriated</u></b>	Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>Helplessly <b>inebriated</b>.</i>
<b><u>intoxicated</u></b>	As if under the influence of alcohol. <i>Felt <b>intoxicated</b> by her success.</i>
<b>loaded</b>	(of a firearm) charged with ammunition. <i>1989 Ford 250 LXT low miles <b>loaded</b>.</i>
<b>maudlin</b>	Self-pityingly or tearfully sentimental. <i><b>Maudlin</b> expressions of sympathy.</i>
<b>pie-eyed</b>	Very drunk.
<b>pixilated</b>	Very drunk.
<b>plastered</b>	(of walls) covered with a coat of plaster. <i>Coarsely <b>plastered</b> brickwork.</i>
<b>slopped</b>	Very drunk.
<b>sloshed</b>	Drunk. <i>I drank a lot of wine and got <b>sloshed</b>.</i>
<b><u>soaked</u></b>	Extremely wet; saturated. <i>A sun <b>soaked</b> beach.</i>

<b>sozzled</b>	Very drunk. <i>Uncle Brian s <b>sozzled</b>.</i>
<b>squiffy</b>	Very drunk. <i>The graphics make your eyes go <b>squiffy</b>.</i>
<b>stiff</b>	(of a wind) blowing strongly. <i>She greeted him with <b>stiff</b> politeness.</i>
<b>the worse for drink</b>	Inferior to another in quality or condition or desirability.
<b>tight</b>	Of a community or other group of people having close relations tight knit. <i>A <b>tight</b> parking spot.</i>
<b>tipsy</b>	Unstable and prone to tip as if intoxicated. <i><b>Tipsy</b> revellers.</i>
<b>under the influence</b>	Lower in rank, power, or authority.
<b>wet</b>	Very drunk. <i>A <b>wet</b> canteen.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Smashed" as an adjective

- *When they go back to the barracks, the single men get smashed.*
- *A smashed collar bone.*



## Associations of "Smashed" (30 Words)

- annihilate** Destroy utterly; obliterate.  
*A fraction of the mass of atomic nuclei is **annihilated**.*
- break** Breaking of hard tissue such as bone.  
*This play will either make or **break** the playwright.*
- breaker** A person who breaks up disused machinery.  
*Those steam engines were now gone to the **breaker** s yard.*
- bust** Separate or cause to separate abruptly.  
*A 36 inch **bust**.*

<b>clash</b>	A mismatch of colours. <i>Two meteors <b>clashed</b>.</i>
<b><u>collapse</u></b>	Cause a lung or blood vessel to collapse. <i>Some cots <b>collapse</b> down to fit into a holdall.</i>
<b>collide</b>	Cause to collide. <i>In his work politics and metaphysics <b>collide</b>.</i>
<b><u>collision</u></b>	(physics) a brief event in which two or more bodies come together. <i>A <b>collision</b> of two diverse cultures and languages.</i>
<b>crash</b>	Enter a party without an invitation gatecrash. <i>The terrorists <b>crashed</b> the gate.</i>
<b>crush</b>	Crush or bruise. <i>The car <b>crushed</b> the toy.</i>
<b>damage</b>	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. <i>Bombing caused extensive <b>damage</b> to the town.</i>
<b><u>demolish</u></b>	Comprehensively refute (an argument or its proponent). <i>Brown was busy <b>demolishing</b> a sausage roll.</i>
<b>demolition</b>	The act of demolishing. <i>The <b>demolition</b> of the huge tower was quite a spectacle.</i>
<b>destroy</b>	Destroy completely damage irreparably. <i>The customs agents <b>destroyed</b> the dog that was found to be rabid.</i>
<b><u>destruction</u></b>	The action or process of killing or being killed. <i>Gambling was his <b>destruction</b>.</i>
<b>devastate</b>	Cause extensive destruction or ruin utterly. <i>He was <b>devastated</b> by his grief when his son died.</i>
<b>dilapidation</b>	A cause of action to force a tenant to pay for dilapidations. <i>The mill was in a state of <b>dilapidation</b>.</i>
<b><u>dismantle</u></b>	Take (a machine or structure) to pieces. <i>The old regime was <b>dismantled</b>.</i>
<b>iconoclasm</b>	The action of attacking or assertively rejecting cherished beliefs and institutions or established values and practices.
<b>iconoclast</b>	A supporter of the 8th- and 9th-century movement in the Byzantine Church which sought to abolish the veneration of icons and other religious images.
<b>kaput</b>	Destroyed or killed. <i>The water pump s broken <b>kaput</b>.</i>
<b>mangle</b>	Press with a mangle. <i><b>Mangle</b> the sheets.</i>

<b>moribund</b>	Being on the point of death; breathing your last. <i>A <b>moribund</b> patient.</i>
<b>pulverize</b>	Destroy completely. <i>The brick of the villages was <b>pulverized</b> by the bombardment.</i>
<b>raze</b>	Tear down so as to make flat with the ground. <i>Villages were <b>razed</b> to the ground.</i>
<b>removal</b>	The act of removing. <i>The <b>removal</b> of all legal barriers to the free movement of goods.</i>
<b>ruin</b>	Destruction achieved by causing something to be wrecked or ruined. <i>You have <b>ruined</b> my car by pouring sugar in the tank.</i>
<b>shatter</b>	Damage or destroy. <i>Everyone was <b>shattered</b> by the news.</i>
<b>shipwreck</b>	Of a person or ship suffer a shipwreck. <i>The angry waves whose fury heralds <b>shipwreck</b>.</i>
<b><u>subversion</u></b>	The act of subverting; as overthrowing or destroying a legally constituted government. <i>An 11 year sentence for inciting <b>subversion</b>.</i>
