inebriated Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol.

Helplessly inebriated.

intoxicated As if under the influence of alcohol.

Felt **intoxicated** by her success.

loaded (of a firearm) charged with ammunition.

1989 Ford 250 LXT low miles loaded.

maudlin Self-pityingly or tearfully sentimental.

Maudlin expressions of sympathy.

pie-eyed Very drunk.pixilated Very drunk.

plastered (of walls) covered with a coat of plaster.

Coarsely **plastered** brickwork.

slopped Very drunk.

sloshed Drunk.

I drank a lot of wine and got **sloshed**.

soaked Extremely wet; saturated.

A sun **soaked** beach.



sozzled Very drunk.

Uncle Brian s sozzled.

squiffy Very drunk.

The graphics make your eyes go squiffy.

stiff (of a wind) blowing strongly.

She greeted him with **stiff** politeness.

the worse for drink Inferior to another in quality or condition or desirability.

Of a community or other group of people having close relations tight

tight knit.

A **tight** parking spot.


Unstable and prone to tip as if intoxicated.

Tipsy revellers.

under the influence Lower in rank, power, or authority.

wet Very drunk.


A wet canteen.

annihilate Destroy utterly; obliterate.

A fraction of the mass of atomic nuclei is **annihilate**d.

breakBreaking of hard tissue such as bone.

This play will either make or **break** the playwright.

breaker A person who breaks up disused machinery.

Those steam engines were now gone to the **breaker** s yard.

bust Separate or cause to separate abruptly.

A 36 inch **bust**.



clash A mismatch of colours.

Two meteors **clash**ed.

Cause a lung or blood vessel to collapse.

Some cots **collapse** down to fit into a holdall.

collide Cause to collide.

In his work politics and metaphysics **collide**.

collision (physics) a brief event in which two or more bodies come together.

A **collision** of two diverse cultures and languages.

crash Enter a party without an invitation gatecrash.

The terrorists **crash**ed the gate.

crush Crush or bruise.

The car **crush**ed the toy.

damage Suffer or be susceptible to damage.

Bombing caused extensive **damage** to the town.

demolish Comprehensively refute (an argument or its proponent.

Brown was busy **demolish**ing a sausage roll.

demolition The act of demolishing.

The **demolition** of the huge tower was quite a spectacle.

destroy Destroy completely damage irreparably.

The customs agents **destroy**ed the dog that was found to be rabid.

destruction The action or process of killing or being killed.

Gambling was his **destruction**.

devastate Cause extensive destruction or ruin utterly.

He was **devastate**d by his grief when his son died.

dilapidation A cause of action to force a tenant to pay for dilapidations.

The mill was in a state of **dilapidation**.

dismantle Take (a machine or structure) to pieces.

The old regime was **dismantle**d.

iconoclasm The action of attacking or assertively rejecting cherished beliefs and

institutions or established values and practices.

iconoclast A supporter of the 8th- and 9th-century movement in the Byzantine Church

which sought to abolish the veneration of icons and other religious images.

kaput Destroyed or killed.

The water pump s broken **kaput**.

mangle Press with a mangle.

Mangle the sheets.



moribund

Being on the point of death; breathing your last.

A **moribund** patient.

pulverize Destroy completely.

The brick of the villages was **pulverize**d by the bombardment.

Tear down so as to make flat with the ground.

Villages were **raze**d to the ground.

removal The act of removing.

The **removal** of all legal barriers to the free movement of goods.

Destruction achieved by causing something to be wrecked or ruined.

You have **ruin**ed my car by pouring sugar in the tank.

shatter Damage or destroy.

Everyone was **shatter**ed by the news.

shipwreck Of a person or ship suffer a shipwreck.

The angry waves whose fury heralds **shipwreck**.

The act of subverting; as overthrowing or destroying a legally constituted

subversion government.

An 11 year sentence for inciting **subversion**.
