### **Definitions of "Smirk" as a verb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “smirk” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Smile in an irritatingly smug, conceited, or silly way.*
- *Smile affectedly or derisively.*



### Synonyms of "Smirk" as a verb (3 Words)

- simper** Smile in an affectedly coy or ingratiating manner.  
*Luke darling she **simpered**.*
- smile smugly** Express with a smile.
- snigger** Laugh in a half-suppressed, typically scornful way.  
*Doesn't he look a fool they **sniggered**.*







## Usage Examples of "Smirk" as a verb

- *He smirked in triumph.*



## Associations of "Smirk" (30 Words)

- amusement** A feeling of delight at being entertained.  
*She was like an adult planning **amusements** for a child.*
- approvingly** In an approving manner.  
*Several heads nodded **approvingly** at this concept.*
- chortle** A noisy, gleeful laugh.  
*Thomas gave a **chortle**.*
- chuckle** Laugh quietly or with restraint.  
*Melissa gave a **chuckle**.*
- cuddly** Inviting cuddling or hugging.  
*A **cuddly** toy.*
- derisive** Abusing vocally; expressing contempt or ridicule.  
***Derisive** laughter.*

<b><u>giggle</u></b>	An amusing person or thing; a joke. <i>I got a fit of the <b>giggles</b>.</i>
<b><u>glad</u></b>	Make happy; please. <i><b>Glad</b> that they succeeded.</i>
<b><u>grin</u></b>	Express with a broad smile. <i>Dennis appeared <b>grinning</b> cheerfully.</i>
<b>guffaw</b>	A loud and hearty laugh. <i>Both men <b>guffawed</b> at the remark.</i>
<b><u>hilarious</u></b>	Marked by or causing boisterous merriment or convulsive laughter. <i><b>Hilarious</b> broad comedy.</i>
<b>hilarity</b>	Great merriment. <i>By midnight the <b>hilarity</b> had increased.</i>
<b>jape</b>	A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. <i>The childish <b>jape</b> of depositing a stink bomb in her locker.</i>
<b>jest</b>	An object of derision. <i>You <b>jest</b> surely.</i>
<b>jocular</b>	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>She sounded in a <b>jocular</b> mood.</i>
<b><u>joyful</u></b>	Full of or producing joy. <i>A <b>joyful</b> occasion.</i>
<b>laugh</b>	A facial expression characteristic of a person laughing. <i>She couldn't help <b>laughing</b> at his jokes.</i>
<b>laughter</b>	The action or sound of laughing. <i>He enjoyed the <b>laughter</b> of the crowd.</i>
<b>mirth</b>	Great merriment. <i>His six foot frame shook with <b>mirth</b>.</i>
<b><u>mischievous</u></b>	Causing or showing a fondness for causing trouble in a playful way. <i><b>Mischievous</b> children.</i>
<b><u>nod</u></b>	An act of nodding the head. <i>The flowers were <b>nodding</b> in the breeze.</i>
<b>simper</b>	An affectedly coy or ingratiating smile. <i>She <b>simpered</b> looking pleased with herself.</i>
<b>smile</b>	Express with a smile. <i>She <b>smiled</b> her thanks.</i>
<b>smiley</b>	Smiling; cheerful. <i>He drew a <b>smiley</b> face.</i>

- smiling** Smiling with happiness or optimism.  
*It s nice to see everyone s **smiling** faces.*
- snicker** (of a horse) whinny.  
*The horse flicked its ears and **snickered** with pleasure.*
- tickle** Touch or stroke lightly.  
*He is **tickled** by the idea.*
- titter** Give a short, half-suppressed laugh; giggle.  
*There were **titters** from the gallery.*
- uproarious** Marked by or causing boisterous merriment or convulsive laughter.  
*An **uproarious** party.*
- wink** An act of winking.  
*The diamond on her finger **winked** in the moonlight.*
