- welt** A heavy blow.  
*Let me give it a **welt** with my hammer.*

## Definitions of "Smite" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "smite" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Strike with a firm blow.*
- *Inflict a heavy blow on, with the hand, a tool, or a weapon.*
- *Defeat or conquer (a people or land).*
- *Be strongly attracted to someone or something.*
- *(especially of disease) attack or affect severely.*
- *Cause physical pain or suffering in.*
- *Affect suddenly with deep feeling.*

<b><a href="#">assail</a></b>	Criticize strongly. <i>Serbian forces <b>assailed</b> Bosnian towns all week.</i>
<b>attack</b>	Launch an attack or assault on begin hostilities or start warfare with. <i>I <b>attacked</b> the problem as soon as I got out of bed.</i>
<b>attracted to</b>	Be attractive to.
<b>bang</b>	Leap jerk bang. <i>He <b>banged</b> the kitchen door shut behind him.</i>
<b>batter</b>	Make a dent or impression in. <i>A prisoner was <b>battered</b> to death with a table leg.</i>
<b>beat</b>	Shape by beating. <i>They hire boys to <b>beat</b> the Yorkshire moors for game birds.</i>
<b>belabour</b>	Attack verbally with harsh criticism. <i>There is no need to <b>belabour</b> the point.</i>
<b>box someone's ears</b>	Hit with the fist.
<b>cane</b>	Beat with a cane. <i>They have <b>canned</b> Essex and Durham in the Championship.</i>

<b>cuff</b>	Confine or restrain with or as if with manacles or handcuffs. <i>The man s hands were <b>cuffed</b> behind his back.</i>
<b>drub</b>	Beat thoroughly and conclusively in a competition or fight. <i>He was <b>drubbed</b> with tiresome regularity by his classmates.</i>
<b>enchanted by</b>	Hold spellbound.
<b>flog</b>	Beat (someone) with a whip or stick as a punishment. <i>By 10 pm we had <b>flogged</b> up the slopes to Grey Crag.</i>
<b>give someone a beating</b>	Allow to have or take.
<b>give someone a drubbing</b>	Transmit (knowledge or skills).
<b>give someone a good beating</b>	Convey or communicate; of a smile, a look, a physical gesture.
<b>give someone a good drubbing</b>	Bestow, especially officially.
<b>hammer</b>	Hit or beat something repeatedly with a hammer or similar object. <i><b>Hammer</b> the metal flat.</i>
<b>harrow</b>	Draw a harrow over land. <i>Todd could take it whereas I m <b>harrowed</b> by it.</i>
<b>head over heels in love with</b>	Form a head or come or grow to a head.
<b>hook</b>	Catch with a hook. <i>The truck had a red lamp <b>hooked</b> to its tailgate.</i>
<b>keen on</b>	Express grief verbally.
<b>knock</b>	Knock against with force or violence. <i>You have had a setback that has <b>knocked</b> your self esteem.</i>
<b><u>pound</u></b>	Place or shut up in a pound. <i>The prisoners are safely <b>pounded</b>.</i>
<b>pummel</b>	Strike repeatedly with the fists. <i>He has been <b>pummelled</b> by the reviewers.</i>
<b>punch</b>	Drive forcibly as if by a punch. <i>He <b>punched</b> her in the face and ran off.</i>
<b>rain blows on</b>	Precipitate as rain.
<b><u>slam</u></b>	Dance the slam dance. <i>He <b>slammed</b> a shot into the net.</i>

<b>slap</b>	Hit against or into something with the sound of something being slapped. <i>The impatient teacher <b>slapped</b> the student.</i>
<b>smack</b>	Crack (a whip). <i>The teacher <b>smacked</b> the student who had misbehaved.</i>
<b>smash</b>	Hit or attack (someone) very violently. <i>My Volvo <b>smashed</b> up.</i>
<b>strike</b>	Undertake strike action against an employer. <i><b>Strike</b> a balance.</i>
<b>swat</b>	Hit or crush (something, especially an insect) with a sharp blow from a flat object. <i>She was <b>swatting</b> at a fly.</i>
<b>taken with</b>	Engage for service under a term of contract.
<b>thrash</b>	Give a thrashing to beat hard. <i>The feverish patient <b>thrashed</b> around in his bed.</i>
<b>thump</b>	Play a tune enthusiastically but heavy-handedly. <i>Holman <b>thumped</b> the desk with his hand.</i>
<b>torment</b>	Torment emotionally or mentally. <i>He was <b>tormented</b> by jealousy.</i>
<b>torture</b>	Subject to torture. <i>Most of the victims had been brutally <b>tortured</b>.</i>
<b>trouble</b>	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>My legs started to <b>trouble</b> me.</i>
<b>welt</b>	Provide with a welt. <i><b>Welt</b> the shoes.</i>
<b>whip</b>	Strike as if by whipping. <i>He <b>whipped</b> out his revolver and shot him.</i>
