## Synonyms of "Smitten" as an adjective (7 Words)

Marked by foolish or unreasoning fondness.

**enamored** *Narcissus was a beautiful Greek youth who became **enamored** of his own reflection.*

**in love** Holding office.

**infatuated** Possessed with an intense but short-lived passion or admiration for someone.  
*An **infatuated** teenager.*

**soft on** Having little impact.

**stricken** Grievously affected especially by disease.  
*She looked at Anne's **stricken** face contorted with worry.*

**struck** (used in combination) affected by something overwhelming.  
*Awe **struck**.*

<b>adoring</b>	Showing adoration. <i>Adoring</i> grandparents.
<b>affection</b>	A positive feeling of liking. <i>He had trouble expressing the affection he felt.</i>
<b>affectionate</b>	Having or displaying warmth or affection. <i>Affectionate</i> children.
<b>amatory</b>	Expressive of or exciting sexual love or romance. <i>Her amatory</i> affairs.
<b>amorous</b>	Expressive of or exciting sexual love or romance. <i>Feeling</i> <b>amorous</b> .
<b>attached</b>	Full of affection or fondness. <i>Please complete the attached</i> form.
<b>beautiful</b>	Pleasing the senses or mind aesthetically. <i>Beautiful</i> poetry.
<b>beauty</b>	The qualities that give pleasure to the senses. <i>He arrived with a blonde beauty on his arm.</i>
<b>benediction</b>	A prayer asking for divine blessing. <i>He eventually wins benediction.</i>
<b>caring</b>	Feeling and exhibiting concern and empathy for others. <i>The caring</i> professions.
<b>cherish</b>	Be fond of; be attached to. <i>I cherish</i> the letters she wrote.
<b>decorous</b>	Characterized by propriety and dignity and good taste in manners and conduct. <i>The tete a tete was decorous in the extreme.</i>
<b>delicate</b>	A delicate fabric or garment. <i>His delicate</i> ball playing skills.
<b>doting</b>	Extremely and uncritically fond of someone; adoring. <i>Deceiving her preoccupied and doting</i> husband with a young captain.

<b>enamored</b>	Marked by foolish or unreasoning fondness. <i>Narcissus was a beautiful Greek youth who became <b>enamored</b> of his own reflection.</i>
<b>enchantingly</b>	In a bewitching manner.
<b>fond</b>	Having a strong preference or liking for. <i>Hopelessly spoiled by a <b>fond</b> mother.</i>
<b>infatuated</b>	Marked by foolish or unreasoning fondness. <i>An <b>infatuated</b> teenager.</i>
<b>lovely</b>	Very beautiful or attractive. <i><b>Lovely</b> views.</i>
<b>loving</b>	Feeling or showing love or great care. <i>The cargo was described in <b>loving</b> detail.</i>
<b>mawkish</b>	Having a faint sickly flavour. <i>A <b>mawkish</b> ode to parenthood.</i>
<b>melodrama</b>	The genre of melodrama. <i>What little is known of his early life is cloaked in <b>melodrama</b>.</i>
<b>obsess</b>	Be preoccupied with something. <i>He was <b>obsessed</b> with the idea of revenge.</i>
<b>rendezvous</b>	Meet at a rendezvous. <i>A lively West End restaurant <b>rendezvous</b>.</i>
<b>romantic</b>	A person with romantic beliefs or attitudes. <i>A <b>romantic</b> adventure.</i>
<b>sentimentality</b>	Falsely emotional in a maudlin way. <i>There are passages which verge on <b>sentimentality</b>.</i>
<b>stun</b>	Knock unconscious or into a dazed or semi-conscious state. <i>The news <b>stunned</b> her.</i>
<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>She <b>surprised</b> the couple.</i>
<b>tender</b>	Make a tender of in legal settlements. <i>The pale <b>tender</b> skin of her forearm.</i>
<b>tryst</b>	Keep a private, romantic rendezvous with a lover. <i>A moonlight <b>tryst</b>.</i>
