Synonyms of "Smug" as an adjective (7 Words)

<u>complacent</u>	Contented to a fault with oneself or one's actions. <i>He had become</i> complacent <i>after years of success.</i>
pleased with oneself	Experiencing or manifesting pleasure.
proud of oneself	Feeling self-respect or pleasure in something by which you measure your self-worth; or being a reason for pride.
puffed up	Gathered for protruding fullness.
self-satisfied	Contented to a fault with oneself or one's actions.
superior	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>Deploying superior force.</i>
well pleased	Resulting favorably.



Usage Examples of "Smug" as an adjective

- A smug glow of self-congratulation.
- He was feeling smug after his win.

Associations of "Smug" (30 Words)

arty	Making a strong, affected, or pretentious display of being artistic or interested in the arts. A very arty film.
blowhard	A boastful or pompous person. Blowhard politicians.
boastful	Exhibiting self-importance. A boastful letter.
<u>braggadocio</u>	Boastful or arrogant behaviour.
braggart	A person who boasts about their achievements or possessions. Braggart men.
bragging	An instance of boastful talk. She interrupted their endless bragging .
conceit	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He is alarmed by the widespread</i> conceit that he spent most of the 1980s drunk.
conceited	Excessively proud of oneself; vain. A conceited fool.
<u>condescending</u>	(used of behavior or attitude) characteristic of those who treat others with condescension. She thought the teachers were arrogant and condescending .
content	Make content. The greater part of the century was a time of content .
contented	Feeling or expressing happiness or satisfaction. A contented smile.
<u>haughty</u>	Arrogantly superior and disdainful. A haughty British aristocrat.
immodest	Having or showing an exaggerated opinion of your importance, ability, etc. <i>TV shows full of immodest language.</i>
insolently	In an insolent manner.



look	Of a building or room have an outlook in a specified direction. <i>You don t look your age.</i>
lordly	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>Heir to a lordly fortune.</i>
overbearing	Expecting unquestioning obedience. Insufferably overbearing behavior toward the waiter.
overweening	Showing excessive confidence or pride. Had a witty but overweening manner.
<u>pleased</u>	Feeling pleasurable satisfaction over something by which you measures your self-worth. Both girls were pleased with their new hairstyles.
pomposity	Lack of elegance as a consequence of being pompous and puffed up with vanity. <i>His reputation for arrogance and pomposity.</i>
poseur	A person who habitually pretends to be something he is not.
<u>pride</u>	A feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction derived from one's own achievements, the achievements of those with whom one is closely associated, or from qualities or possessions that are widely admired. <i>He prides himself on making it into law school.</i>
proud	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. A proud moment.
<u>satisfied</u>	Contented; pleased. She was very satisfied with the results.
supercilious	Behaving or looking as though one thinks one is superior to others. <i>His mother eyed my clothes with a supercilious air.</i>
superciliousness	The trait of displaying arrogance by patronizing those considered inferior.
vainglorious	Excessively proud of oneself or one's achievements; overly vain. This vainglorious boast of personal infallibility.
vainglory	Outspoken conceit. His vainglory put the Republic at risk.
<u>vanity</u>	Feelings of excessive pride. A vanity press.
vaunt	Extravagant self-praise. An autobiographer is simultaneously vaunt ed and castigated for revealing more than is deemed proper.
