- *A brief look or summary.*
- *An informal photograph; usually made with a small hand-held camera.*

<b><u>image</u></b>	A representation of the external form of a person or thing in art. <i>He provided America with an <b>image</b> of the good father.</i>
<b>likeness</b>	Similarity in appearance or character or nature between persons or things. <i>Her <b>likeness</b> to him was astonishing.</i>
<b>negative</b>	A negative photographic image made on film or specially prepared glass from which positive prints may be made. <i>The percentage of false <b>negatives</b> generated by a cancer test was of great concern.</i>
<b><u>photo</u></b>	A photograph.
<b>photograph</b>	A representation of a person or scene in the form of a print or transparent slide; recorded by a camera on light-sensitive material. <i>A <b>photograph</b> of her father.</i>
<b>picture</b>	A typical example of some state or quality. <i>His <b>pictures</b> hang in the Louvre.</i>
<b><u>plate</u></b>	A plate of food contributed by a guest to a social gathering. <i>She lifted the <b>plate</b> in victory.</i>
<b><u>portrait</u></b>	Any likeness of a person, in any medium. <i>You can print landscape and <b>portrait</b> pages in the same document.</i>
<b>positive</b>	An adjective or adverb in the positive degree. <i>Take your weaknesses and translate them into <b>positives</b>.</i>
<b>print</b>	Fingerprints. <i>She forced herself to concentrate on the tiny <b>print</b>.</i>
<b><u>proof</u></b>	The strength of distilled alcoholic spirits relative to proof spirit taken as a standard of 100. <i>If you have any <b>proof</b> for what you say now is the time to produce it.</i>
<b>shot</b>	Tiny lead pellets used in quantity in a single charge or cartridge in a shotgun. <i>The nurse gave him a flu <b>shot</b>.</i>
<b><u>slide</u></b>	Plaything consisting of a sloping chute down which children can slide. <i>Use an ice axe to halt a <b>slide</b> on ice and snow.</i>
<b>snap</b>	Tender green beans without strings that easily snap into sections. <i>The waistband had lost its <b>snap</b>.</i>
<b>still</b>	An apparatus used for the distillation of liquids consists of a vessel in which a substance is vaporized by heat and a condenser where the vapor is condensed. <i>He wanted some <b>stills</b> for a magazine ad.</i>

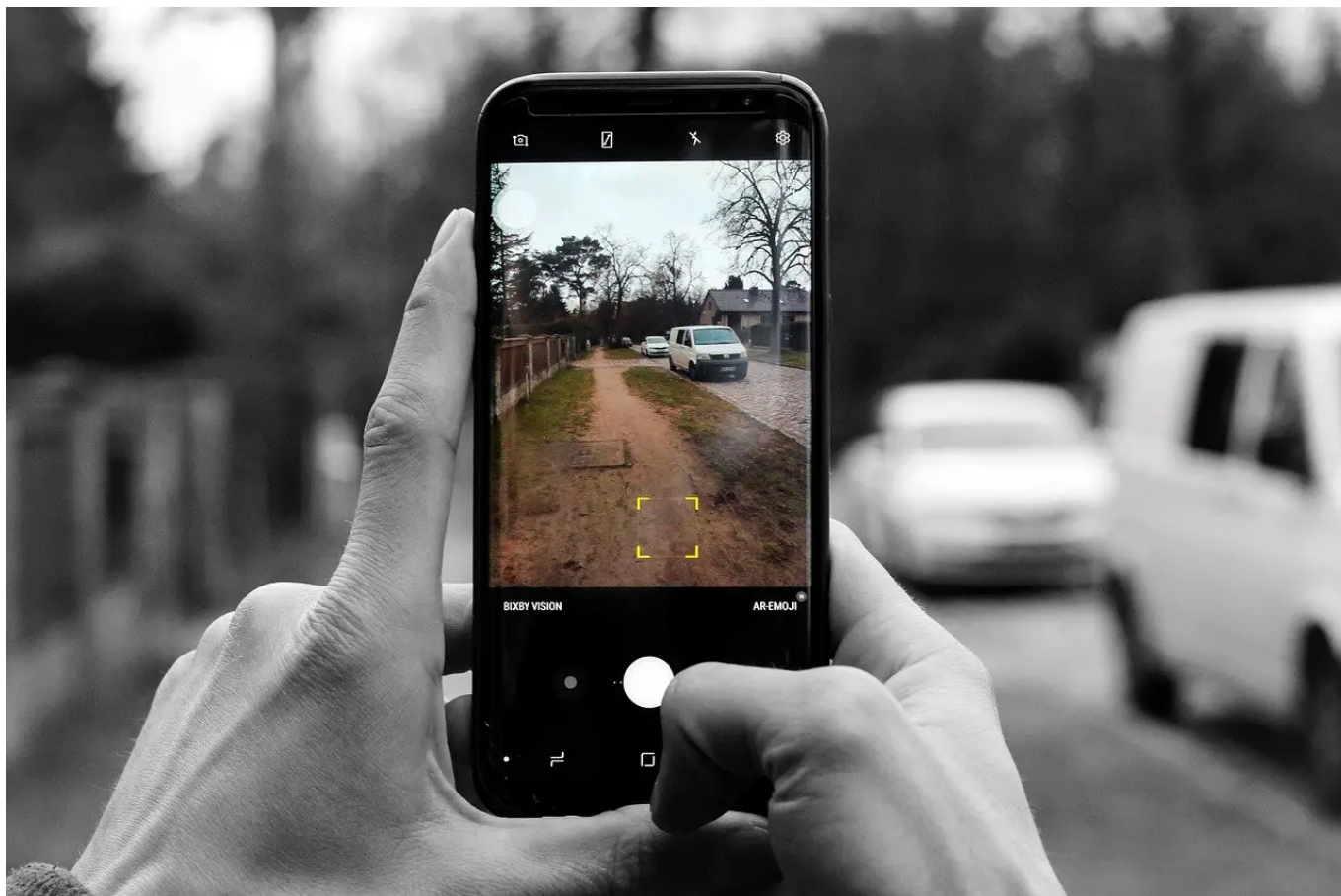
- study** A thing that is or deserves to be investigated the subject of an individual s study.

*The birth rate is central to any **explanation** of population trends.*

<b>extempore</b>	Without preparation. <i>He recited the poem <b>extempore</b>.</i>
<b>extemporize</b>	Compose or perform something such as music or a speech without preparation; improvise. <i>He <b>extemporized</b> at the piano.</i>
<b>glance</b>	Throw a glance at take a brief look at. <i>The stone <b>glanced</b> off a crag and hit Tom on the head.</i>
<u><b>glimpse</b></u>	Catch a glimpse of or see briefly. <i>He <b>glimpsed</b> a figure standing in the shade.</i>
<b>immediate</b>	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect. <i>The <b>immediate</b> revisions.</i>
<b>imminent</b>	About to happen. <i>In <b>imminent</b> danger.</i>
<u><b>impromptu</b></u>	A short musical passage that seems to have been made spontaneously without advance preparation. <i>An <b>impromptu</b> speech.</i>
<b>improvised</b>	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>An <b>improvised</b> short speech.</i>
<u><b>instant</b></u>	Instant coffee. <i><b>Instant</b> coffee.</i>
<b>instantaneous</b>	Existing or measured at a particular instant. <i>Her reaction was almost <b>instantaneous</b>.</i>
<u><b>interpretation</b></u>	An explanation of something that is not immediately obvious. <i>The edict was subject to many <b>interpretations</b>.</i>
<u><b>makeshift</b></u>	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>The rock served as a <b>makeshift</b> hammer.</i>
<b>offhand</b>	Ungraciously or offensively nonchalant or cool in manner. <i>She threw him over <b>offhandedly</b> without even a Dear John letter.</i>
<b>portray</b>	Portray in words. <i>The ineffectual Oxbridge dons <b>portrayed</b> by Evelyn Waugh.</i>
<b>prompt</b>	The time limit for the payment of an account stated on a prompt note. <i>The online form <b>prompts</b> users for data.</i>
<u><b>promptly</b></u>	In a punctual manner. <i>He <b>promptly</b> forgot the address.</i>
<b>quick</b>	Moving quickly and lightly. <i><b>Quick</b> of foot.</i>

rapid

A fast-flowing and turbulent part of the course of a river.  
*They made a **rapid** exit.*

skim

Read (something) quickly so as to note only the important points.  
*Yogurt made with **skim** milk.*

speedy

Moving quickly.  
*A **speedy** recovery.*

**spry**

(especially of an old person) active; lively.  
*The old dog was so **spry** it was halfway up the stairs before we could stop it.*

**stopgap**

A temporary way of dealing with a problem or satisfying a need.  
*Transplants are only a **stopgap** until more sophisticated alternatives can work.*

swift

A swift flying insectivorous bird with long slender wings and a superficial resemblance to a swallow spending most of its life on the wing.  
*The **swiftest** horse in his stable.*

**synoptic**

Presenting a summary or general view of a whole.  
*A **synoptic** outline of the contents.*
