- *A brief look or summary.*
- *An informal photograph; usually made with a small hand-held camera.*

negative	A negative photographic image made on film or specially prepared glass from which positive prints may be made. <i>The percentage of false negatives generated by a cancer test was of great concern.</i>
photo	A photograph.
photograph	A representation of a person or scene in the form of a print or transparent slide; recorded by a camera on light-sensitive material. <i>A photograph of her father.</i>
picture	A typical example of some state or quality. <i>His pictures hang in the Louvre.</i>
plate	A plate of food contributed by a guest to a social gathering. <i>She lifted the plate in victory.</i>
portrait	Any likeness of a person, in any medium. <i>You can print landscape and portrait pages in the same document.</i>
positive	An adjective or adverb in the positive degree. <i>Take your weaknesses and translate them into positives.</i>
print	Fingerprints. <i>She forced herself to concentrate on the tiny print.</i>
proof	The strength of distilled alcoholic spirits relative to proof spirit taken as a standard of 100. <i>If you have any proof for what you say now is the time to produce it.</i>
shot	Tiny lead pellets used in quantity in a single charge or cartridge in a shotgun. <i>The nurse gave him a flu shot.</i>
slide	Plaything consisting of a sloping chute down which children can slide. <i>Use an ice axe to halt a slide on ice and snow.</i>
snap	Tender green beans without strings that easily snap into sections. <i>The waistband had lost its snap.</i>
still	An apparatus used for the distillation of liquids consists of a vessel in which a substance is vaporized by heat and a condenser where the vapor is condensed. <i>He wanted some stills for a magazine ad.</i>

- study** A thing that is or deserves to be investigated the subject of an individual s study.
*He is a quick **study**.*
- transparency** The condition of being transparent.
*The **transparency** of ice.*

extempore	Without preparation. <i>He recited the poem extempore.</i>
extemporize	Compose or perform something such as music or a speech without preparation; improvise. <i>He extemporized at the piano.</i>
glance	Throw a glance at take a brief look at. <i>The stone glanced off a crag and hit Tom on the head.</i>
<u>glimpse</u>	Catch a glimpse of or see briefly. <i>He glimpsed a figure standing in the shade.</i>
immediate	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect. <i>The immediate revisions.</i>
imminent	About to happen. <i>In imminent danger.</i>
<u>impromptu</u>	A short musical passage that seems to have been made spontaneously without advance preparation. <i>An impromptu speech.</i>
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>An improvised short speech.</i>
<u>instant</u>	Instant coffee. <i>Instant coffee.</i>
instantaneous	Existing or measured at a particular instant. <i>Her reaction was almost instantaneous.</i>
<u>interpretation</u>	An explanation of something that is not immediately obvious. <i>The edict was subject to many interpretations.</i>
<u>makeshift</u>	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>The rock served as a makeshift hammer.</i>
offhand	Ungraciously or offensively nonchalant or cool in manner. <i>She threw him over offhandedly without even a Dear John letter.</i>
portray	Portray in words. <i>The ineffectual Oxbridge dons portrayed by Evelyn Waugh.</i>
prompt	The time limit for the payment of an account stated on a prompt note. <i>The online form prompts users for data.</i>
<u>promptly</u>	In a punctual manner. <i>He promptly forgot the address.</i>
quick	Moving quickly and lightly. <i>Quick of foot.</i>

- rapid** A fast-flowing and turbulent part of the course of a river.
*They made a **rapid** exit.*
- skim** Read (something) quickly so as to note only the important points.
*Yogurt made with **skim** milk.*
- speedy** Moving quickly.
*A **speedy** recovery.*
- spry** (especially of an old person) active; lively.
*The old dog was so **spry** it was halfway up the stairs before we could stop it.*
- stopgap** A temporary way of dealing with a problem or satisfying a need.
*Transplants are only a **stopgap** until more sophisticated alternatives can work.*
- swift** A swift flying insectivorous bird with long slender wings and a superficial resemblance to a swallow spending most of its life on the wing.
*The **swiftest** horse in his stable.*
- synoptic** Presenting a summary or general view of a whole.
*A **synoptic** outline of the contents.*
