Snicker as a Noun

Definitions of "Snicker" as a noun

- *A whinny.*
- *A disrespectful laugh.*
- *A half-suppressed, typically scornful laugh; a snigger.*



Synonyms of "Snickers" as a noun (5 Words)

- simper** An affectedly coy or ingratiating smile.

- smirk** A smug, conceited, or silly smile.
*Gloria pursed her mouth in a self satisfied **smirk**.*
- sneer** A facial expression of contempt or scorn; the upper lip curls.
*He acknowledged their presence with a condescending **sneer**.*
- snigger** A half-suppressed, typically scornful laugh.
*We heard the **sniggers** caused by their little jokes.*
- snort** A snorting sound made by an animal typically when excited or frightened.
*They were high on a few **snorts**.*

- *He could not evoke a snicker with his jokes.*



Snicker as a Verb

Definitions of "Snicker" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "snicker" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(of a horse) whinny.*
- *Give a half-suppressed, typically scornful laugh; snigger.*
- *Laugh quietly.*



Synonyms of "Snicker" as a verb (4 Words)

- simper** Smile in an affectedly coy or ingratiating manner.
*He **simpered** at me.*
- smirk** Smile affectedly or derisively.
*He **smirked** in triumph.*
- sneer** Smile or speak in a contemptuous or mocking manner.
*She had **sneered** at their bad taste.*
- snigger** Laugh in a half-suppressed, typically scornful way.
*The boys at school were sure to **snigger** at him behind his back.*



Usage Examples of "Snicker" as a verb

- *She is a woman they all love to snicker at.*
- *The horse flicked its ears and snickered with pleasure.*
- *He could imagine them snickering as he passed.*

<u>amusement</u>	A feeling of delight at being entertained. <i>An evening s amusement.</i>
approvingly	In a manner resulting from or revealing approval. <i>Several heads nodded approvingly at this concept.</i>
chortle	A noisy, gleeful laugh. <i>He chortled at his own pun.</i>
<u>chuckle</u>	A quiet or suppressed laugh. <i>Melissa gave a chuckle.</i>
cuddly	Endearing and pleasant to cuddle, especially as a result of being soft or plump. <i>A cuddly toy.</i>
gaiety	A gay feeling. <i>He seemed to be a part of the gaiety having a wonderful time.</i>
<u>giggle</u>	A foolish or nervous laugh. <i>It should be a right giggle.</i>
<u>glad</u>	Make happy; please. <i>I m really glad to hear that.</i>
<u>grin</u>	Express with a broad smile. <i>A silly grin.</i>
guffaw	A burst of deep loud hearty laughter. <i>Both men guffawed at the remark.</i>
<u>hilarious</u>	Boisterously merry. <i>Her hilarious novel.</i>
hilarity	Extreme amusement, especially when expressed by laughter. <i>By midnight the hilarity had increased.</i>
jape	A practical joke. <i>Even a schoolboy s jape is supposed to have some ascertainable point.</i>
jest	Speak in a joking way. <i>Lowly virtue is the jest of fools.</i>
jocular	With humor. <i>They tried to deal with this painful subject jocularly.</i>
<u>joyful</u>	Feeling, expressing, or causing great pleasure and happiness. <i>A joyful occasion.</i>
laugh	A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. <i>His face wrinkled in a silent laugh of derision.</i>

laughter	The action or sound of laughing. <i>He enjoyed the laughter of the crowd.</i>
mirth	Great merriment. <i>His six foot frame shook with mirth.</i>
<u>mischievous</u>	(of an action or statement) causing or intended to cause harm or trouble. <i>Mischievous rumors and falsehoods.</i>
<u>nod</u>	Express or signify by nodding. <i>He noded his approval.</i>
simper	An affectedly coy or ingratiating smile. <i>Luke darling she simpered.</i>
smile	Express with a smile. <i>At first fortune smiled on him.</i>
smiley	A symbol representing a smiling face that is used in written communication to indicate that the writer is pleased or joking. <i>He drew a smiley face.</i>
smiling	Smiling with happiness or optimism. <i>It s nice to see everyone s smiling faces.</i>
<u>smirk</u>	A smile expressing smugness or scorn instead of pleasure. <i>He smirked in triumph.</i>
<u>tickle</u>	Touch (a body part) lightly so as to excite the surface nerves and cause uneasiness, laughter, or spasmodic movements. <i>The grass tickled her calves.</i>
titter	A nervous restrained laugh. <i>There were titters from the gallery.</i>
uproarious	Uncontrollably noisy. <i>An uproarious party.</i>
<u>wink</u>	An act of winking. <i>Barney gave him a knowing wink.</i>
