## **Snob as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Snob" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “snob” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person regarded as arrogant and annoying.*
- *A person who believes that their tastes in a particular area are superior to those of other people.*
- *A person with an exaggerated respect for high social position or wealth who seeks to associate with social superiors and looks down on those regarded as socially inferior.*

- snot** Nasal mucus.

## Associations of "Snob" (30 Words)

<b>arrogant</b>	Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one's own importance or abilities. <i>A typically <b>arrogant</b> assumption.</i>
<b>arty</b>	Making a strong, affected, or pretentious display of being artistic or interested in the arts. <i>A very <b>arty</b> film.</i>
<b>blowhard</b>	A boastful or pompous person. <i>The segregationist <b>blowhards</b> who would dominate the politics of my state for a generation.</i>
<b>boastful</b>	Exhibiting self-importance. <i>A <b>boastful</b> letter.</i>
<b>brash</b>	Having an ostentatious or tasteless appearance. <i>He was <b>brash</b> cocky and arrogant.</i>
<b>cocksure</b>	Marked by excessive confidence. <i>An arrogant and <b>cocksure</b> materialist.</i>
<b>conceit</b>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>The idea of the wind s singing is a prime romantic <b>conceit</b>.</i>
<b>conceited</b>	Excessively proud of oneself; vain. <i>Fred s so <b>conceited</b> he d never believe anyone would refuse him.</i>
<b>condescending</b>	(used of behavior or attitude) characteristic of those who treat others with condescension. <i>She thought the teachers were arrogant and <b>condescending</b>.</i>
<b>elitist</b>	Demonstrating a superior attitude or behaviour associated with an elite. <i>Critics portray him as an out of touch <b>elitist</b>.</i>
<b>haughty</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>A <b>haughty</b> British aristocrat.</i>
<b>highbrow</b>	A highbrow person. <i>She considered all those without television as <b>highbrows</b> intellectual snobs or paupers.</i>
<b>immodest</b>	Lacking humility or decency. <i>TV shows full of <b>immodest</b> language.</i>
<b>imperious</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His <b>imperious</b> demands.</i>

<b>insolently</b>	In an insolent manner.
<b>intellectual</b>	Appealing to or using the intellect. <i><b>Intellectual</b> workers engaged in creative literary or artistic or scientific labor.</i>
<b>lordly</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i><b>Lordly</b> titles.</i>
<b>ostentation</b>	Pretentious or showy or vulgar display. <i>The office was spacious but without any trace of <b>ostentation</b>.</i>
<b>overbearing</b>	Expecting unquestioning obedience. <i>An <b>overbearing</b> ill tempered brute.</i>
<b>overweening</b>	Presumptuously arrogant. <i>No idea how <b>overweening</b> he would be.</i>
<b>pomposity</b>	Lack of elegance as a consequence of being pompous and puffed up with vanity. <i>His reputation for arrogance and <b>pomposity</b>.</i>
<b>poseur</b>	A person who behaves affectedly in order to impress others.
<b>pride</b>	A feeling of self-respect and personal worth. <i>He <b>prides</b> himself on making it into law school.</i>
<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i>A <b>proud</b> grandma of three boys.</i>
<b>snobbish</b>	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. <i>The writer takes a rather <b>snobbish</b> tone.</i>
<b>supercilious</b>	Expressive of contempt. <i>His mother eyed my clothes with a <b>supercilious</b> air.</i>
<b>superciliousness</b>	The trait of displaying arrogance by patronizing those considered inferior.
<b>vainglorious</b>	Excessively proud of oneself or one's achievements; overly vain. <i>This <b>vainglorious</b> boast of personal infallibility.</i>
<b>vanity</b>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited; false pride. <i>A <b>vanity</b> press.</i>
<b>vaunt</b>	A boast. <i>An autobiographer is simultaneously <b>vaunted</b> and castigated for revealing more than is deemed proper.</i>
