Synonyms of "Snobbish" as an adjective (8 Words)

clannish	(of a group or their activities) tending to exclude others outside the group. <i>They are a clannish lot with no time for foreigners.</i>
cliquish	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. <i>A notoriously cliquish political club.</i>
clubby	Effusively sociable. <i>The clubby late night world of Parliament.</i>
<u>elitist</u>	Demonstrating a superior attitude or behaviour associated with an elite. <i>Some that say he is a spoiled elitist snob.</i>

exclusive	(of an item or story) not published or broadcast elsewhere. <i>The problem isn't exclusive to Dublin.</i>
snobby	Relating to, characteristic of, or like a snob. <i>She is ostracized by the snobby rich kids at school.</i>
supercilious	Expressive of contempt. <i>Curled his lip in a supercilious smile.</i>
superior	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>Trust magnates who felt themselves superior to law.</i>

Usage Examples of "Snobbish" as an adjective

- *The writer takes a rather snobbish tone.*

Associations of "Snobbish" (30 Words)

arrogance	Overbearing pride evidenced by a superior manner toward inferiors. <i>The arrogance of this man is astounding.</i>
arrogant	Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one's own importance or abilities. <i>A typically arrogant assumption.</i>
arty	Showily imitative of art or artists. <i>Television people and arty types.</i>
blowhard	A boastful or pompous person. <i>The segregationist blowhards who would dominate the politics of my state for a generation.</i>
boastful	Exhibiting self-importance. <i>He always seemed to be rather boastful and above himself.</i>
bombastic	High-sounding but with little meaning; inflated. <i>Bombastic rhetoric.</i>
braggart	Exhibiting self-importance. <i>Braggart men.</i>
bragging	An instance of boastful talk. <i>A little honest bragging doesn't hurt anyone.</i>
clannish	Characteristic of a clan especially in being unified. <i>They are a clannish lot with no time for foreigners.</i>
conceit	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He was puffed up with conceit.</i>

conceited	Excessively proud of oneself; vain. <i>A conceited fool.</i>
condescending	Having or showing an attitude of patronizing superiority. <i>She thought the teachers were arrogant and condescending.</i>
egocentric	An egocentric person. <i>Egocentric spatial perception.</i>
exhibitionist	Someone with a compulsive desire to expose the genitals. <i>I am something of an exhibitionist.</i>
grandiloquent	Pompous or extravagant in language, style, or manner, especially in a way that is intended to impress. <i>A grandiloquent and boastful manner.</i>
grandiose	Affectedly genteel. <i>The court s grandiose facade.</i>
haughty	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>A haughty British aristocrat.</i>
lordly	Of or befitting a lord. <i>Lordly titles.</i>
narcissism	An exceptional interest in and admiration for yourself.
pomposity	The quality of being pompous; self-importance. <i>His reputation for arrogance and pomposity.</i>
pompous	Affectedly grand, solemn, or self-important. <i>Processions and other pompous shows.</i>
portentous	Puffed up with vanity. <i>The author s portentous moralizings.</i>
poseur	A person who behaves affectedly in order to impress others.
pretentious	Tawdry or vulgar. <i>A pretentious country house.</i>
pride	A group of lions. <i>The bridge was lit up in rainbow colours symbolic of LGBT pride.</i>
proud	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i>Bulrushes emerge tall and proud from the middle of the pond.</i>
selfish	Concerned chiefly or only with yourself and your advantage to the exclusion of others- Maria Weston Chapman. <i>I joined them for selfish reasons.</i>
superciliousness	The trait of displaying arrogance by patronizing those considered inferior.

vainglorious

Feeling self-importance.

*This **vainglorious** boast of personal infallibility.*

vanity

Low table with mirror or mirrors where one sits while dressing or applying makeup.

*A **vanity** press.*
