<b>abundance</b>	(physics) the ratio of the number of atoms of a specific isotope of an element to the total number of isotopes present. <i>Vines and figs grew in <b>abundance</b>.</i>
<b>badly</b>	With great intensity bad is a nonstandard variant for badly. <i>She realized she was behaving rather <b>badly</b>.</i>
<b>certify</b>	Officially declare insane. <i>The Law Society will <b>certify</b> that the sum charged is fair and reasonable.</i>
<b><u>consequently</u></b>	Because of the reason given. <i><b>Consequently</b> he didn't do it.</i>
<b>considerably</b>	To a great extent or degree. <i>The house has fallen <b>considerably</b> in value.</i>
<b><u>enormously</u></b>	To a very great degree or extent; considerably. <i>He was <b>enormously</b> popular.</i>
<b>farther</b>	To or at a greater extent or degree or a more advanced stage further is used more often than farther in this abstract sense. <i><b>Farther</b> down the corridor.</i>
<b>greatly</b>	To an extraordinary extent or degree. <i>They now have <b>greatly</b> increased powers.</i>
<b><u>hence</u></b>	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion hence adv from this place. <i>Two years <b>hence</b> they might say something different.</i>
<b>hereby</b>	(formal) by means of this. <i>I <b>hereby</b> declare you man and wife.</i>
<b><u>highly</u></b>	Favourably. <i>Does not think <b>highly</b> of his writing.</i>
<b>incalculable</b>	Too much to be measured. <i>An archive of <b>incalculable</b> value.</i>

<b>infinitely</b>	Without bounds. <i>Doing something is <b>infinitely</b> preferable to doing nothing.</i>
<b><u>innumerable</u></b>	Too numerous to be counted. <i><b>Innumerable</b> difficulties.</i>
<b>many</b>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by `as' or `too' or `so' or `that'; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>The job of government is to help order society in the interests of the <b>many</b> not the few.</i>
<b>more</b>	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. <i><b>More</b> interesting.</i>
<b>multiplicity</b>	A large number. <i>The demand for higher education depends on a <b>multiplicity</b> of factors.</i>
<b>outnumber</b>	Be larger in number. <i>Women <b>outnumbered</b> men by three to one.</i>
<b><u>overly</u></b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>A <b>really</b> enjoyable evening.</i>
<b>subsequently</b>	After a particular thing has happened; afterwards. <i>He apologized <b>subsequently</b>.</i>
<b>substantially</b>	In a strong substantial way. <i><b>Substantially</b> higher pension costs.</i>
<b><u>terribly</u></b>	Very much. <i>It was all <b>terribly</b> frustrating.</i>
<b><u>then</u></b>	In that case or as a consequence. <i>I m paid a generous salary and <b>then</b> there s the money I ve made at the races.</i>
<b>thereby</b>	By that means; as a result of that. <i>Students perform in hospitals <b>thereby</b> gaining a deeper awareness of the therapeutic power of music.</i>
<b>therefore</b>	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion therefore adv as a consequence. <i>He was injured and <b>therefore</b> unable to play.</i>
<b><u>thus</u></b>	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion thus adv in the way indicated thusly is a nonstandard variant. <i>It is late and <b>thus</b> we must go.</i>

**truly**

Absolutely or completely (used for emphasis).

*A **truly** dreadful song.*

**unusually**

To a remarkable or unusual extent; exceptionally.

*There were an **unusually** large number of excellent performances.*

**very**

With no addition of anything else; mere.

*He might be phoning her at this **very** moment.*
