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Associations of "So much" (30 Words)

abundance	(chemistry) the ratio of the total mass of an element in the earth's crust to the total mass of the earth's crust; expressed as a percentage or in parts per million. <i>She was blessed with talent and charm in abundance.</i>
appreciably	To an appreciable extent; considerably. <i>An appreciably higher risk.</i>
badly	With great intensity bad is a nonstandard variant for badly. <i>Thought badly of him for his lack of concern.</i>
considerably	To a great extent or degree. <i>Things have improved considerably over the last few years.</i>
<u>countless</u>	Too many to be counted; very many. <i>Countless hours.</i>
<u>enormously</u>	Extremely. <i>He was enormously popular.</i>
galore	In abundance. <i>There were prizes galore for everything.</i>
greatly	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>They now have greatly increased powers.</i>
<u>hence</u>	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion hence adv from this place. <i>Get thee hence.</i>
<u>highly</u>	In a high position or level or rank. <i>His colleagues think very highly of him.</i>
immensely	To a great extent; extremely. <i>Was immensely more important to the project as a scientist than as an administrator.</i>
incalculable	(of a person or their character) unpredictable. <i>Incalculable riches.</i>

innumerable	Too numerous to be counted. <i>Innumerable flags of all colours.</i>
lot	Divide items into lots for sale at an auction. <i>Eventually the lot fell on the King's daughter.</i>
many	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by 'as' or 'too' or 'so' or 'that'; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>The temptations are many.</i>
more	Moreover. <i>We have no more bananas.</i>
multiplicity	The property of being multiple. <i>The demand for higher education depends on a multiplicity of factors.</i>
myriad	The cardinal number that is the product of ten and one thousand. <i>Myriads of insects danced around the light above my head.</i>
numberless	Too numerous to be counted. <i>There are numberless questions to be asked.</i>
numerous	Consisting of many members. <i>She had complained to the council on numerous occasions.</i>
outnumber	Be larger in number. <i>Women outnumbered men by three to one.</i>
overly	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and overly possessive woman.</i>
plentiful	Producing in abundance. <i>A plentiful year.</i>
plenty	A full supply. <i>She has plenty more ideas.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They're not really my aunt and uncle.</i>
substantially	In a strong substantial way. <i>The price went up substantially.</i>
therefore	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion therefore adv as a consequence. <i>He was injured and therefore unable to play.</i>
thus	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion thus adv in the way indicated thusly is a nonstandard variant. <i>She rang up Susan and while she was thus engaged Chignell summoned the doctor.</i>

In accordance with truth or fact or reality.

*This is **truly** a miracle.*

very

Actual; precise (used to emphasize the exact identity of someone or something).

*He played **very** well.*
